THIS Corporation having, in Compliance with the Request of a numerous Body of Merchants, Owners, and Masters of Ships, caused a Light-House to be erected on the Promontory of Flamborough Head; Notice is hereby given, that a Triangular Revolving Light will be exhibited in the said Light-House, on Monday the 1st December next, and constantly attended and kept burning every Night, from Sunset to Sunrise, for the Benefit of Navigation.

Masters of Ships are desired to observe, that in order to distinguish this Light from the Revolving Lights of Tinnmouth and Cromer, which shew a Face every Minute, this Light, on Flamborough Head, will exhibit a Face every Two Minutes, and one of them coloured Red; whereby the Light from that Face being diminished, it will not, in hazy Weather, be visible so far or so strong as the other Two Faces; and when in such cases, only Two Faces are seen, the Interval of Time between them will be Two Minutes and Four Minutes alternately, which will sufficiently distinguish this Light from any other in the Kingdom.

Printed Directions for sailing by the Light will be delivered out to the several Masters of Ships, by the Collectors of the Light Duties in London and at the Out-Ports.
