HIS Majesty is pleased to permit all Carriages which are to form the Funeral Procession of the late Vice-Admiral Lord Viscount Nelson, from the Admiralty to the Cathedral Church of St. Paul, on the 9th Instant, to pass through the Gates of St. James's Park, at the Top of Constitution-Hill and the Horse-Guards, on producing Tickets for that Purpose from the College of Arms, until Nine o'Clock on that Morning.

N. B. There will be no Admission at the Stable-Yard Gate.

Whitehall, January 7, 1806.

THE Magistrates have directed to place a sufficient Number of Constables in all the Streets leading into Cockspur-Street, Charing Cross, Whitehall, Parliament-Street, and the Strand, to prevent all Carriages and Horses from passing into those Streets on Thursday next, the 9th Instant, (excepting such as are to form Part of the Funeral Procession of the late Vice-Admiral Lord Viscount Nelson to the Cathedral Church of St. Paul,) it is, there-

fore expected, that no Person whatever will attempt to drive or ride into any of those Streets on that Day, until after the Conclusion of the Ceremony, or interrupt the Constables or Soldiers in the Execution of the Service which they are directed to perform.

All Persons not forming Part of the Procession, who may be entitled to Places in St. Paul's, are desired to pass down Holborn; and the like Orders are given to the Magistrates to provide a free Passage by that Route to and from the Cathedral.

PUBLIC FUNERAL OF LORD VISCOUNT NELSON.

College of Arms, January 7, 1806.

NOTICE is hereby given, that the Carriages which are to form the Line of Procession to the Funeral of the late Lord Viscount Nelson, are to assemble in Hyde-Park by Half-past Eight o'Clock on Thursday Morning, the 9th Instant, and to have Admittance, until Nine o'Clock, upon shewing their Tickets, as issued by the College of Arms, at Cumberland and Grosvenor Gates only. They will be marshalled within the Rails, and then proceed, one by one, across Piccadilly, into St. James's Park, by the Gate at the Top of Constitution-Hill, and onwards, through the Horse Guards, to the Admiralty, in the Order in which they are to move in the Procession.

Carriages of Gentlemen, Esquires, Physicians, and Divines are to assemble near the South Rail, and the Outlet leading to Hyde-Park Corner, as near the Rail as conveniently can be, and in Lines abreast.

The Mourning Coaches for the Persons who have Duties in the Solemnity, and for the Relations and Friends of the Deceased, are to be stationed in a Body to the Eastward of the Carriages of the Gentlemen and Esquires.

Carriages of Knights, Law Officers, Knights of the Bath, Baronets, and of all below the Rank of Privy Councillors, are to be stationed on the North of those last mentioned, in similar Lines.

Carriages of the Privy Councillors, and of all the Nobility, to be ranged Northward of, and behind those last mentioned.

The Mourning Coaches for Naval Officers; and the Carriages of Military Officers. (which are to close the Procession,) to range Northward of the last, nearest to Cumberland Gate.

The Mourning Coaches appointed to convey the Chief Mourner, his Supporters and Train-Bearer, the Supporters of the Pall, the Bearers of the Canopy, and the Six Assistant Mourners, will be at

the Admiralty, on Thursday Morning by Eight o'Clock, where those Admirals are requested to attend at that Hour precisely.

The Officers of the Navy, who are appointed to bear and support the several Banners and Bannerolls in the Procession, and those Naval Officers who are to close the Procession, and for whom Mourning Coaches will be provided, are requested to repair before Seven o'Clock, on Thursday Morning, to Messrs. Elliott and Co. No. 97, New Bond-Street, in order to proceed from thence to Hyde Park.

Those Persons in the Procession who are not to wear Mourning Cloaks, official Gowns or Habits, will appear in Mourning, without Weepers, and with Mourning Swords; Knights of the several Orders to wear their Collars; Naval and Military Officers to appear in their full Uniforms, with Crape around their Arms and in their Hats; and the Clergy to be in their Clerical Habits.

Servants not in Mourning, attending the Carriages, will be admitted with Silk or Crape Hatbands and Gloves.

Mansion-House, January 3, 1806.

IT having been represented to me from the College of Arms, that much Inconvenience would be prevented at the Funeral of Lord Nelson, on Wednesday the 8th Day of January instant, if all Ships, Vessels, Barges, and other large Craft were prohibited from working or moving in the River Thames, from Greenwich to Westminster Bridge, between the Hours of Eleven in the Morning and Five in the Afternoon of that Day, or from approaching the Barges which are to form the Line of Procession, within a proper Distance to be specified, and that the Discharge of any Cannon, Gun, or other Fire Arms, should be prohibited during the Procession.

I do hereby order, that no Ship, Vessel, Barge, or other large Craft, shall be moved or navigated in or upon the River Thames, from Greenwich to Westminster Bridge, between the Hours of Eleven in the Morning and Five in the Afternoon of Wednesday the 8th Day of January instant, and that no Cannon, Gun, or other Fire Arms be discharged from any Ship or Vessel on the River, or from the Shores on either Side thereof, or from any of the Bridges across the same during the Time of the Procession by Water for the Funeral of the late Lord Nelson; and that all small Boats do not approach any Part of the Procession so as to interfere with, or interrupt the same.

PROCESSION to ST. PAUL's, on the Interment of the late Viscount Nelson.

Mansion-House, Friday, January 3, 1806.

ORDERED, That the following Regulations be adopted for the Procession passing to, and returning

from the Cathedral Church of St. Paul, on Thursday the 9th Day of January instant.

That there be Three Avenues to the Church kept with distinct Outlets from each, for the Carriages to pass off and return.

WEST AVENUE.

That the great Street or Avenue from Temple-Bar to the Church be reserved entirely for the Procession. All the Carriages in the Procession to pass in single Rank, and no other Carriage whatever to be admitted. All the Carriages in the Procession to set down at the West Gate of the Church-Yard, and order their Servants to proceed with their Carriages on the South Side of the Church-Yard eastward, through Watling-Street and Budge-Row, to turn up Wallbrook, pass the West Side of the Mansion House, and return through the Poultry into Cheapside, and to remain on the South Side of Cheapside in Three Rows with the Horses towards the Church, until called for.

That the Carriages of the Royal Family, the Lord Mayor, the Hearle, and the Carriages of the principal Mourners, and the Relations of the Deceased, after setting down at the West Gate of the Church-Yard, do likewise proceed on the South Side of the Church-Yard eastward, through Watling-Street and Budge-Row, to turn up Wallbrook and draw up in Charlotte-Street, in Two Rows, with the Horses Headstowards Wallbrook, until called for.

NORTH AVENUE for the Admission of Persons from the West End of the Town, who do not form Part of the Procession.

That Persons coming into Holborn from the West End of the Town, be admitted through the Bar on producing Tickets of Admission to the Cathedral.

Those having Tickets of Admission for the South Door of the Cathedral, are to proceed up Skinner-Street, and untill Ten o'Clock in the Morning, but not later, pass through the Bar at the Top of the Old-Bailey, go up Ludgate-Street, and after having set down at the South Door of the Cathedral, their Carriages are to turn about; drive down Paul's Chain, then to the Right, along Great-Carter Lane, to the Left, down St. Andrew's-Hill, to the Right, along Earl-Street, and to form in Bridge Street, between Earl-Street and the Obelisk, with the Horses Heads towards Earl-Street, and there wait until called for.

Those that have Tickets of Admission at the North Door of the Cathedral, are to proceed along Skinner Street and Newgate-Street, turn to the Right, down Warwick-Lane, then to the Left, along Paternoster-Row, set down at Canon-Alley, opposite the North Door of the Cathedral, then order their Servants to proceed with their Carriages to the End of Paternoster-Row, turn round to the Left, into Newgate-Street, then down St. Martin's Le Grand, into Aldersgate Street, keeping the Left Side of the Street to Long-Lane, and return on the Right, there to remain in a double Row with the Horses Heads towards Newgate Street until the Ceremony is ended, and then to return the same Way to take up.

EASTERN AVENUE for the Corporation, &c.

That the Lord Mayor, Aldermen, and Sheriffs, and Gentlemen of the Common-Council deputed to

represent the Corporation, proceed from the Mansion-House rather before Ten o'Clock in the Morning, in the following Order, for the Convenience of speedily falling into the Procession in Fleet Street: The Deputation from the Common-Council first, then the Sheriffs, Aldermen, (the Juniors being first,) and the Lord Mayor to follow through Cheapside, round the South Side of St. Paul's Church-Yard, and up Fleet-Street to the East End of St. Dunstan's Church, and draw up on the North Side of Fleet-Street, and there stop in order to fall into the Procession in their proper Places, the State Coach with the Lord Mayor, to proceed, to Temple-Bar, turn short about (within Temple Bar if possible,) and draw up on the South Side of Fleet-Street, close to Temple Bar, with the Horses Heads toward St. Paul's. The Carriages after they have set down at the West Gate of the Church-Yard, to pass along Watling-Street, Budge-Row, Wallbrook, and the Poultry, to turn down King Street, and wait in Guildhall Yard till called for.

That the Members of the Court of Common-Council and their Ladies, and Persons from the East End of the Town, having Tickets of Admission to the Cathedral, are to proceed to the North Door along the South Side of Cheapside, set down at the North-East Corner of St. Paul's Church-Yard, pass along the North Side of the Church-Yard, and enter the Cathedral at the North Door, and direct their Carriages to go down Foster-Lane to Finsbury-Square, and wait there till wanted.

That Direction Boards be fixed up, and Constables, &c. placed at all the Turnings, where necessary, to prevent the Coachmen mistaking their Lines.

HOURS OF ADMISSION.

That it be recommended

To the Minor Canons and their Friends, to enter the Church at the Dean's Gate by Nine o'Clock at the latest.

To the Members of the Court of Common-Council and their Ladies, to be in the Church by Ten o'Clock at the latest.

And to all such Persons as do not form Part of the Procession, to be in the Church by Ten o'Clock at the latest.

GENERAL DIRECTIONS.

That, in order to keep the Avenues to and from the Church as clear and open as possible, Posts with Bars or Chains, be fixed at the Entrance of all the Streets and Passages on the North and South Side of Fleet-Street, Ludgate-Hill, Ludgate-Street, St. Paul's Church-Yard, Watling-Street, Budge Row, Poultry, Cheapside, Newgate Street, Skinner-Street, Holborn up to the Bars, Maiden Lane, Lad-Lane, and Cateaton-Street; and at the Entrance of all the Streets and Passages on the East and West Side of Wallbrook, King-Street, St. Martin's-le Grand, and Aldersgate Street, as far Northward as the Corner of Barbican.

That Posts and Rails be fixed from the South East Corner of Paternoster-Row, rounding to the North Side of Newgate-Street; from the North West Corner of Dowgate-Hill, cross Dowgate-Hill and Cannon-Street; from the South East Corner of the Mansion-House, cross the Street, to the South West Corner of Princes-Street; from the South West Corner of Barbican, cross Aldersgate-Street, to the



South East Corner of Long-Lane; from the North East Corner of Warwick-Lane, croses Newgate-Street; from the North Corner of Maiden-Lane, croses Noble-Street; from the South East Corner of Maiden-Lane, croses Wood-Street; from the South East Corner of Lad-Lane, croses Wood-Street; at the North End of Milk-Street, and the South End of Aldermanbury, and the Ends of all other Streets and Passages communicating with the Lines of the different Processions, in the Interment of the late Viscount Nelson.

That Posts and Rails be fixed across Godliman-Street and Carter Lane; and at the Entrances of all the Streets and Passages leading into Great Carter-Lane, St. Andrew's Hill, Earl-Street and Bridge-Street, Blackfriars, to the Northward of Earl-Street.

That all the said Posts, Rails, Chains, and Bars be fixed by Two o'Clock in the Morning, and continued untill the whole Company shall have left the Church, and that no Coach or other Carriage (except those belonging to the Persons above-mentioned,) shall be suffered to remain in any Street or Passage, within the Extent of such Posts and Bars, on any Pretence whatever.

That where Two or more Lines of Carriages coming from different Streets, in order to proceed towards the Church, are to fall into one Line; Constables and other proper Persons be stationed, who shall direct the several Lines to advance alternately one Carriage from each into the single Line, and shall immediately take into Custody any Coachman or other Person who shall resist or disobey such Orders as may be given for the Observance of this Regulation.

That all Carriages in the North West Avenue shall advance in a single Line from Holborn Bars; and that all Carriages in the Eastern Avenue shall advance in a single Line from the Mansion-House.

That Constables and other proper Persons be placed to secure all the Bars, Posts, and Rails in every Passage where they shall be fixed.

That Constables and other proper Persons be placed to keep, clear and uninterrupted, the Footway from the North West Avenue through Canon-Alley, and the Footway from the Eastern Avenue, along the Church-Yard, to the Church.

That no Hackney Coach be permitted, on any Pretence whatever, to be drawn within those Parts of the City to be inclosed within Posts and Rails; and that the Commissioners for Hackney Coaches be requested to take away the Licence of every Coachman who shall attempt the Breach of this Regulation.
