Art. IX. The Coaffing Veffels in the River will be given up to their Owners, according to a Proclamation iffued the 30th Ult.

Art. X. All Public Property of every Defcrip-tion belonging to the Enemies of His Britannic Majetty shall be faithfully delivered up to the Captors; and as the Commanders in Chief bind themselves to fee the Fulfilment of all the preceding Articles for the Benefit of South America, fo do the Cabildo and Magistrates bind themfelves to fee that this last Article is faithfully and honorably complied with.

## Extract of a Letter from Major-General Beresford to the Right Honorable Lord Caflereagh, dated Fort of Buenos Ayres, 11th July 1806.

TRUST the Conduct adopted towards the People here has had its full Effect, in impreffing upon their Minds the Honor, Generofity, and Humanity of the British Character His Maje Ay's Minifters will fee by the Detail of our Proceedings that, after the Army had paffed the Rio Chuelo, the City of Buenos Avres remained at our Mercy, and that, in fact, the only Conditions on which I entered were fuch as I pleafed to offer, and which Humanity and a Regard to our national Character would naturally induce me to give under any Circumstances. How-ever, to quiet the Minds of the Inhabitants, we not only confented to put in Writing my Promifes, but acceded to many Conditions not expected by them ; and, contrary to direct Stipulation, gave up to the Proprietors all the Coalling Veffels captured, with their Cargoes, and of which I annex a Return#, and the Value of which amounted to One Million and a Half of Dollars, and, which being done with the Views already exposed, will, I truft, meet with His Majelty's Approbation.

I have the Honor to inform His Majefty's Minifters, that I had detached Captain Arbuthnot of the 20th Light Dragoons, on the 3d Inflant, with a Party confifting of feven Dragoons, and Twenty Infantry, (the whole mounted) to a Place called Luxan, Fifty Miles dittant. My principal Object was to have the Country reconnoitred, and to fee what were the Dispositions of the Inhabitants; but with the avowed Object of efforting back fome of the Treasure which had been taken from here, and to prevent its following the Viceroy, which I had Realon to fuspect was intended, though it was faid to be all private Property; and, in which cafe, we had declared, if brought back, it fhould be given to its Owners, if of this City .- Captain Arbuthnot returned last Night; and I am glad to fay with Information of a pleasing Nature ; for your Lordship will fee, by this Detachment passing to easily through the Country, that whatever their prefent Inclina-tions may be, there is no very great Danger from any hostile Intentions against us : and Captain Arbuthnot reports rather favourably of the general Dispositions of the People. The Country to Luxan, as I have already reprefented, in general the whole of it, is a perfect Flat, and the View of the Horizon obstructed by nothing but the immense Herds of Horfes and Cattle-but principally horned Cattle.

Luxan is fituated on a River of the fame Name, and where there is a Bridge over it, and the Route leading to all the interior Provinces, and I rather think it will be advifeable on many Accounts that I possels myself of it, which I can do by a fmall Detachment. Much of the Treafure was caught actually going to Cordova, and the Reft, but for the op-
