Most Gracious Sovereign,

WE, the Mayor, Aldermen, and Common-Councilmen of your ancient and loyal City of Chester, in Common-Council assembled, humbly entreat your Majesty to accept our warmest Congratulations on the late glorious and decisive Victories obtained by your Majesty's Fleets over the Combined Naval Force of France and Spain:—Victories unexampled in the Annals of our History; and which are rendered still more interesting by the present critical Situation of the Affairs of Europe.

Whilst, in common with all your Majesty's loyal Subjects, we sincerely lament the Death of the most gallant Admiral Lord Viscount Nelson, in the Arms of Victory, we confidently trust that England still can boast of Heroes, who, stimulated by his bright Example, will gain fresh Laurels for their Country, and maintain the Dominion of the Sea.

We also indulge the most sanguine Hope, that, under the Protection of Divine Providence, the Wisdom of your Majesty's Councils, and the general Order that pervades your Majesty's Forces both by Sea and Land, will enable you to support and augment the Splendour of your Reign, and crown with Success your generous Exertions for the Happiness of your People, and for restoring the violated Rights and Liberties of Europe.
