To the KING's Most Excellent Majesty.

Most Gracious Sovereign,

WE, your Majesty's dutiful, loyal, and affectionate
 Subjects, the Mayor, Recorder, Burgesses, and
 Commonalty of your ancient Borough of Thetford,
 in the Counties of Norfolk and Suffolk, in Common-
 Hall assembled, beg Leave to approach the Throne
 with heartfelt Congratulations on the Successes of
 your Majesty's Arms in the late glorious Naval Vic-
 tories obtained over our Combined Enemies.

Allow us, Sire, at the same Time, to sympathize
 in the Feelings of your Royal Bosom; and to de-
 plore, in common with all our Fellow Subjects, the
 Loss of our great and gallant Countryman, the
 heroic Nelson; to whose Spirit, unparalleled profes-
 sional Skill, and Exertions, those splendid Achieve-
 ments are, under Divine Providence, principally to
 be ascribed.

May this great Example, held forth to the Ad-
 miration of Europe, rouse her to a general and firm
 Resistance to the Views and Machinations of an
 haughty and inveterate Foe; and, by the united
 Efforts of all legitimate Monarchs, obtain a success-
 ful Termination of that Contest, to which it has
 been exposed by his inordinate Ambition.
