Spain, off Cape Trafalgar, by your Majesty's Fleet under the Command of the late Vice-Admiral Lord Viscount Nelson, humbly present to your Majesty our most cordial Congratulations on that most glo-

rious and important Event.

At the same Time, we cannot forhear condoling with your Majesty and our Fellow-Subjects on the Loss of a Commander under whom this signal Victory has been atchieved; a Man, who possessed the most exalted Courage with the purest Piety; a Man, whose great Name and transcendant Services to his King and Country, will ever remain in the Memory of your People, and will be handed down to the latest Posterity in the luminous Page of History.

Whilft we lament, most sensibly, the Loss of the gallant Admiral, and his brave Companions in Arms who sell in the Action, we derive great Consolation from bearing in our Minds the important Services of the many great Naval Commanders still surviving; in particular those of Vice-Admiral Lord Collingwood, who seems to have inherited the Skill and Intrepidity of his noble Chief, and who has executed so completely, the Plan which he had designed.

Trutting therefore, under Providence, in the Wifdem of your Majesty's Councils, and in the Energies which such a Victory and such Conduct must call forth from your Navy and Army, and, we should hope, from all Classes of your Majesty's Subjects, we think that we have nothing to fear from our Enemies; and that the Peace and Tranquillity which we enjoy under our most excellent Constitution will be permanently secured to us; and that the Example of Firmness and Magnanimity, so eminently displayed by your Majesty's Government, will eventually contribute to the Preservation and Maintenance of the Rights, Liberties, and Happiness of Europe.
