and read from the Pulpits immediately after Divine Service.

WHEREAS His Majesty was graciously pleased, by His Royal Proclamation, bearing Date the Sixteenth Day of May One thousand eight hundred and three, to promise and declare, that the Bounties of Five Pounds for every able Seaman, and Two Pounds Ten Shillings for every ordinary Seaman fit for His Majesty's Service should be paid, in the Manner thereby directed, to every such able and ordinary Seaman, not above the Age of Fifty, nor under the Age of Twenty Years, who should on or before the Thirtieth Day of June then following, enter themselves to serve in His Majesty's Royal Navy, either with the Captains, or Lieutenants of His Majesty's Ships, or Vessels, or Officers employed on Shore for raising Men for the Service of the Royal Navy: And whereas His Majesty was also graciously pleased by his said Proclamation to declare, that all able bodied Landmen not above the Age of Thirty-five, nor under the Age of Twenty Years, who should so enter themselves as aforesaid, should receive the Sum of Thirty Shillings each Man, as His Majesty's Royal Bounty: And whereas His Majesty was also graciously pleased, by His Royal Proclamation bearing Date the Seventh Day of March One thousand eight hundred and three, to promise and declare, that a Reward of Twenty Shillings for every able and ordinary Seaman, fit to serve on board His Majesty's Ships, should be paid to any Person who should discover any Seaman or Seamen who might conceal him, or themselves, so that such Seaman or Seamen should be taken for His Majesty's Service by any of His Majesty's Sea Officers employed for raising Men, on or before the Thirtieth Day of April then next: And whereas the Time limited by the said Proclamation for Payment of the said Bounties and Reward hath, by Order in Council, been prolonged and extended to the Thirty first Day of December last. And whereas His Majesty was graciously pleased by His Royal Proclamation bearing Date the Seventh Day of November last, to promise and declare that all able bodied Landmen so entering themselves to serve in His Majesty's Royal Navy, on or before the said Thirty first of December last should be entitled to receive the said Bounty of Thirty Shillings each Man, upon Proof being exhibited that such able-bodied Landmen were not above the Age of Thirty-five, nor under the Age of

Eighteen Years; and that a Reward of Three Pounds for every able Seaman and Fifty Shillings for every ordinary Seaman fit to serve on board His Majesty's Ships should be paid in the Manner directed by His Majesty's Royal Proclamation, bearing Date the Sixth Day of February One thousand eight hundred and five, to any Person who should discover such Seaman or Seamen respectively, who might conceal him or themselves, so that such Seaman or Seamen might be taken for His Majesty's Service by any of His Majesty's Sea Officers employed for raising Men on or before the said Thirty-first Day of December last: And whereas by the said above-recited Proclamation, bearing Date the Seventh Day of November last, His Majesty was further pleased to promise and declare, that a Reward of Four Guineas for every able Seaman, Three Guineas for every ordinary Seaman, and Two Guineas and a Half for every Landman should be paid to any Person or Persons who might, on or before the said Thirty-first Day of December last, inclusive, procure the voluntary Service of, and convey such able Seaman or Landman fit for His Majesty's Service, on board any of His Majesty's Ships or Vessels, or to any of His Majesty's Sea Officers employed in raising Men, together with an Allowance at the Rate of One Penny per Mile for each able Seaman, ordinary Seaman, and Landman, for every Mile they might respectively travel to the nearest of His Majesty's Ships of War, or nearest Place of Residence of any of His Majesty's Sea Officers employed in raising Men, (provided such Man should be fit for His Majesty's Service, and there should not be Reason to suppose, that he was an Apprentice,) the said Rewards and travelling Allowance, to be paid in the Manner directed by the said Proclamation: And whereas the Time limited for Payment of the said Bounties, Rewards and travelling Allowance, has expired; and it is expedient that the Payment thereof since the Thirty-first of December last should be confirmed and approved, and that such Payment should be still further continued for some Time longer, His Majesty, with the Advice of His Privy Council, doth therefore order, and it is hereby accordingly ordered, that the Payment of the said Bounties, Rewards and travelling Allowance made since the Thirty-first Day of December last, be confirmed; and approved; and that the like Payment be further made and continued from the Date hereof until the Thirty-first Day of December next inclusive, whereof all Persons concerned are to take Notice and govern themselves accordingly. *W. June One thousand eight hundred and five, prohibiting the transporting into any Parts out of this Kingdom of any Pig-Iron, Bar-Iron, Hemp, Pitch, Tar, Rosin, Turpentine, Anchors, Cables, Cordage, Masts, Yards, Bowsprits, Oars, Oakum, Oker, Sheet-Copper, or other Naval Stores, expired upon the Eleventh Day of this instant January: And whereas it is judged expedient for His Majesty's Service, and the Safety of this Kingdom, that the said Prohibition should be continued for some Time longer, His Majesty doth therefore, with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby order, require, prohibit, and command, that no Person or Persons whosoever do at any Time, for the Space of Six Months, from the said Eleventh Day of this instant January, presume to transport into any Parts out of this Kingdom any Pig-Iron, Bar-Iron, Hemp, Pitch, Tar, Rosin, Turpentine, Anchors, Cables, Cordage, Masts, Yards, Bowsprits, Oars, Oakum, Oker, Sheet-Copper, or other Naval Stores, or do ship or lade any Pig-Iron, Bar-Iron, Hemp, Pitch, Tar, Rosin, Turpentine, Anchors, Cables, Cordage, Masts, Yards, Bowsprits, Oars, Oakum, Oker, Sheet-Copper, or other Naval Stores, on board any Ship or Vessel, in order to transporting the same into any Parts beyond the Seas, without Leave or Permission first being had and obtained from His Majesty or His Privy Council, upon Pain of incurring the Forfeitures inflicted by an Act passed in the Thirty-third Year of His Majesty's Reign, intituled "An Act to enable His Majesty to restrain the Exportation of Naval Stores, and more effectually to prevent the Exportation of Salt-Petre, Arms, and Ammunition, when prohibited by Proclamation or Order in Council:" But it is nevertheless His Majesty's Pleasure, that nothing herein contained shall extend, or be construed to extend, to any of His Majesty's Ships of War, or any other Ships or Vessels or Boats in the Service of His Majesty, or employed or freighted by His Majesty's Board of Ordnance, or by the Commissioners of His Majesty's Navy; nor to prevent any Ship or Vessel from taking or having on board such Quantities of Naval Stores as may be necessary for the Use of such Ship or Vessel during the Course of her intended Voyage, or by Licence from the Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, or the Commissioners of the Admiralty for the Time being; nor to the Exportation of the said several Articles to Ireland, or to His Majesty's Yards or Garrisons, or to His Majesty's Colonies or Plantations in America or the West Indies, or to Newfoundland, or to His Majesty's Forts and Settlements on the Coast of Africa, or to the Island of St. Helena, or to the British Settlements or Factories in the East Indies: Provided that upon the Exportation of any of the said Articles for the Purposes of Trade to Ireland, or to His Majesty's Yards and Garrisons, or to His Majesty's Colonies

and Plantations in America or the West Indies, or to the Island of Newfoundland, or to His Majesty's Forts and Settlements on the Coast of Africa, or to the Island of St. Helena, or to the British Settlements or Factories in the East Indies, the Exporters of such Articles do first make Oath of the true Destination of the same to the Places for which they shall be entered outwards, before the Entry of the same shall be made, and do give full and sufficient Security, by Bond, to the Satisfaction of the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs, to carry the said Articles to the Places for which they are so entered Outwards, and for the Purposes specified, and none other; and such Bond shall not be cancelled or delivered up until Proof be made to the Satisfaction of the said Commissioners, by the Production, within a Time to be fixed by the said Commissioners, and specified in the Bond, of a Certificate or Certificates, in such Form and Manner as shall be directed by the said Commissioners, shewing that the said Articles have been all duly landed at the Places for which they were entered Outwards: And the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, and the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, are to give the necessary Directions herein as to them may respectively appertain.

WHEREAS it has been represented to His Majesty at this Board, that the Infectious Disorder which some Time since raged within the States of Pennsylvania and New York, within the United States of America, has totally ceased; His Majesty, taking the same into Consideration, and being desirous to remove all Restraint upon Trade so far as may be consistent with the Safety of His Subjects, is pleased, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, to order, as it is hereby ordered, that the Quarantine laid by His Order in Council of the Seventh Day of November last, upon all Ships, Persons, Goods, and Merchandizes which had arrived, or which should thereafter arrive in any of the Ports of this Kingdom, or the Isles of Guernsey, Jersey, Alderney, Sark, or Man, from any of the Ports in the States of Pennsylvania or New York, be taken off; and that all such Ships and Vessels be permitted to discharge their respective Ladings without unpacking, opening, and airing, and without performing Quarantine, as freely as they might have done in case such Order of the Seventh Day of November last, had not been made, any Thing in the said Order contained to the contrary notwith-

standing; provided such Ships and Vessels shall have sailed from the Ports in the States of Pennsylvania or New York, subsequent to the Third Day of November last, and that none of the Crew or other Persons on board shall have died, or been sick with the said Fever, during the Course of the Voyage: And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, the Lieutenant-General, and the Rest of the Principal Officers of the Ordnance, His Majesty's Secretary at War, and the Governors or Commanders in Chief for the Time being of the said respective Isles of Guernsey, Jersey, Alderney, Sark, and Man, are to give the necessary Directions herein, as to them may respectively appertain.

The Speech of the Lords Commissioners to both Houses of Parliament on Tuesday, January 21, 1806.

My Lords, and Gentlemen,

IN pursuance of the Authority given to us by His Majesty's Commission, under the Great Seal, amongst other Things, to declare the Cause of His holding this Parliament, His Majesty has directed us particularly to call your Attention to the most decisive Success with which Providence has vouchsafed to bless His Majesty's Arms at Sea, since you were last assembled in Parliament.

The Activity and Perseverance of His Majesty's Fleets have been conspicuously displayed in the Pursuit and Attack of the different Squadrons of the Enemy, and every Encounter has terminated to the Honour of the British Flag and the Diminution of the Naval Force of the Powers with whom His Majesty is at War; but the Victory obtained over the Combined Fleet of France and Spain off Cape Trafalgar has manifested, beyond any Exploit recorded even in the Annals of the British Navy, the Skill and Enterprize of His Majesty's Officers and Seamen; and the Destruction of so large a Proportion of the Naval Strength of the Enemy has not only confirmed, in the most signal Manner, the Maritime Superiority of this Country, but has essentially contributed to the Security of His Majesty's Dominions.

His Majesty most deeply regrets that the Day of that memorable Triumph should have been unhappily clouded by the Fall of the heroic Commander under whom it was achieved: And He is persuaded that you will feel that this lamented but glorious Termination of a Series of transcendent Exploits claims a distinguished Expression of the lasting Gratitude of the Country; and that you will therefore cheerfully concur in enabling His Majesty to annex to those Honours which he has conferred on the Family of the late Lord Viscount Nelson, such a Mark of national Munificence, as may preserve to the latest

Posterity the Memory of his Name and Services, and the Benefit of his great Example.

His Majesty has commanded us further to inform you, that, whilst the Superiority of His Arms at Sea has been thus uniformly asserted and maintained, He has not been wanting in His Endeavours to apply the Means, which were so liberally placed at His Disposal, in Aid of such of the Powers of the Continent as evinced a Determination to resist the formidable and growing Encroachments of France. He has directed the several Treaties entered into for this Purpose to be laid before you; and, though he cannot but deeply lament that the Events of the War in Germany have disappointed His Hopes, and led to an unfavourable Issue, yet His Majesty feels confident, that, upon a Review of the Steps which He has taken, you will be of Opinion, that He has left nothing undone on His Part to sustain the Efforts of His Allies, and that He has acted in strict Consonance to the Principles declared by Him, and recognized by Parliament as essential to the Interest and Security of His own Dominions, as well as to the general Safety of the Continent.

It is a great Consolation to His Majesty, and one in which he is persuaded you will participate, that although the Emperor of Germany has felt himself compelled to withdraw from the Contest, His Majesty continues to receive from His august Ally the Emperor of Russia, the strongest Assurances of unshaken Adherence to that generous and enlightened Policy by which he has hitherto been actuated; and His Majesty has no Doubt that you will be fully sensible of the important Advantages to be derived from preserving at all Times the closest and most intimate Connection with that Sovereign.

Gentlemen of the House of Commons,

His Majesty has directed the Estimates for the Year to be laid before you, and He has commanded us to assure you that they are framed upon that Scale of Exertion which the present Situation of the Country renders indispensable. His Majesty fully relies upon your granting Him such Supplies as, upon due Deliberation, the public Exigencies may appear to require. It is His earnest Wish to contribute, by every Means in His Power, to alleviate the additional Burthens which must necessarily be imposed upon His People, and with this View He has directed the Sum of One Million Sterling, Part of the Proceeds arising from the Sale of such Prizes made on the Powers with which He is at War, as are by Law velted in the Crown, to be applied to the public Service of the Year.

My Lords, and Gentlemen,

His Majesty is most fully persuaded, that whatever Pride and Confidence you may feel in common with Him, in the Success which has distinguished the British Arms, in the Course of the present Contest, you will be sensible how much the Events of the War on the Continent, by which the predominant



Power and Influence of France have been so unhappily extended, require the Continuance of all possible Vigilance and Exertion. Under this Impression, His Majesty trusts that your Attention will be invariably directed to the Improvement of those Means which are to be found in the Bravery and Discipline of His Forces, in the Zeal and Loyalty of every Class of His Subjects, and in the unexhausted Resources of His Dominions, for rendering the British Empire invincible at Home, as well as formidable Abroad; satisfied that, by such Efforts alone, the Contest can be brought to a Conclusion consistent with the Safety and Independence of the Country, and with its Rank amongst the Nations of the World.

RECEIPT DUTY.

His Majesty's Attorney-General versus William Bell.

Sittings in the Exchequer, after Michaelmas Term, 1805, before the Lord Chief Baron and a special Jury.

MR. PLUMER, the Counsel for the Crown, stated to the Court and Jury, that this was an Information filed in the Name of His Majesty's Attorney-General, by Order of the Commissioners of Stamps, against the Defendant William Bell, a Butcher, at Manchester, for having, in the Month of October, 1804, received from a Person of the Name of Barrowclough, a Sheriff's Officer, also residing at Manchester, the Sum of 11l. 15s. 6d. the Amount of a Bill delivered for Meat sold to him, and refusing, at the Time the Money was paid, to sign a Receipt for the same on a proper Stamp, and to pay the Duty thereon, as directed by the Statute of the 43d of the present King, Cap. 126; which Act, in the 2d Section, directs, that the Stamp Duty on all Receipts shall be paid

by the Person receiving the Money. And the 5th Section also enacts, that it shall be lawful for any Person, or any Agent of any Person, from whom any Sum of Money shall be due or payable, and who shall have paid such Sum of Money, to provide a Piece of Paper, duly stamped according to the Amount of the Sum so paid, or some higher Rate of Duty in the said Act contained, and to demand and require of the Person entitled to such Sum of Money a Receipt for the same, and also the Amount of the Duty thereon; and then it provides, if any Person, to whom any Sum of Money shall have been paid, shall refuse to give such Receipt upon Demand thereof, or pay the Amount of the Duty thereof, every such Person shall forfeit and pay for every such Offence the Sum of Ten Pounds.—He then observed that this Act casts the Obligation upon the Person who receives the Money to give a stamped Receipt to the Person paying it, or the Person paying the Money may tender a Receipt Stamp, and may demand of the Person to sign it after he has received the Money; and he has a Right also to demand the Payment of the Amount of the Duty; and if the Person receiving the Money does not sign the Receipt, and pay the Duty, he incurs the Penalty.

The Case was proved agreeable to Mr. Plumer's opening, by Barrowclough, confirmed by James Butler, who proved that the Defendant was paid 11l. 15s. 6d. for his Bill, and then asked to sign a Receipt, which was produced by Barrowclough, and to pay the Sum of 4d. which was the Price of the Stamp. The Defendant refused, and said he should ask Advice of his Friends, and would sign it immediately after. Upon being frequently applied to afterwards, he persevered in his Refusal to sign the Receipt, or pay the 4d.

Mr. Dauncey made a few Observations on Behalf of the Defendant.

When the Lord Chief Baron addressed the Jury as follows:

I think this is an extremely proper Prosecution. I take the Object of it to be to give Publicity to the Law. I entirely agree with what has fallen from the Counsel for the Crown, that the Receipt must be given immediately upon the Payment of the Money, at the Peril of the Party who refuses it.

By your Verdict I hope, therefore, it will be understood, that the Law must be put in Execution; and that a Person withholds a Receipt at the Time of receiving the Money at his Peril. It is impossible that to a Butcher (a Man in considerable Trade I should suppose, by having a Bill of 11l. 15s. 6d. paid by a Customer not of very high Rank), the 4d. should be an Object to him. I take it to be an Experiment on the Part of this Man, and perhaps many others, to try whether the Law can be evaded, or not. It is not likely he should squabble merely about 4d.; nor is it likely he could have any Doubt about the Terms of the Receipt. It was extremely proper that it should be published to the World, that a Man must give a Receipt upon receiving out Money, and must do it immediately. That I take to be the true Interpretation of the Law in this Case. Gentlemen, you can have no Doubt in finding a Verdict for the Crown.

The Jury immediately gave a Verdict for the King. Penalty £. 10
