The several Persons who are appointed to attend the Remains from Greenwich to Whitehall-Stairs, on Wednesday next, the 8th Instant, will assemble at the Governor's House in the Royal Hospital of Greenwich, at Ten o'Clock in the Morning of that Day, in order to proceed in the respective Barges.

The Nobility, Privy Councillors, Judges, Law Officers, Baronets, Knights of the Bath, Knights, Clergy, Esquires, and Gentlemen, who propose to attend, in their Carriages, the Public Funeral Procession from the Admiralty to St. Paul's Cathedral, on Thursday the 9th Instant, are requested to send their Titles, Names, and Address to the College of Arms, St. Bennet's-Hill, St. Paul's, before Four o'Clock in the Afternoon of Monday next, the 6th Instant, in order that they may be ranked in the Proceeding according to their several Degrees, Dignities, and Qualities. And on Monday and Tuesday next, between Ten and Four o'Clock, sealed Tickets, for the Admission of such Persons into the Procession, and into the Cathedral, as shall have transmitted their Names to the said College, will be ready there to be delivered to them, or to their written Order.

Officers of the Navy, bearing Commissions, who may desire to attend the Solemnity, are requested to send their Names and Address as above, before Four o'Clock on Monday, in order that a sufficient Number of Carriages may be provided for their Accommodation.

All Persons who have Tickets of Admission into the Procession on Thursday next, will produce such Tickets at the Gates of St. James's Park, at the Top of Constitution-Hill and the Stable Yard, and proceed into the Park, where the several Ranks will be stationed according to Regulations which will be publicly announced; and, in order to facilitate the due marshalling of the Carriages from the Admiralty, it will be requisite that they be arranged as near together as conveniently may be in their respective Classes.

The Affidavit, drawn according to the above Form, dated and attested by a Magistrate, is to be put up in a Cover, and sent by the General Post, directed thus: "To the Right Hon. the Paymaster-General, at the Horse Guards, London," and to mark in the Corner of the Cover, "Chelsea Pensioners' Affidavits," and Counterparts or Duplicates of the said Affidavits are to be reserved by the Out Pensioners respectively, to be exhibited to such Persons as shall be directed to pay them, that they may be satisfied that all such as may claim Out Pensions are the real Persons entitled to receive the same.
