The respectful, loyal, and dutiful Address of the Freeholders of the County of Middlefex, affembled at their County Meeting.

SIRE,

WE, your Majefty's moft loyal Subjects, the Free-holders of the County of Middlefex, affembled at a County Meeting, humbly approach your Ma-jefty, with Sentiments of unfhaken Fidelity and Attachment to your Majefty's Perlon, Family, and Government.

We beg Leave to affure your Majefty, that no Difficulties or Dangers which the unfortunate Situation of the prefent Period may compel us to undergo can ever shake our Attachment to your Majefty's facred Perfon, and to those Principles which eftablished your Majesty's illustrious Family on the Throne of thefe Kingdoms.

In the prefent very arduous Crifis of public Affairs, we cannot refrain from prefuming to offer to your Majefly, our fincere Thanks and Congratulations on your Majefty's gracious Attention to the Interests and Wishes of your People, by felecting fuch Men to the Administration of the Executive Power, on whofe Talents, Integrity, and Wildom, we can confidently rely for the adoption of fuch a System of Vigour, Moderation, and Economy as may tend to preferve and strengthen our National Security, and may best establish the Honor and Dignity of your Majefty's Crown, in fecuring the Happinels and Liberties of your People. From the very high and diftinguished Characters

of those who are now entrusted by your Majesty with the Admini<sup>4</sup>ration of public Affairs, we have the most perfect Confidence, that by a Reformation of all public Abufe, a judicious Application of our Refources, and a firm and dignified Conduct towards Foreign Powers, this Nation will fpeedily regain the eminent Station which its Opulence, Power, and Industry have fo justly entitled it to claim and expect among the Powers of the World.

Convinced that the pecuniary Efforts which will be demanded of us, and the extraordinary Exertions we may be called upon to make for the Prefervation of the Empire at this momentous Crifis will not be fo employed by your Majefly's prefent Minifters, as to increase the Perils they are intended to arreft, and to aggrandife that Power which it is the common Interest of all Europe to keep within proper Limits; we affure your Majefty that we shall fub. mit with Cheerfulness to the Burthens and Privations which shall be deemed requisite for obtaining, at the earlieft Period, a fecure and honorable Peace, or if rendered neceffary, by the Obstinacy or Unreafonablels of the Enemy, for profecuting with Energy and Vigour, the War in which your Majefty is unfortunately engaged, until it can be brought to an happy and glorious Conclusion.
