WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the present Session of Parliament, intituled "An Act for making additional and further Provision for the effectual Performance of Quarantine;" it is enacted that the Consuls and Vice Consuls of His Majesty, His Heirs and Successors, shall be, and are thereby, empowered to administer Oaths in all Cases respecting Quarantine, in like Manner as if they were Magistrates of the several Towns or Places where they respectively reside: And whereas it hath been represented to His Majesty that considerable Difficulties are experienced by the Merchants, Importers of Goods from Russia, in respect to making the Declarations on Oath, before a Magistrate of any Ports or Places in that Kingdom, required by Section 41 of His Majesty's Order in Council of Fifth of April One thousand eight hundred and five, to ascertain whether certain Goods, Wares, and Merchandizes, enumerated in the First Class of His Majesty's said Order in Council, imported in any Ships coming from any Port in Europe, without the Streights of Gibraltar, or on the Continent of America, are, or are not, the Growth, Produce, or Manufacture of Turkey, or of any Place in Africa within the Streights of Gibraltar, or in the West Barbary, on the Atlantic Ocean: And the like Difficulty occurs in respect to the special Declarations required by his Majesty's Order in Council, dated the Fifteenth of August last, in respect to any Rags imported into this Kingdom: And whereas similar Difficulties may occur touching the Trade from other Ports in Europe without the Streights of Gibraltar, or on the Continent of America; His Majesty, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, is thereupon pleased to order, (and it is hereby ordered,) That if the Master, or other Per-

son having Charge of any Ship or Vessel coming from any Port or Place at which there is no regular Establishment of Quarantine, declared sufficient by His Majesty in Council, shall bring with him a Declaration on Oath, made by the Owner, Proprietor, Shipper, or Consignee of such Ship or Vessel, or of the Goods, Wares, and Merchandizes enumerated as aforesaid, on board thereof respectively, before the British Consul or Vice-Consul residing at or near such Port or Place, to the same Purport and Effect as the Declaration required by the said recited Section of the said Order of His Majesty in Council of the Fifth of April One thousand eight hundred and five, to be made before some Magistrate of the Port or Place from whence such Goods, Wares, and Merchandizes have been brought; or to the same Purport and Effect as the special Declaration required by His Majesty's above-recited Order of the Fifteenth of August last concerning Rags; such Declaration or Declarations, made before and attested by such British Consul or Vice-Consul, shall have the like Force and Effect, to all Intents and Purposes, as the Declaration and Certificate required by Section 42 of His Majesty's said Order in Council of the Fifth of April One thousand eight hundred and five, or by His Majesty's above-recited Order in Council of the Fifteenth Day of August last:— And the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, and the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, are to give the necessary Directions herein as to them may respectively appertain.

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the present Session of Parliament, intituled "An Act for making additional and further Provisions for

“the effectual Performance of Quarantine,” it is, amongst other Things, enacted, That it shall and may be lawful to and for His Majesty, His Heirs or Successors, by His or Their Order or Orders in Council, notified by Proclamation, or published in the London Gazette, to prohibit all Persons, Ships, Boats, and Vessels whatsoever from going, under any Pretence whatsoever, within the Limits of any Station which, by His Majesty, His Heirs or Successors, by any such Order or Orders in Council, has been, or may be assigned for the Performance of Quarantine, by any Ships or Vessels without Clean Bills of Health; and that if any Person whatsoever, after such Notification or Publication of any such Order or Orders in Council, shall presume, under any Pretence whatsoever, to go with any Ship, Boat, or Vessel within the Limits of any such Station, he or she shall, for every such Offence, forfeit and pay the Sum of Five Hundred Pounds.

And whereas by His Majesty's Order in Council, bearing Date the Fifth of April One thousand eight hundred and five, it is directed that all Ships of War, Transports, and other Ships in the actual Service of Government, under the Command of Commissioned Officers of His Majesty's Navy, coming from any of the Places mentioned in the said Order, and not being provided with clean Bills of Health, shall perform Quarantine at the Motherbank, in a separate and distinct Place, to be appointed and marked out with Yellow Buoys for that Purpose; which Place has been appointed and marked out with Yellow Buoys accordingly.

His Majesty, in Pursuance of the Powers vested in him by the said Act, is pleased, by and with the Advice of his Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, That no Persons, Ships, Vessels, or Boats whatsoever, other than the Vessels or Boats belonging to the Superintendent of Quarantine, or his Assitant, or other Boats regularly employed, under the Authority of the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs, in the Quarantine Service, shall go, under any Pretence whatsoever, within the Limits of the Place so marked out, except in Cases of special Necessity and Emergency, and with Permission first had and obtained from the Superintendent of Quarantine at the Motherbank, or his Assitant.

And it is hereby further ordered, That all Ships and Vessels being furnished with clean Bills of Health, and Boats liable to Quarantine, which may be ordered to perform the same at the Motherbank, shall come to Anchor within the Compass of the said Yellow Buoys, in such Place, or Places, as shall be directed by the Superintendent of Quarantine, or his Assitant, and shall be kept separate and apart from His Majesty's Ships of War, Transports, and Vessels in the Service of Government, and not having Clean Bills of Health, which may be performing Quarantine as aforesaid, within the Compass of

the said Yellow Buoys:—And the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, and the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, are to give the necessary Directions herein, as to them may respectively appertain.

The Speech of the Lords Commissioners to both Houses of Parliament, on Wednesday, July 23, 1806.

My Lords, and Gentlemen,

HIS Majesty has commanded us to acquaint you, that the State of the Public Business enables His Majesty to close this Session of Parliament.

We are, at the same Time directed to express to you the great Satisfaction which His Majesty has derived from your unremitting Zeal and Diligence, and from that Attention to the most important Interests of His Empire, which has been so conspicuously manifested in all your Proceedings.

The Measures which have been adopted for the permanent Improvement of the various Branches of our Military System, your Attention to combine these Arrangements with the great Object of public Economy, and the Regulations which you have established for the speedy and effectual Audit of the Public Accounts, call for His Majesty's particular Acknowledgments.

Gentlemen of the House of Commons,

We have it in Command from His Majesty to thank you for the Provision which you have made for the various Exigencies of the public Service, particularly by raising, within the Year, so very large a Proportion of the necessary Supplies; a Measure in itself highly advantageous, and which must create, both at Home and Abroad, the most favourable Impression of our National Resources, and of the Spirit which animates the British People. You may be assured that the utmost Attention shall be paid to the frugal Administration of those Supplies which you have so liberally granted.

His Majesty is particularly sensible of the fresh Proof He has received of your affectionate Attachment to Him, in the Provision which you have made for enabling the younger Branches of His Royal Family to meet the necessary Expences of their Station.

My Lords, and Gentlemen,

His Majesty, being always anxious for the Restoration of Peace on just and honorable Terms, is engaged in Discussions with a View to the Accomplishment of this most desirable End. Their Success must depend on a corresponding Disposition on the Part of the Enemy; and in every Event His Majesty looks with the fullest Confidence to the Continuance of that Union and public Spirit among all



Ranks of His People, which can alone give Energy to War or Security to Peace.
