PUBLIC FUNERAL OF THE LATE RIGHT HON. WILLIAM PITT.

College of Arms, February 18, 1806.

THE Nobility, Privy Councillors, Judges, Law Officers, Baronets, Knights of the Bath, Knights, Clergy, Esquires, and Gentlemen, who propose to attend the Public Funeral of the late Right Honorable William Pitt, which is to proceed from the Painted Chamber to Westminster Abbey, on Saturday Morning the 22d Instant, are requested to send their Titles, Names, and Address to the College of Arms, St. Bennet's Hill, St. Paul's, before Four o'Clock in the Afternoon of To-morrow, in order that they may be ranked in the Proceeding according to their several Degrees, Dignities, and Qualities. And on Thursday next, between Ten and Four o'Clock, sealed Tickets for the Admission of such Persons into the Procession, and into Westminster Abbey, as shall have transmitted their Names to the said College, will be ready there to be delivered to them, or to their written Order.

Those Persons in the Procession who are not to wear Mourning Cloaks, official Gowns, or Habits, will appear in Mourning, without Weepers, and with Mourning Swords; Knights of the several Orders to wear their Collars; Naval and Military Officers to be in their full Uniforms, with Crape around their Arms and in their Hats; and the Clergy in their Clerical Habits.

The Peers, Peers' Sons, the Chief Mourner, his Two Supporters, the Assistant Mourners, and Relations of the Deceased, are requested to assemble at Ten o'Clock on Saturday Morning next, in the House of Lords; the Members of the House of

Commons in their own House; the several Persons who have Duties to perform in the Solemnity in the Chamber heretofore the House of Lords; and the Clergy, Gentry, and others intending to walk in the Procession, in the Committee Rooms adjoining. The Nobility, and those who are to assemble in the House of Lords, are requested to go in at the Porch of the House of Lords; the Members of the House of Commons, the Right Honorable the Lord Mayor, Aldermen, &c. and other Persons in the Procession, at the Door leading to the House of Commons from Old Palace Yard; and to avoid Confusion, the Coaches, after setting down, are not to return the same Way, but to proceed through Abingdon Street, &c.

N. B. There will not be any Passage to the Painted Chamber through Westminster Hall on that Morning.

Copy of a Letter from Vice-Admiral Dacres, Commander in Chief of His Majesty's Ships and Vessels at Jamaica, to William Marsden, Esq; dated at Port Royal, December 19, 1805.

SIR,

I INCLOSE you a Copy of a Letter I have received from Captain Macdonnell, of the *Bacchante*, acquainting me of his having captured the Spanish Privateer Schooner *Dos Azares*.

*His Majesty's Ship Bacchante, at Sea,
18th November, 1805.*

SIR

I HAVE the Honor of informing you, that, in cruising off the North East End, to protect the Ships bound to this Side of the Island, we discovered a Schooner under the Land. Knowing our Misfortune of not sailing well, I stood off, and was chased by her until she found her Mistake, on which I tacked and made all sail; and, after a Chase of Seven Hours, we run alongside and boarded the Spanish Privateer Schooner the *Les Dos Azares*, Captain Ealletam Garcia, of Thirty-six Men, out Four Days from Cuba, and had taken nothing, armed with Two Three-Pounders, and in all Ref-
