in case they refuse. Cologne, Feb. 21. The Count of Oetingen, who has been at Lintz to give the Emperor an account of feveral Matters he was charged with, is returned within these two days to Dujeldorp, where the Duke of Juliers now is. From Rainbonne they write, that the Emperor had by his Commissioner the Bishop of Aichstadt, proposed to the States Assembled there, the raising a certain number of Forces, to be emplayed for the Defence of the Empire, in case there should be occasion. It was reported that the Bishop of Munster had offered to raise 14 or 15000 Men for the Emperors Service, but at present there is no more faid of it. Hamburg, feb. 21. Here is a discourse as if a Defensive Alliance was Treating between the Elector of Brandenburg and the Princes of Lunenburg, but with what certainty we cannot fay. From Berlin we hear, that the Elector of Saxony was in few days exected at Poltdam, where the Elector of Brandenburgh now is, and that preparations were making for his Reception; and that Prince Louis and his Wife the Princels Radzeville were likewise expect-

ed at Postdam.

Hague, Feb. 25. The States of Holland intended to have Adjourned last Saturday, but some difficulties arising, they will be obliged to continue together till the next week: Among other things they are new modelling the Culloms, refolving to lay a greater Duty upon the Cattle which is brought from Denmark, as well as upon several Commodities that come from Germany; and to lessen the Imposition which is at present upon Goods brought from other pires. The Dutch Minister at Bruffels has acquainted the States, that upon the Instances he has made for the payment of some Arrears due to the States, the Prince of Parma had undertaken, that they
