THE King has been pleased to cause it to be signified by the Right Honorable Lord Viscount Howick, His Majesty's Principal Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, to the Ministers of Friendly and Neutral Powers resident at this Court, that His Majesty having been pleased, on the 16th of May last, to direct that the necessary Measures should be taken for the Blockade of the Coast, Rivers, and Ports from the River Elbe to the Port of Brest, both inclusive; His Majesty is now pleased to declare, that so much of such Blockade as extended from the River Elbe to the River Ems, both inclusive, is for the present discontinued; and that from the Date hereof, the Navigation of the Coast, Rivers, and Ports from the River Elbe to the River

Ems, both inclusive, is as free as if such Blockade had not taken place.

WHEREAS His Majesty was pleased, by His Order in Council, bearing Date the Fifth Day of April, One thousand eight hundred and five, to direct that the Quarantine laid by His Majesty's Order of the same Date upon all Ships and Vessels, as well His Majesty's Ships of War as all others, not having the Plague or other infectious Disease or Distemper actually on board, coming from or through the Mediterranean, with Clean Bills of Health, should be extended to all Ships and Vessels as aforesaid coming from the Port of Cadiz, or from any other Port of Spain without the Straights of Gibraltar, lying to the Southward of Cape St. Vincent: And whereas there does not at present appear to be any Reason to apprehend that there does exist any unusual or infectious Distemper in any Part of Spain; His Majesty is thereupon pleased, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, to revoke and discharge, and doth hereby revoke and discharge the said Order of the Fifth Day of April, One thousand eight hundred and five; and His Majesty doth hereby order, that all such Ships and Vessels as aforesaid be permitted to discharge their respective Lading without unpacking, opening, and airing, and without performing Quarantine, as freely as they might have done in case such Order of the Fifth Day of April, One thousand eight hundred and five, had not been made; any Thing in the said Order contained to the contrary notwithstanding:—And the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, the Master-General and the rest of the principal Officers of the Ordnance, His Majesty's Secretary at War, and the Governours or Commanders in Chief, for the Time being, of the Isles of Jersey, Guernsey, Alderney, Sark, and Man are to give the necessary Directions herein as to them may respectively appertain.

WHEREAS His Majesty was pleased, by His Order in Council bearing Date the Fifteenth Day of August, One thousand eight hundred and five, pursuant to the Powers vested in His Majesty by the Act passed in the Forty fifth Year of His Majesty's Reign, intituled "An Act for making further Provision for the effectual Performance of Quarantine;" to direct that, upon the Importation of any Rags into any of the Ports of this Kingdom, or of the Islands of Guernsey, Jersey, Alderney, Sark, or Man, whether the Ships in which such Rags should be imported should be subject to Quarantine or not, such Rags should in all Cases (except as hereinafter excepted and provided) be subject to the Performance of special Quarantine, and should be unpacked, opened, and aired on board the Lazaretto in Standgate Creek, or on board Lighters or other proper Vessels at the Out Ports; (as the Case might be,) for the Space of Forty Days before the same should be discharged, unless furnished with a special Declaration, authenticated upon Oath in Form and Manner directed by the said Order: And whereas it has been represented to His Majesty, that the subjecting Rags to such special Quarantine is attended with much Inconvenience to Trade, and there does not at present appear to be any Reason to apprehend that there does exist any unusual or infectious Distemper on the Continent of Europe; His Majesty is thereupon pleased, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, to revoke and discharge, and doth hereby revoke and discharge the said Order of the Fifteenth of August, One thousand eight hundred and five, and the special Regulations respecting the opening and airing of Rags therein contained:—And the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, the Master-General and the rest of the principal Officers of the Ordnance, His Majesty's Secretary at War, and the Governors or Commanders in Chief, for the Time being, of the said Isles of Jersey, Guernsey, Alderney, Sark, and Man; are to give the necessary Directions herein as to them may respectively appertain. *W.
