THIS Day His Grace John Duke of Bedford, the Right Honorable Henry Earl of Carnarvon, the Right Honorable John Joshua Earl of Carysfort, the Right Honorable Charles Augustus Lord Ossulston, the Right Honorable St. Andrew Lord St. John, of Bletfoe, and the Right Honorable William Elliot, were, by His Majesty's Command, sworn of His Majesty's Most Honorable Privy Council, and took their respective Places at the Board accordingly.

His Majesty, in Council, was this Day pleased to declare His Grace John Duke of Bedford Lieutenant-General, and General Governor, of that Part of the United Kingdom called Ireland.

His Majesty having been graciously pleased to deliver the Custody of the Seals of the Duchy and County-Palatine of Lancaster to the Right Honorable Edward Earl of Derby, the Oath of Chancellor of the said Duchy was this Day, by His Majesty's Command, administered to his Lordship.

His Majesty having been pleased, by Letters Patent under the Great Seal of Great Britain, to constitute the Right Honorable Francis Earl of Moira Constable of His Majesty's Tower of London, and also Lord Lieutenant of the Tower Hamlets, his Lordship this Day, in Council, took the Oaths appointed to be taken, instead of the Oaths of Allegiance and Supremacy, as Constable of the said Tower, and as Lord Lieutenant of the said Tower Hamlets, and likewise the Oath of Constable of the Tower of London.

His Majesty, in Council, was this Day pleased to appoint Henry Lee Warner, of Walsingham, Esq; to be Sheriff of the County of Norfolk, in the Room of John Morfe, of Mount Ida, Esq. :

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS His Majesty was graciously pleased, by His Royal Proclamation, bearing Date the Sixteenth Day of May One thousand eight hundred and three, to promise and declare, that the Bounties of Five Pounds for every able Seaman, and Two Pounds Ten Shillings for every ordinary Seaman fit for His Majesty's Service should be paid, in the Manner thereby directed, to every such able and ordinary Seaman, not above the Age of Fifty nor under the Age of Twenty Years, who should on or before the Thirtieth Day of June then following, enter themselves to serve in His Majesty's Royal Navy, either with the Captains, or Lieutenants of His Majesty's Ships, or Vessels, or Officers employed on Shore for raising Men for the Service of the Royal Navy: And whereas His Majesty was also graciously pleased by his said Proclamation to declare, that all

able bodied Landmen not above the Age of Thirty-five, nor under the Age of Twenty Years, who should so enter themselves as aforesaid, should receive the Sum of Thirty Shillings each Man, as His Majesty's Royal Bounty: And whereas His Majesty was also graciously pleased, by His Royal Proclamation bearing Date the Seventh Day of March One thousand eight hundred and three, to promise and declare, that a Reward of Twenty Shillings for every able and ordinary Seaman, fit to serve on board His Majesty's Ships, should be paid to any Person who should discover any Seaman or Seamen who might conceal him, or themselves, so that such Seaman or Seamen should be taken for His Majesty's Service by any of His Majesty's Sea Officers employed for raising Men, on or before the Thirtieth Day of April then next: And whereas the Time limited by the said Proclamation for Payment of the said Bounties and Reward hath, by Order in Council, been prolonged and extended to the Thirty first Day of December last: And whereas His Majesty was graciously pleased by His Royal Proclamation bearing Date the Seventh Day of November last, to promise and declare, that all able bodied Landmen so entering themselves to serve in His Majesty's Royal Navy, on or before the said Thirty first of December last should be entitled to receive the said Bounty of Thirty Shillings each Man, upon Proof being exhibited that such able-bodied Landmen were not above the Age of Thirty-five, nor under the Age of Eighteen Years; and that a Reward of Three Pounds for every able Seaman and Fifty Shillings for every ordinary Seaman fit to serve on board His Majesty's Ships should be paid in the Manner directed by His Majesty's Royal Proclamation, bearing Date the Sixth Day of February One thousand eight hundred and five, to any Person who should discover such Seaman or Seamen respectively, who might conceal him or themselves, so that such Seaman or Seamen might be taken for His Majesty's Service by any of His Majesty's Sea Officers employed for raising Men on or before the said Thirty-first Day of December last: And whereas by the said above-recited Proclamation, bearing Date the Seventh Day of November last, His Majesty was further pleased to promise and declare, that a Reward of Four Guineas for every able Seaman, Three Guineas for every ordinary Seaman, and Two Guineas and a Half for every Landman should be paid to any Person or Persons who might, on or before the said Thirty-first Day of December last, inclusive, procure the voluntary Service of, and convey such able Seaman or Landman fit for His Majesty's Service, on board any of His Majesty's Ships or Vessels, or to any of His Majesty's Sea Officers employed in raising Men, together with an Allowance at the Rate of One Penny per Mile for each able Seaman, ordinary Seaman, and Landman, for every Mile they might respectively travel to the nearest of His Majesty's Ships of War, or nearest Place of Residence of any of His Majesty's Sea Officers employed in raising Men, (provided such Man should be fit for His Majesty's Service, and there should not be Reason to suppose, that he was an Apprentice,) the said Rewards and travelling Allowance, to be paid in the Manner directed by the said Proclamation: And whereas the Time limited for Payment of the said Bounties, Rewards

and travelling Allowance, has expired; and it is expedient that the Payment thereof since the Thirty-first of December last should be confirmed and approved, and that such Payment should be still further continued for some Time longer, His Majesty, with the Advice of His Privy Council, doth therefore order, and it is hereby accordingly ordered, that the Payment of the said Bounties, Rewards and travelling Allowance made since the Thirty-first Day of December last, be confirmed, and approved; and that the like Payment be further made and continued from the Date hereof until the Thirty-first Day of December next inclusive, whereof all Persons concerned are to take Notice and govern themselves accordingly. *W. WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the Twenty-eighth Year of the Reign of His present Majesty, intituled "An Act for regulating the Trade between the Subjects of His Majesty's Colonies and Plantations in North America, and in the West India Islands, and the Countries belonging to the United States of America, and between His Majesty's said Subjects and the Foreign Islands in the West Indies;" it is, amongst other Things, enacted, That it shall and may be lawful for His Majesty in Council, by Order or Orders to be issued and published from Time to Time, to authorize, or by Warrant or Warrants under His Sign Manual, to empower the Governor of Newfoundland, for the Time being, to authorize, in Case of Necessity, the Importation into Newfoundland of Bread, Flour, Indian Corn, and Live Stock, from any of the Territories belonging to the said United States, for the Supply of the Inhabitants and Fishermen of the Island of Newfoundland for the then ensuing Season only; provided always, that such Bread, Flour, Indian Corn, and Live Stock, so authorized to be imported into the Island of Newfoundland, shall not be imported, except in Conformity to such Rules, Regulations, and Restrictions as shall be specified in such Order or Orders, Warrant or Warrants, respectively, and except by British Subjects, and in British-built Ships, owned by His Majesty's Subjects, and navigated according to Law: And whereas it is expedient and necessary that Provision be made for fully supplying the Inhabitants and Fishermen of the Island of Newfoundland, for the ensuing Season, with Bread, Flour, Pease, Indian Corn, Butter, and Live Stock, His Majesty doth thereupon, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby order and declare, that, for the Supply of the Inhabitants and Fishermen of the Island of Newfoundland, for the ensuing Season only, Bread, Flour, Pease, Indian Corn, Butter, and Live Stock, may be imported into the said Island from any of the Territories belonging to the said United States, by British Subjects, and in British-built Ships, owned by His Majesty's Subjects, and navigated according to Law, and which, within the Space of Nine Months previous to the Time of such Importation, have cleared out from some Port of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ire-

land, or other His Majesty's Dominions in Europe; for which Purpose a Licence shall have been granted by the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs in England, or Scotland, or the Commissioners of His Majesty's Revenue in Ireland, or any other Person or Persons who may be duly authorized in that Kingdom, respectively, in the Manner and Form hereinafter-mentioned; which Licence shall continue and be in Force for Nine Calendar Months from the Day of the Date upon which such Licence is respectively granted; and no longer; provided that no such Licence as aforesaid, granted after the Thirtieth Day of September next, shall be of any Force or Effect: And His Majesty is hereby further pleased to order, that the Master or Person having the Charge or Command of any Ship or Vessel to whom such Licence shall be granted, shall, upon the Arrival of the said Ship or Vessel at the Port, Harbour, or Place in the Island of Newfoundland, where he shall discharge such Bread, Flour, Pease, Indian Corn, Butter, and Live Stock, deliver up the said Licence to the Collector, or other proper Officer of the Customs there, having first indorsed on the Back of such Licence the Marks, Numbers, and Contents of each Package of Bread, Flour, Pease, Indian Corn, Butter, and the Number of Live Stock, under the Penalty of the Forfeiture in the said Act mentioned: And the Collector, or other proper Officer of the Customs at Newfoundland, is hereby enjoined and required to give a Certificate to the Master or Person having the Charge or Command of such Ship or Vessel, of his having received the said Licence so indorsed as before-directed, and to transmit the same to the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs in England or Scotland, or to the Commissioners of His Majesty's Revenue in Ireland, respectively, by whom such Licence was granted.

Bread, Flour, Pease, Indian Corn, Butter, and Live Stock, the Produce of the said United States, and no other Article whatever; and to carry the said Bread, Flour,

Pease, Indian Corn, Butter, and Live Stock to some Port or Place in the Island of Newfoundland, and on the Arrival of the said Ship at any Port, Harbour, or Place of Discharge in Newfoundland, the Master or Person having the Charge or Command of the said Ship, is required and enjoined to deliver up the said Licence to the Collector or other proper Officer of His Majesty's Customs there, and to endorse on the Back thereof the Marks, Numbers, and Contents of each Package of Bread, Flour, Pease, Indian Corn, Butter, and the Number of Live Stock; and shall thereupon receive a Certificate thereof from the said Collector, or other proper Officer of the Customs.

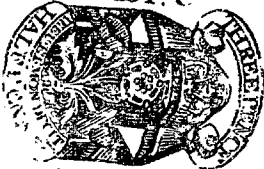
