THE following Address having been transmitted to the Right Honourable Earl Spencer, His Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for the Home Department, has been by his Lordship presented to the King; which Address His Majesty was pleased to receive very graciously:

To the KING's Most Excellent Majesty.

Most Gracious Sovereign,

WE, your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, Magistrates, Clergy, Merchants, and other Inhabitants of the Borough of Great Yarmouth, in the County of Norfolk, fully impressed with a Sense of Duty and Gratitude, beg Leave to acknowledge your Majesty's paternal Attention to the Interest and Welfare of your People, in deeming it expedient, at this momentous Crisis, to call to your Majesty's Councils certain great and distinguished Characters, whose Measures, we hope and trust, will be guided by that same Spirit and Zeal which have tended to the Peace and Tranquillity of your Majesty's Reign, and the Consternation and Dismay of our lawless and imperious Foe.

At the same Time that we thus address your Majesty, permit us sincerely to deplore, in common with the Majority of the Nation, the recent Loss your Majesty has sustained by the much lamented Death of that faithful Minister, whose unfulfilled Integrity, firm Patriotism, and transcendent Talents, in a peculiar Manner marked him as the Champion and Defender of the Religion, Liberties, and Constitution of this Empire; allow us, august Monarch, in the most solemn Manner, to assure you of our Veneration for your sacred Person, of our Admiration of your truly christian and kingly Virtues, as also to promise your Majesty every Assistance in our Power for the Prosecution of the severe Contest in which we have been so long engaged, and for the due Maintenance and Preservation of our most invaluable Constitution, universally acknowledged as

the noblest Monument, and the firmest Bulwark, of Civilization.

WHEREAS it has been humbly represented to the King, that Lieutenant George Rutherford stands charged with the Murder of Three of the Seamen of His Majesty's Ship the Trident, at Butcher Island, near Bombay, in the East Indies, on the 31st of March and 1st of April 1801, which said Three Seamen are stated to have died through excessive Punishment inflicted on them by order of the said Lieutenant George Rutherford, then Acting Captain of the said Ship Trident; and whereas the said Lieutenant George Rutherford, did, on the Evening of Wednesday the 12th Day of March instant, jump overboard from His Majesty's Ship the Salvadore del Mundo, lying at Plymouth, and is supposed to have effected his Escape;

His Majesty, for the better apprehending and bringing to Justice the said Lieutenant George Rutherford, is hereby pleased to require and command all His loving Subjects to discover and apprehend the said Lieutenant George Rutherford, and to carry him before some of His Majesty's Justices of the Peace, or Chief Magistrate of the County, Town, or Place where he shall be apprehended, who are respectively required to secure him, and to give Notice thereof to one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, to the End he may be forthcoming and may be dealt withal and proceeded against according to Law.

And, as a further Encouragement His Majesty is hereby pleased to offer a Reward of TWO HUNDRED POUNDS to any Person who shall discover and apprehend the said Lieutenant George Rutherford, to be paid by the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury. SPENCER.

Lieutenant George Rutherford is about Forty Years of Age, upwards of Five Feet Ten Inches high, of a dark swarthy Complexion, slender Person, but well made, and of a long thin Face, with dark Eyes and Black Eyebrows.
