**O**RDERS for the Court's going into Mourning on Thursday next, the 13th Instant, for the late Prince of Denmark, and also for the late Margrave of Anspach, viz.

The Ladies to wear Black Silk, fringed or plain Linen, White Gloves, Necklaces, and Ear-rings, Black or White Shoes, Fans, and Tippetts.

Undrefs—White or Grey Lutestrings, Tabbies, or Damasks.

The Gentlemen to wear Black full-trimmed, fringed or plain Linen, Black Swords and Buckles.

Undrefs—Grey Frocks.

The Court to change the Mourning on Thursday the 20th Instant, viz.

The Ladies to wear Black Silk or Velvet, coloured Ribbons, Fans, and Tippetts; or plain White, or White and Gold, or White and Silver Stuffs, with Black Ribbons.

The Gentlemen to wear Black Coats, and Black or plain White, or White and Gold, or White and Silver Stuff Waistcoats, full-trimmed, coloured Swords and Buckles.

And on Sunday, the 23d Instant, the Court to go out of Mourning.

*Copy of a Letter from Admiral Montagu, Commander in Chief of His Majesty's Ships and Vessels at Portsmouth, to William Marjden, Esq; dated the 9th Instant.*

SIR,

**I** BEG you will be pleased to lay before the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty the inclosed Letter from Lieutenant Sheils, of the Forward Gun-Vessel, acquainting me of his having fallen in

with and captured the Rancune French Lugger Privateer, off Dunnofe.

*His Majesty's Gun-Brig Forward, at Sea, February 7, 1806.*

SIR,

**I** BEG Leave to inform you, that, at Three A. M. Dunnofe bearing N. E. by E. Six or Seven Leagues, we fell in with a French Lugger Privateer, which after a Chace of Half an Hour, and a short Firing, we captured. She proves to be the La Rancune, of Cherbourg, Captain Foliot; out of Cherbourg Twelve Hours, but had taken nothing. She is pierced for Twelve Guns, had only Four mounted, with Swivels and small Arms. Two of the Enemy are wounded, one dangerously.
