SIR,

I INCLOSE the Copy of a Letter I received from Captain N. D. Cochrane, of His Majesty's Sloop *Kingsfisher*, giving an Account of the Capture of a French Privateer of Fourteen Guns; and I am happy to acquaint you, for the Information of the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, that her Prize has been recaptured by His Majesty's Sloop *Melville*.

SIR, bearing N. by W. dis. 13 or 14 Leagues.

I BEG Leave to inform you, that on the 16th Inst. at half-past Seven, A. M. I had the good Fortune to come up with and captured after a Chace of Twelve

Hours, L'Elizabeth French Privateer Schooner from Guadaloupe, armed with Ten long Sixes and Four Nine Pounder Carronades, and sailed with a Complement of One Hundred and Two Officers and Men, Eleven of which had been sent away in a Prize, the *Cambrian*, from Cork bound to Jamaica, laden with Coals, having parted from the *Fisguard's* Convoy on the 29th of October.

L'Elizabeth has been a great Annoyance to the Trade in this Country, and has often escaped from our Cruizers by her superior sailing; is a fine Vessel, well armed and equipped, and in my Opinion, admirably calculated for His Majesty's Service.

To the KING's Most Excellent Majesty,

The humble Address of the Mayor, Aldermen, and Common-Council of the Borough of King's Lynn, in the County of Norfolk, in Council assembled.

Most Gracious Sovereign,

WE, your Majesty's dutiful Subjects, the Mayor, Aldermen, and Common Council of the Borough of King's Lynn, in the County of Norfolk, humbly tender the renewed Expressions of our Loyalty to your Majesty's sacred Person, and Attachment to your august Family.
