To the KING's Most Excellent Majesty,

The respectful, loyal, and dutiful Address of the Freeholders of the County of Middlesex, assembled at their County Meeting.

S I R E,

WE, your Majesty's most loyal Subjects, the Freeholders of the County of Middlesex, assembled at a County Meeting, humbly approach your Majesty, with Sentiments of unshaken Fidelity and Attachment to your Majesty's Person, Family, and Government.

We beg Leave to assure your Majesty, that no Difficulties or Dangers which the unfortunate Situation of the present Period may compel us to undergo can ever shake our Attachment to your Majesty's sacred Person, and to those Principles which established your Majesty's illustrious Family on the Throne of these Kingdoms.

In the present very arduous Crisis of public Affairs, we cannot refrain from presuming to offer to your Majesty, our sincere Thanks and Congratulations on your Majesty's gracious Attention to the Interests and Wishes of your People, by selecting such Men to the Administration of the Executive Power, on whose Talents, Integrity, and Wisdom, we can confidently rely for the adoption of such a System of Vigour, Moderation, and Economy as may tend to preserve and strengthen our National Security, and may best establish the Honor and Dignity of your Majesty's Crown, in securing the Happiness and Liberties of your People.

From the very high and distinguished Characters of those who are now entrusted by your Majesty with the Administration of public Affairs, we have the most perfect Confidence, that by a Reformation of all public Abuse; a judicious Application of our Resources; and a firm and dignified Conduct towards Foreign Powers, this Nation will speedily regain the eminent Station which its Opulence, Power, and Industry have so justly entitled it to claim and expect among the Powers of the World.

Convinced that the pecuniary Efforts which will be demanded of us, and the extraordinary Exertions we may be called upon to make for the Preservation of the Empire at this momentous Crisis will not be so employed by your Majesty's present Ministers, as to increase the Perils they are intended to arrest, and to aggrandise that Power which it is the common Interest of all Europe to keep within proper Limits; we assure your Majesty that we shall submit with Cheerfulness to the Burthens and Privations which shall be deemed requisite for obtaining, at the earliest Period, a secure and honorable Peace, or if rendered necessary, by the Obstinacy or Unreasonableness of the Enemy, for prosecuting with Energy and Vigour, the War in which your Majesty is unfortunately engaged, until it can be brought to an happy and glorious Conclusion.
