WITH Pleasure 1 inform your Excellency, that His Majesty's Ship Victor, under my Command, on the 7th of this Month, captured Les Amis Reunis, a French Privateer of Fifty Tons, Two long Four Pounders, and manned with Thirty-eight Men, just within the Entrance of the Persian Gulph, the Coins bearing E. N. E. Five or Six Leagues; out Eighty Days from the Isle of France; had not taken any Thing. I was prompted to destroy her by having the Convoy in Company, which arrived hither fafe Three Days fince.
