Naples, Feb. I g.

WE have an account from Meffura, that the Gpvernor of Trapani had byan Order he Publifhed for the making of bread fomewhat lighter then it was before; occafoned fo great diflatisfaction among the people, shat it put them into tumults and diforders, in which they pent fo far as to fet upon and imprifon their Magilfrates, and Cevoral Epanifh Officers, and that the Viceroy of ficily having advice thereof, was gone thither with 3000 Men, to bring them back to their Duty.

Venice, March 1. Our Letters from Rome of the 22 paft tell us, that the Pope had caufed an Anfwer to be given to the Cardinal d' Ejtree in swriting, in the matter of the Regality, by which it appeared that the Popg was refolved to maintain the Rights of the Church, and particularly thore, which the Difpute is now about; the LetEers add, that there was a difcourfe as if the Cardinal intended to retura Speedily to France, finding His endeavors to compofe the differences now depending between the two Courts were not like Io bave any cifeet. From Sicily we have advice of fome diforders that bad happened at Trapani, occafion-d by their Governors publifhing an order for the leffening the weight of Bread.

- Mofoow, fan. io. We have from all parts an account of the great preparations of the Turks; and thole that are making here are no ways inferior to theirs; Co that there are like to begreat Armies in the Field this Summer, and its probable they will not be idie. Our Czars Ambalfador to the Crown of Poland parted frum hence the laft week, and we hope they will prove fuccefleful in their Negotiation; They being fully empowered to conclude a Conjunction of forces againf the Otromans, and to make fuch offers as may difpofe the Poles thereunto.
- Lirtz, March 5. The Emperor has given the command of Velt Mariball-Gen ral, and the Prefidenthip of the Council of War to Prince FFerman of Baden, which have been vacant fince the death of General Montecuculi. There are Letters from Hungary, which give us frefh apprehenfions of the defigns of tlre Turks. From Vienne we have an account that the Duke of Lorrain was arrived there. \& Strasburg, March 7. We are at prefent pretty quiet in thofe parts, but know not how long we Thall contipue for ; The French would have us belisve, that nothing will be done on their part to difturbe the Peace we now enjoy, and that all matters that are in difpute, concerning dependencies will be regulated by the Commifioners fhat atf
going to meet on the part of the Emperor and their King; though at the fame time they go on with the Fortifications they are making on the Rhise and ont the suar, and give us by that a d their other proceedings a jult jealoufic of their defigns.

Copenbagen, March 8. Though there has been much talk of late of our kings intending to increafe very confiderably his ltanding Forces, we do not hear that any Commifioms have as yet been giyen out for that purpole. The King will certain. ly take a journey preiently after Eaiter to Gluckr fladt, and from thence to oldenburg, where as we u-derfland fune new Fortifications are making, The King has commanded fix men to be drawn out of Every Cumpany of foct that is quartered here; to ferve on Board the Ships that are now fitting out.

Luxemburg, March in. We are in great perplexity here, occafiontd by the account twe have that Mopfeur ite Bu/ff fell two days fince into this Country with zood Hot'fe, 600 Dragoohs, and fome Foot, and that he has by order of the King his Mafter fized upon Orchimont anfd above zo Villages belonging to ir, qbliging the Spanifh Garrifon that was in Grchiment to retire from thence, and theind habitants there of to fivear Allegiance to the Frnch King; of which our Goversor the Princenf Cbimaty Has fent 'an Officer to Brufjels to give the Prince of Parma an account.

Bruflels, March 14, On Wednefliays laf Morn fieur Curfet, the French Kings Licutenant ac Tournay, came hither to Demand, as is rair, fatisfaction for a late Robbery committed by Spanifh Soldiers upon lome French men who were buying Horfes in this Province; But this is lookt upon as too inconfiderable a Mutter for fuch a Perfon to be employed in, antd therefqre its believed, his Etrand is of greater importance, thongh it is liitherto kept fecret. We do not yet hear of Monfieur Pels letives arrival at Courtray; but in the mean time we have daily complaints of the new pretenfions which the French make upon feveral Places towatds Luxemburg. The French King is changing the Governors of feveral Places in the new Conquefts; and Monficur Montal, now Governor of Cbarleroy, will be removed to Cbarlemont, which will be made of much greater importance than cbarleroy.

Amfterdam, March 14. The difference concerning the Baylyihip of Drezthe, which is a part of the Province of Groningen, is not yet determined. The cale is thus, The Regents of Drenibe fay they always actuffomed to choole their owfi Great Baily; but that durirg the late War, after the taking of Coeverden the States-G. neral mate the. Sciur Ralembuupt Great Baily, which the faid Regents did not then oppofe, for that they would
not diroblige Mr. Eatanbaupt, to whom they had great obligacions; 1 nis place having remained vacant fince his Death, the States-General lately gave it to the Barory de Palant, who going thither to take ${ }^{\text {as }}$ poffelion ; The Regents would not receive hum, being refolved to maineain their right of chooling their Great Baily themelves, in which they are fupported by the States of Frifeland and Groxingen. On the other fidcs, the States-General fecm refolved to maintain their Act, but its hopcd the thing will be compo'ed.

Hague, March 14. The Statcs of Hollavd met on wedneiday laft, but their Affembly not being compleat, they have nor yet entred upon any bufineff of moment: The Prince of Orange is expected here to morrow. We are told that the Spanifh Minitter has prefented a Memorial to the States ${ }^{\text {/Gene- }}$ ral, to acquaint them that the French have feized upon Orchimont and between 30 and 40 Villages in the Province of Luxembur, , on pretence that they are Dopendencies. The Depuries that wire fent to Horne and other Towns in Nortb-Holland, to obtain their concurtence in the matter of th. Cuftomes, fanve fucceeded thercin, fo that now it is only Amjlerdam that diffents, but its not doubted but by his Highneis means that City will be brought to agree with the refl. We are muçh troubled here at our late lofs in the Streights, four rich Ships bound for simiznd with their Convoy commanded by Captain de Leifde having been caft away upon the Coalt of Majorca. We are told that the City of Rotterdam loufes 100000 1. Sterling by this fad accident:
Hagke, March 18. The Prince of Orange returned from Dieren the lath night, and this morning his Highers was in the Affembly of the States of Hol lland. The Prince of Eaf-Frijeland and the Printeff his Mothst, and the Count d' Auvergne are now here. This morning Monficur de Gourville waited upon the Prince, he will part hence in a day or two to the Courts of the Duke of Lunen. burg, whom he intends to accompany to the great Hunting, which is to be about threc weekshence. Don Batibafar de Fuen Mayor the Spapinh Envoye has been as Amfferdam to corfer as is believed with te Magiffiates of 'that City concerning the Ships that are building there for the firvice of the Crown of spain. There is a difcourfe of Uniting the âve Colledges of the Admiralty, to wit, that of Amplerdam, Rofterdam, Nortb-Holland, Zealand and Frixeland, in one, which its intended fhall conflantly refide here, as does ths Conncil of State.

Paris, March 15. The 1 .3th Inftant Count Mans. feldt, the Emperors Minifter at this Court had a private Audience of the King, to whom he compldined that the Trade of the Rhine, was in a manner rained by the Exactions of the French at Hunningen, and defired the Fortifcations that are making there may not be gone ou with, till things are atjufted by the Commifioners that are going to met
Falmouth, March 7. On Saturday laft were feen off of this Harbour three of His Majefties Ftigats whop were cruifing to the Weftward.
Plimouth, March 8. On Sunday laft arrived here Hs Majeftics Ship the Swallow, Captain Fowlen Commauder from cruifing.
