SIR,

**I** FORWARD, for the Satisfaction of the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, a Letter from Lieutenant Bell, Acting Commander of His Majesty's Sloop Victor, dated Busheer, 22d May, announcing his having captured, and subsequently destroyed a small French Privateer named Les Amis Reunis, (alias Le Vingt Cinq,) on the 7th Ultimo, at the Entrance of the Persian Gulph.

*His Majesty's Sloop Victor, Busheer Road, May 23, 1805.*

SIR,

**W**ITH Pleasure I inform your Excellency, that His Majesty's Ship Victor, under my Command, on the 7th of this Month, captured Les Amis Reunis, a French Privateer of Fifty Tons, Two long Four-Pounders, and manned with Thirty-eight Men, just within the Entrance of the Persian Gulph, the Coins bearing E. N. E. Five or Six Leagues; out Eighty Days from the Isle of France; had not taken any Thing. I was prompted to destroy her by having the Convoy in Company, which arrived hither safe Three Days since.

To the KING's Most Excellent Majesty.

*Most Gracious Sovereign,*

**W**E, your Majesty's loyal and dutiful Subjects, the Mayor, Sheriffs, Burgesses, and Commons of the County of the Town of Drogheda, in Council assembled, impressed with fervent Gratitude to Almighty God for the Blessings bestowed on your Majesty's Arms in the late decisive Victory obtained over the Combined Fleets of France and

Spain, off Cape Trafalgar, by your Majesty's Fleet under the Command of the late Vice-Admiral Lord Viscount Nelson, humbly present to your Majesty our most cordial Congratulations on that most glorious and important Event.

At the same Time, we cannot forbear condoling with your Majesty and our Fellow-Subjects on the Loss of a Commander under whom this signal Victory has been achieved; a Man, who possessed the most exalted Courage with the purest Piety; a Man, whose great Name and transcendent Services to his King and Country, will ever remain in the Memory of your People, and will be handed down to the latest Posterity in the luminous Page of History.

Whilst we lament, most sensibly, the Loss of the gallant Admiral, and his brave Companions in Arms who fell in the Action, we derive great Consolation from bearing in our Minds the important Services of the many great Naval Commanders still surviving; in particular those of Vice-Admiral Lord Collingwood, who seems to have inherited the Skill and Intrepidity of his noble Chief, and who has executed so completely, the Plan which he had designed.

Trusting therefore, under Providence, in the Wisdom of your Majesty's Councils, and in the Energies which such a Victory and such Conduct must call forth from your Navy and Army, and, we should hope, from all Classes of your Majesty's Subjects, we think that we have nothing to fear from our Enemies; and that the Peace and Tranquillity which we enjoy under our most excellent Constitution will be permanently secured to us; and that the Example of Firmness and Magnanimity, so eminently displayed by your Majesty's Government, will eventually contribute to the Preservation and Maintenance of the Rights, Liberties, and Happiness of Europe.
