SIR,

I HAVE the Honor to transmit Copy of a Letter to Commodore Sir Home Popham, at the Cape of Good Hope, acquainting him with the Capture of the Spanish Ship of War Neutra Senora de los Dolores, alias La Reparadora.

Adamant, in False Bay, Cape of Good Hope, May 26, 1806.

SIR,

I HAVE the Honor to inform you of the Arrival of His Majesty's Ship under my Command, at this Anchorage, with the Victuallers named in the Margin*, accompanied by the Spanish Ship Nuestra Senora de los Dolores, alias La Reparadora, of Thirty Guns; (Twelve and Twenty-four-Pounders,) and Three Hundred and Fifteen Men, commanded by Stanislaus Comaud, an Officer in the Spanish Navy. We fell in with, and captured her on the 6th Instant, in Lat. 30 Deg. 30 Min. S and

Long. 15 Deg. 20 Min W. She had been out a Month from Monte Video, in the Rio de la Piata, and had taken nothing. I have great Satisfaction in announcing the Capture of this Ship to you, as from her Magnitude and Force, she might have done much Mischief to the Trade on the Coast of Africa; her Crew are a desperate set of French, Spaniards, Portuguese, and Americans, the principal Officers French: She had Authority from the Vice-Roy to wear the Colours of the King of Spain, and had a Company of Spanish Infantry on board. She is a strong well built Vessel, about Four Years old, coppered, and copper fastened, and is, in my Opinion, well calculated for His Majesty's Service.

Copy of another Letter from Captain Stiles, of His Majesty's Ship Adamant, to William Marsden, Esq; dated at St. Helena, June 25, 1806.

SIR,

FOUR Days before I parted with the East India Convoy, I fell in with and captured a Spanish Ship of War of Thirty Guns and Three Hundred and Fifteen Men; the Particulars of which I beg Leave to inclose in a Letter No. 1. I arrived in Table Bay, with the Victuallers, on the 20th of May; and, having seen them in Safety without anchoring myself, I immediately proceeded to Sea on my Return to St. Helena, according to their Lordships' Orders; but meeting with a most violent Gale of Wind from the N. W., and being very short of Water, (having been Three Months from England without touching at any Place, with Three Hundred and Fifteen Prisoners,) both my Main-top-sail Yards carried away, and my People very much afflicted with the Scurvy, I thought myself justified in bearing up for Simon's Bay for Refreshments. The French Admiral Willeaumez, with Six Sail of the Line, was in these Seas about Six Weeks ago: his Intention was to have gone to the Cape; but hearing it was in our Possession he was obliged to go to Fernand de Noronha for Water, and has not since been heard of. The Cannonier French Frigate, (late His Majesty's Ship Minerve,) put into False Bay about the 1st of May, not knowing the Cape was in our Hands, and sent her Boat on Shore with a Lieutenant, who, with his Crew, are Prisoners on board this Ship. As there was no Man of War in either Table or False Bay, and as she did not quite fetch into the proper Anchorage, she got away, and it is supposed she is gone to the Isle of France, where the Piedmontese is lying blocked up by the Russel, Lord Duncan, and Piche.

Office of the Commissioners for investigating the Debts of the late Nabobs of the Carnatic, No. 3, Cannon-Row, Westminster, August 2, 1806.

THE Commissioners acting in execution of an Agreement between the East India Company and the Creditors of the late Nabobs of the Carnatic, think it proper to give this public Notice to all Persons whom it may concern, that an Act of Parliament is passed, the 46th George III. Cap. 133. to enable the Commissioners the better to carry the Agreement into effect; and that its principal Enactments are the following, viz.

The Commissioners are to be sworn to the faithful Execution of the Powers and Trusts vested in them by the Deed of Agreement.

They are authorized to examine all Persons, whether Parties or Witnesses, upon Oath; and it is declared lawful for them, as well as for all Courts, Judges, Masters in Chancery, Magistrates, Justices of the Peace, and all Persons authorized by any Court of Record to take Affidavits, to administer an Oath to any Person making an Affidavit or Deposition in Writing, touching any Matter referred to the Commissioners, or relating to the Execution of the Trust reposed in them; and in case any Person in such Examination upon Oath, or in any such Affidavit so sworn, shall wilfully and corruptly give false Evidence, or make any false Answer, Statement, or Deposition, every Person so offending is declared subject to the Pains and Penalties of wilful and corrupt Perjury.

The Commissioners are authorized, if they shall see fit, (either of their own Accord, or at the Instance of the Company, or of any Person having an Interest to support or oppose any of the Claims,) to summon by their Precept any Person to attend them, and to require the Production of Books, Deeds, Papers, Accounts, or Writings; and if any Person shall abscond, or wilfully avoid being summoned by the Precept, or after being summoned shall wilfully neglect to appear before the Commissioners, or to produce the Accounts or Writings in their Possession that have been required, or shall re-

fuse to be sworn, or being sworn shall refuse to answer the Questions of the Commissioners, it is declared lawful for the Commissioners to issue their Warrant for committing every such Person to Prison, there to remain, without Bail or Mainprize, until he shall submit to be sworn and examined, or to make the Production required.

It is provided, that no Person resident in the United Kingdom shall be compelled, by virtue of this Act, to go and appear before the Commissioners in India, nor any Person resident in India to come and appear before the Commissioners in England.

And it is provided, that no Persons shall be compelled to appear before the Commissioners, unless, at the Service of the Precept, or within a reasonable Time before the Day appointed for Attendance, the probable Amount of his Expences, and a reasonable Compensation for his Loss of Time, shall be tendered to him.

Every Person who attends the Commissioners shall be entitled to this Reimbursement, payable by those at whose Instance the Precept was issued.

The Commissioners are authorized, at the Request of any Person entitled to Reimbursement, to settle the Amount, and to make an Order, fixing a Time and Place, for those liable in the Payment to discharge it; and the Person shall still be at Liberty to make his Election either to accept of the Amount ordered by the Commissioners, or to proceed for the Recovery of his Expences and reasonable Compensation by Action at Law, it being declared, that in case of his accepting the Sum so ordered, if Payment is not made, he shall recover that specific Sum, together with double Costs of Suit.
