WE, your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Mayor, Recorder, Burgesses, and Commonalty of the Borough of Thetford, in your Counties of Norfolk and Suffolk, in Common-Hall assembled, most humbly beg Leave to approach the Throne with our most grateful Acknowledgements and Congratulations upon the recent Instance of your Majesty's paternal Attention to the Interest and Welfare of your Dominions, in having summoned to your Majesty's Councils, at this momentous Period, such an Union of elevated Rank and distinguished Talents, as could alone afford the consolatory Hope of a favourable and secure Termination of that perilous Contest in which we have been so long involved.
