## Puduhid by Authority.

From Thursday Fabruary 3. to Monday Fabruary 7: 1680.

## Madrid, Jan. 23.

T is faid for certain at Court that the Queen is with Child, which caules great rejoyceing. The Count de Monterey is commanded to leave the Court and to retire to his Houle in the Country, having it's faid offended the King by faying things concerning the Duke de Medina Celi, his Chief Minister, which he tould not juffify.

Warfam, Fan, 18. The 13th infant the King and Queen arrived here; The 15th the Dyet was opened, and after the performing the publick devotions at St. Fohn's Church, the Nuncil or Deputies of the Nobility went to their Chamber, and there unanimoully made choice of the Chevalier Lubomirski, Knight of Maltha to be their Mareschal or Speaker, of which they fent fome of their Members to give the King an account, and to know when he would pleafe to permit them to tome and kifs his hand; his Majefty afigned them the next morning at I r a clock, and accordingly they then attended him being feated on his Throne in the Senate Chamber, and according to cuftome the Ma2 reschal and all the Deputies killed his Majesties hand, after which, the under Chancellor the Bilhop of Culm made a Speech in the Kings name, wherein he declared to them the prefent State of the Kingdom, as well with relation to the Turks, as the Moscovices 3, as to the first he told them, That the Conferences which had been held for the agreeing of the Limits, had by realon of the unrealonable demands of the Turks, been broken up without any fruit; that the Grand Signios was making great preparations against Spring, and that this Crown had rea-ton to be jealous of them; as to the Moscovites he acquainted them with what had passed fince the last Dyet concerning the Offentive and Defentive Allyance that had been propoled between the two Crowns &c. to which the Chevaleit Lubonirski Answered in a short and well composed Speech, and then the Nuncii returned to their Chamber, and have fince fpent their time in examining the complaints that have been made concerning fome of their Members,

Fienna, Jan. 23. Two kays, fince arrived, here an Express from Lintz, with Letters to Count Starenberg, Governor of this place, which advided him, that the Emperor will be very fudd inly here; and that from hence he is reloved to go to the Dyet of Hungary. Not only this place, but all the parts adjacent being wholy freed from the Plague, Our Magistrates have put out a Placaet, for the reflering of Trade and Commerce with them as formerly.

Lintz, Fan. 28. It is faid at Court that the Emiperor will part from hence for Vienna, on the fecond or third of the next Month ; and that the Baron Herwart, whom the Emperor has appointed to be one of his Commissioners at the Dyer which is going to be held in Hungary is ordered to repair im-mediately to Vienna, to adjust with Count Starenberg his Colleague feveral preliminary matters concerning the faid Dyet. Moneys are daily diffrituted to be employed in the new Leavies, and a confiderable Summ has been fent for that fervice to Tirol, which is to be disposed of by the Duke of Lorrain; who will be here, or at Vienna, in cafe the Emperor be removed thither, about the middle of the next Month. Yelterday arrived here the two youngefl Sons of the Duke of Newburg, who is full hear. From Hungary we hear that the Troops on both fides are very quiet in their Winter quarters, and that there appeared a General disposition to a Peace.

Ratiobonne, Fat. 28. Hrefh Complaints are dayly brought to the Dyet of the proceedings o the French in Alface, but without any redrefs. An Anfwer is preparing to the Letter which the Dyet lately received from the French King.

Berlin, Jan. 28. The Letters we receive from Commingsberg in Prussia, give us an account, that the Commissioners for that purpose appointed by the Elector of Brandenburg, had made an Inventory of the Goods taken on Board the Spanish Ship ( the Chief of which were Silkes, Linnen, and Lace) in order to the Sale of them, but here we are told, that his Electoral Highness has given time till the 10th of March next, for all Forreigne Merchants of not being Subjects of the Crown of Spain, to make their claims and to justifie them, by their Agents, whom his Electoral Highness will appoint Com-missioners to hear at Hamburgs In the mean time it is hoped that the Mediation of the King of England will have that good effect, as that the differences between the King of Spain, and the Elector will be compoled before this term expires, and that in confequence thereof the faid Ship and the Goods laded in her will be reftored, The Sieur Overbesin whom we formerly told you the Elector. had appointed to go his Amballador to Holand, will now in a day on two begin his journey thither. The Sieus Meinders one of our Electors Chief Minfters wont hence this weak to meet with lone of the Ministers of the Duke of Zell at a place called Gardelabel on the borders, of Lusenburg, in order to the removing forme mitunder flandings that are faid to be at prefeat both con his Electoral High-ness and the faid Duke, and the chabiliting a firm Union and friendling between them, in seccilary at this time, when all the members of the Empire ought to unite in a common bond for it's prefervation

vation and defence against the daugers that threaten it from abroad.

| Hamburg, Feb. 2. The Letters we received by the lait poit from Copenhagen, faid the King of Deumarke was going to encrease his flanding Forces by adding feveral Companies to the old Regiments and raising fix new ones. That they were expecting at that Court an Envoye from the Emperor; and that the King intended in the Spring to go for Normay to visit his Territories on that fide.

Cologne, Feb. 4. What was faid of our Electors going for Liege, proves a militake; or at leaft he has changed his mind, for we are affured that he has not now any luch intention. Mr. Legg returned hither the laft week from Caffel, and parted again on Saturday laft for England. Amferdam, Feb. 6. The Prince and Prince's of

Amferdam, Feb. 6. The Prince and Prince's of Orange are expected here to morrow, having been invited by our Magiffrats to come and fee the Italian Opera; Great preparations are making for the entertainment of their Highneffes during their flay here, which will be only for two or three days. From Hamburg they write that th re bring fome differences depending between the Elector of Brandenburg, and the Duke of Zell, t ey had to compole them, deputed perfons on ei her fide, who were to meet at a place on the borders of Luuenberg.

Hague, Feb. 7 This day the Prince and Prince's of Orange, accompanyed with a great many perions of quality went hence for Amsterdam, where great preparations are making by the Magistrates to receive and entertain their Highneffes, who will be back here b fore the meeting of the States of Holland which is to be on Tuefday next. We are told that the French Ambassador here has assured the States that the King his Mafter has not any thoughts of molefting the Spanish-Netberlands this Summer, upon which the Actions of the East-India Company, which were fallen from 439 to 395 begin to rife again. The Heer Dieft Envoye Extraordinary from the Elector of Brandenburg has not yet had his publick Addience of the States he pretending to be received in the fame manner as are the Envoyes from Crowned Heads.

Bruffels, Feb. 4. The Nations of this City have finally agreed the matter of the Impolts ; and this day their Deputies attended the Prince of Parma to acquaint him therewith; and in return his High+ ness has gratified them by taking away the pri+ viledge which the Members of the Soveraign Councils, and others enjoyed s of not paying the faid duty, which for only they, but the Monalteries and all the Officers of his Highneffes houshold are to do for the future. They continue to write from the French Conquests of the great preparations the French are making, though at the famo time they fay that the general opimion among them is, that the Prench Kings Eye is towards Germany; or Italy, which what ground there is for time must tifcover, "From Liege they write of the first Inflant that they heard he more of their Phincesin-tending to come thither; but that he had fummoned the States of that Country to meet at St. Tron, In order to the taking fuch resolutions as may be rffectual for the reeltablishing his Authority at Liege,

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and the bringing the Authors of the late diforaders there to receive the punifhment they deferve. Monfieur Pelletier, the firit of the French Commiffieners is returned to Courtray; but the Sieur Chriftin, who flayed for him there near two Months, is now here.

Brussets, Feb. 7. The Prince of Parma is now fo well again that he appears abroad; and it's hoped his destemper has quite left him. The Orders for the reforming fix Walloon Regiments and 18 others' are dispatched and will be put in execution fo foon as the Ordinary arrives from Stain, by which it's expected his Highness will receive dirictions concerning the Spanish Troops; which cannot it feems be difpoled of without particular Orders from thence; The Soldiers of thuse Regiments that are to be reformed, are to be incorporated in those that remain on Foot, which with the recruits that are now raifing will make a Body of between 25 and 20000 Men The: States of Brabant are still Assembled, but it's believed will not be long fo, having finished the matter concerning the Imposts.

Deale, Feb. 5, This Morning arrived in the Downs, a Ketch from the Strenghts; the Mafter fays, that Vice-Admiral Herbert, in the Briffol, Captain Ruffel, in the Newcafile, and Capatin Carter, in the Ceaturion, with two or three Frigats more, and two Firefhips, were gone for Argiers. That Captain Wheeler in the Nonefuch, was then at Cadiz, being appointed by Vice-Admiral Herbert, to Convoy feveral Merchant Ships that were there.
