Naples, Jan. 21.

**O**ur Viceroy the Marquis *de los Velez* is preparing to leave this Government; he has caused most of his Baggage to be put on board two Ships of *Genova*, which he has hired to carry it to *Spain*; his Excellency as we understand, designs several rich Presents for the King, and among others, a great many fine Horses. We do not yet know who is to be his Excellencies Successor. The reports that were spread abroad about the preparations of the Turks, in order to some design upon this Kingdom, prove as groundless as those others of this kind we have been so frequently troubled with.

*Venice, Jan. 27.* We have Letters from *Rome* which give an account of the arrival of the Cardinal *d' Estree*, and of his having had a long Audience of the Pope, but without being able to make any judgment of the success he is like to have in his Negotiation concerning the differences now depending about the Regality. Most people are of opinion that it will prove a work of great difficulty, and that the Pope will hardly be prevailed with to recede from any thing he has done in this Affair. The same Letters inform us, that Cardinal *Nivard*, formerly Confessor to the Queen-Mother of *Spain*, dyed the first Instant, and that by his death there are 27 places void in the Colledge of Cardinals. On Tuesday last Signior *Delfino*, Procurator of *St. Mark*, made his publick Entry with a great deal of Solemnity. From *Constantinople* we have Advice, that the Troops which the Grand Signior had Commanded to repair to his Army from *Alsace*, were arrived in *Walachia*; that it was reported that the Grand Signior would himself go into the Field, to give the greater terror to his Enemies.

*Genova, Feb. 5.* The continuance of the strong Northerly Winds is the reason our Convoys does not arrive. The Dutch men of War and Merchants Ships that are here, will Sail in few days for *Smirna*. All the *Genouese* Ships take new Passes from the French King, and bear his Colours, which they believe will secure them against the Algerines, who have Peace with *France*.

*Turin, Jan. 27.* We are informed that our Duke has caused it to be intimated to such of the Nobility and other persons of quality as have any relation to his Court; that he expects their attendance when he goes to *Portugal* to Marry with the Infanta, but that he will not oblige them to remain there.

*Warsaw, Jan. 30.* The Dyet has been Assembled fifteen days, and six weeks is the constant term

of their Session, so that we may expect they will now begin to bring some of the Matters before them to a conclusion, the most important of them, concerning the Measures that are to be taken with relation to the Turks, has been warmly debated; especially in the Chamber of the Senators, who are not all of one mind, some zealously promoting a War, at a time that they may have their advantage of joining their Armies with those of the Czar of *Moscow*, whose Forces alone are no ways inferior to those of the Grand Signior; while others think it the Interest of this Republick to prefer the Peace it now enjoys, and not to engage it self in an Offensive War, of which the issue is uncertain. There has been likewise some debate among the Senators concerning the Marriage of Prince *Louis*, the Elector of *Brandenburg's* Son with the Princess *Radzeville*, which some of them are very much displeas'd at. The Letters we receive from the Frontiers continue to speak of the great preparations of the Turks.

*Copenhagen, Feb. 3.* Our King is going to raise several new Regiments, and resolves to have a Squadron of Capital Ships at Sea the next Summer. He has by a Placacet which was published two days since, given leave to the Seamen, that are not at present in his Service, to put themselves into that of any Foreign Prince, upon condition, that in time of War they quit the same, and return into His Majesties Service.

*Lintz, Feb. 5.* The Marquis *de Sepeville*, Envoye Extraordinary from the French King, has, as we are informed, assured the Emperor and his Ministers; that the King his Master will punctually observe the Treaties of *Westphalia* and *Nimeguen*. However, the Emperor continues his Resolution of increasing his Forces, and has commanded the States of *Tirol* to raise six thousand Men. Count *Lobcowitz*; the Emperors late Envoye at the Court of *Bavaria* is returned hither, and we are assured, that that Elector is resolv'd firmly to unite himself to the Interests of the Empire. The Emperor goes to *Oettingen* about the end of this Month, to perform his Devotions, and the Elector of *Bavaria* will meet him there.

*Parisbonne, Feb. 7.* The last week the Bishop of *Aichstadt* the Emperors Commissioner acquainted the Dyet, that his Imperial Majesty having received Advice that the Turks were preparing to bring very great Armies into the Field the next Summer, and that it was not known against whom they would be employed, had Commanded him to communicate the same to the Dyet, and to leave it to their consideration, whether in a Conjunction like this, wherein, besides the jealousy they may justly have of the Ottoman Designs; and others they may likewise have apprehensions of, it will not be necessary

necessary to raise a certain number of Forces, to be employed as there may be occasion for the Defence of the Empire, to ascertain the said number, to adjust the proportion to be raised by each Circle, to provide common Funds for their maintenance, to agree the Summ that each Circle is to contribute thereunto, &c. upon which points the States have deliberated, but have not yet taken any Resolution, and its believed they will not be very hasty in it.

*Strasbourg, Feb. 11.* The Baron de Monclar has not yet begun his journey for France; he has lately reinforced the Garrison of *Fribourg*, upon a report that some Troops were drawing together in *Suabia*. We are informed that the French King has given Orders for the raising 15000 Germans, which some think, is chiefly done to hinder the Levies which the Emperor is making. We are likewise told, that the Sovereign Chamber of *Meiz* has caused all the Lands and Revenues belonging to the Prince of *Swarzenburg* (who is one of the Emperors chief Ministers) in *Lorraine*, and other of the French Conquests within their Jurisdiction, to be confiscated, because of his refusing to do Homage, which is the case of several other Princes, who its hoped will be relieved by the Commissioners that are to meet on the part of the Emperor and the said King.

*Cologne, Feb. 14.* The Process against the Burger-masters, of which mention has been so often made, is not yet finished, nor can we tell when it will; and in the mean time we are told that the Emperor does approve of our Proceedings. Many people seem to expect great Matters from the Conferences that are going to be held between the Imperial and French Commissioners, and we wish they may not be disappointed, though we have reason to fear they will; seeing we do not find that the French Officers in *Alsace* and *Lorraine*, upon all the Complaints that have been made by the Emperors Minister at the French Court, do in the least alter their manner of Proceeding.

*Hamburg, Feb. 14.* It was hoped that the Matters in difference between the King of Spain and the Elector of *Brandenburg*, would ere this, have been Accommodated; but our Letters from *Berlin*, tell us, That the Elector had fixed the day, which is the 20th of this Month, New Stile, for exposing to Sale the Goods taken in the Spanish Ship, which it is feared will serve to encrease the misunderstanding that is so unhappily risen between the Catholic King, and his Electoral Highness. All our Letters from *Denmark* say, That the King is Arming by Sea and Land, but none tell us the design of it; in the mean time many People entertain themselves with many Conjectures, of which the most probable seems to be, That the King of *Denmark* is resolved to keep constantly such an Army on Foot, and such a Squadron of Ships at Sea, as may bear proportion with his Neighbours Forces. From *Witstow* they write, That there has been great Contentions among the Senators, concerning a War against the *Turks*, and that it could not yet be known how it would be determined, many and very plausible Arguments having been used for and against it.

*Amsterdam, Feb. 21.* Our Magistrates presented the Prince and Princess of *Orange* when they were last here, with a Christal Watch, a very rich Collar of

Pearl, a fine Cabinet, and a Basin and Ewer of Gold. Yesterday the Spanish Consul, with some of the Deputies of the Admiralty, were to view the ten men of War that are building here for the service of the King of Spain.

*Brague, Feb. 21.* The Prince of *Orange* having obtained the Reversion of the Government of the *Ommelands*, which is part of the Province of *Groningen*, and whereof Prince *Casimir of Nassau*, Stadtholder of *Friesland*, is at present Governor; some difference has arisen between them concerning the making a great Bailly of *Drenthe*, which is a dependance of the *Ommelands*, which Commissioners are appointed to compose. The States of *Holland* had thoughts of Adjourning to morrow, but the Affairs that are before them will keep them together till the middle of the next week. In the mean time the Deputies of the Admiralties are gone home, and will not return hither till the next meeting of the States, which will be in *March*.

*Falmouth, Feb. 10.* Here is arrived the *Yarmouth of Yarmouth*, *Thomas Prophet* Master from *Lisbon*, they came from thence about 18 days ago, in company of fifteen Sail more, English and Dutch, from whom they parted about three days before they came in here. The *Mary of Dublin* arrived here two days since in 18 days from *Cadix*, she came without Convoy, and reports that the Plague continues very hot at *Port St Maries*.

*Plymouth, Feb. 11.* On Tuesday last sailed from hence His Majesties Ship the *Antelope* to the Eastward.

*Whitehal, Feb. 16.* His Majesty has been pleased to make Sir *Creswell Levens*, his late Attorney-General, one of the Judges of the *Common-Pleas*, in the room of Sir *William Ellis* deceased; and to confer the place of his Attorney-General, upon Sir *Robert Sawyer*, who was accordingly sworn on Monday last.
