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Warsaw, Jan. 25.

**I**N our last we gave you an account of the meeting of the Dyet, since which, nothing of Moment has passed, but is expected that in few days we shall hear of some Matters of importance, and that it will be proposed, that the Kings eldest Son may be Declared his Successor, which in all probability will meet with great opposition. The Moscovite Ambassador is not yet arrived, nor have we any account when we may expect him; but in the mean time some of the Senators have declared their opinion to be, That the Alliance which has been so long Treating between the Moscovites and this Crown be speedily concluded, for that there is ground enough to believe, that the Turks when they have their Armies in the Field, may, if they find this Kingdom unprovided, be easily induced to employ their Arms against it. The Marriage of the Prince of *Brandenburg* with the Princess *Radzeville*, is still discoursed of as a thing that may be of great consequence to the Affairs of this Kingdom, because of the great Interest that Prince will have in *Lithuania*, great part of which Dutchy he will now be possessed of in right of his Wife.

*Dahitzick*, Jan. 31. From *Moscow* they tell us, that the Czar will have very great Armies in the Field the next Summer, and they speak of no less than 300000 Men; by which it does not seem that they have any thoughts of Peace. We have our Polish Letters, but they bring us nothing considerable, none of the great Matters that have been discoursed of, having as yet been moved in the Dyet.

*Lisbonne*, Jan. 6. We are expecting the arrival of the Marquis *de Drenero*, Ambassador Extraordinary from the Duke of *Savoy* with some impatience, for it is a long while since we heard of his departure from *Turin*. This being the Infanta's Birth-day, when she entred into the thirteenth year of her age, all the Foreign Ministers have been at Court to make their Compliments to the Prince Regent, the Queen, and the Infanta thereupon.

*Genova*, Jan. 29. Yesterday arrived here the Dutch Convoy, which has been so long expected, consisting of two men of War and four Merchant-ships, all bound for *Smirna*: they have been four Months in coming from *Bolani*, and intend to part hence again in few days, and to call in at *Leghorn*, *Naples*, and *Messina*. Here are not any English Ships in Port.

*Limz*, Jan. 28. The rigor of the Season has made the Emperor put off his Journey to *Vienna*, till the 15th of *March*; but in the mean time he has appointed Commissioners who are to meet with some

of the Principal Men among the Hungarians, and to adjust with them several Matters concerning the meeting of the Dyet, for the preventing of Disorder and Confusion; The Emperor we are told, intends to go and perform his Devotions at old *Oettingen* in *Bavaria*; and its said the Elector of *Bavaria* will meet his Imperial Majesty there, which gives an occasion of renewing the Discourse concerning the Electors Marriage with the Arch-Dutchess the Emperors Daughter. Prince *Louis* the Duke of *Neuburg's* Son is to have a Regiment of those that are now going to be raised. The Duke of *Neuburg* will stay heretill the Emperor and Empress remove to *Vienna*. The Regiment of Count *Palfi* is ordered to march into the Empire, to reinforce the Garrison of *Phillipsburg*. The Emperor is sending Count *Berka* in quality of his Envoye Extraordinary to the King of *Denmark*.

*Strasburg*, Feb. 3. The Baron *de Monclar* is on his departure for *France*; he is at present employed in taking a Review of the Troops that are quartered in this Countrey, that he may be able to give the King a perfect Account of them. Upon the Representations that have been made by Count *Mansfeldt* the Emperors Minister at the French Court, the King has Declared, that he is willing to name Commissioners who may meet with those of the Emperor, to examine and adjust the Matters in difference; and the Emperor has agreed likewise to appoint Commissioners on his part; we know not yet the place they are to meet at, but its said it will be *Francfort* or *Augsburg*. The French work on their new Fortifications with all possible diligence; we are told that Count *Mansfeldt* among other things desired, that the said Fortifications might be discontinued, during the intended Conferences between the Imperial and French Commissioners, but that the French Ministers would not hear of that.

*Hamburg*, Feb. 5. The last week passed through this place two Ambassadors from the Czar of *Moscow*, they had with them a Train of about 70 Persons, and are going to *France* to make some Proposals as is given out, concerning the establishing a Trade between the French and the Moscovites. Our last Letters from *Stockholme* are dated the 21 of the last Month, they tell us, that the Queen of *Sweden* was four Months gone with Child, to the great joy of that Court; and that Count *Henry Horne* was like to be called to an Account concerning his Conduct of the *Livonian* Army, with which during the late War he was ordered to march into *Prussia*, to give the Elector of *Brandenburg* a Divercion on that side, which Expedition proved very unsuccessful, and the blame it seems is laid upon him. The King of *Denmark*, has given Orders for the fitting

ting out a Squadron of 16 men of War, which he intends to keep at Sea all the next Summer; and is likewise increasing his Land-Forces.

*Cologne, Feb. 7.* From *Lorraine* we have Advice, that two or three Battalions of the French Guards had received Orders to march to *Verdun*, to work on the new Fortifications that are making there, which they say will render that place impregnable. Commissioners are to meet on the part of the Emperor and the French King, to Regulate the Matter of the Dependencies, which has given so great vexation to many Princes of the Empire; but at the same time the French intend to go on with their new Fortifications in *Alsace*, though Count *Mansfeldt*, the Emperors Envoye at *Paris* has very much pressed that they might be discontinued during the Conferences.

*Amsterdam, Feb. 11.* On Friday last in the afternoon the Prince and Princess of *Orange*, accompanied with a great many persons of quality, arrived here from the *Hague*, being received by a Company of Burghers in Arms, who were drawn up at the Gate their Highnesses entered the Town at, and being Saluted with a discharge of the Great Guns; that Evening their Highnesses went to see the *Lalian Opera*; and the next day were very magnificently Entertained at the *Stadthouse* by the Magistrates, in the name of the City; a Company of Burghers being appointed to keep a Guard before the Gates of the *Stadthouse*, during their Highnesses being there, who on Sunday after having been at Church, returned to the *Hague*.

*Hague, Feb. 11.* The Prince and Princess of *Orange* returned from *Amsterdam* last Sunday, extremely satisfied with their Entertainment here, which was most extraordinary. The States of *Holland* are to meet to morrow, and its said that the chief business that will employ them this Session, will be the settling the state of the Army, and the regulating the Affairs of the Revenue. The *Heer Dieft*, Envoye Extraordinary from the Elector of *Brandenburg* will have his Audience of the States-General in a day or two. From *Copenhagen* they write that the King of *Denmark* was Arming by Sea and Land.

*Brussels, Feb. 11.* The States of *Brabant* continue still Assembled; the conclusion of the business of the Imposts being retarded by some new difficulties arisen in that Matter at *Louvain* and *Antwerp*, which we doubt not but will be quickly removed. The great Reform will be Declared in a day or two, his Highness having received the necessary Orders from *Spain*, concerning the Spanish Regiments, which are as well as the rest to be subject to the said Reform. Don *Antonio d'Agurto* is gone for *Flandere* to Command the Troops there. Don *Bernardo de Salinas* is preparing for his Journey to *Germany*, having received his Dispatches. The Letters we receive from *Paris* say, that the differences between the French King and the Pope, seemed to be very far from an Accommodation, but rather to increase; and that the Jesuits were in a great perplexity what to do in the case of Father *Mainbourg*, whom they had received a positive Order from the Pope to expel their Society; the same Letters add, that the French were drawing a Body of 16 or 18000 Men on the Frontiers of *Savoy*, and that it was believed their eye was upon *Cazal*.

*Marseilles, Feb. 1.* The last week departed from hence a Ship of this place for *Argiers*, which carried an Envoy from the King, and another from the Commerce of this place, to demand satisfaction for several abuses committed of late by those Pyrats; as the taking Passengers and Strangers Goods out of French Vessels; the making Slaves of such French men as they have found in foreign Vessels, harboring those of *Sally*, and granting private Commissions to them: for all which the King demands satisfaction; or otherwise threatens to Declare a War; this Vessel had strict Orders not to carry any Goods thither, nor to bring any from thence.

*Plymouth, Feb. 4.* This morning arrived here His Majesties Ship the *Leopard*, Capt. *Story* Commander, who came from *Cadiz* with 26 Merchant Ships under his Convoy, which are past up the Channel.
