any Ship or Veffel from taking or having on board fuch Quantities of Naval Stores as may be neces-fary for the Use of such Ship or Vessel during the Course of her intended Voyage, or by Licence from the Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, or the Commissioners of the Admiralty for the Time being; nor to the Exportation of the faid feveral Articles to Ireland, or to His Majefty's Yards or Garrisons, or to His Majesty's Colonies or Plantations in America or the West Indies, or to Newfoundland, or to His Majesty's Forts and Settle-ments on the Coast of Africa, or to the Island of St. Helena, or to the British Settlements or Factories in the East Indies: Provided that upon the Exportation of any of the faid Articles for the Purposes of Trade to Ireland, or to His Majesty's Yards and Garrisons, or to His Majesty's Colonies and Plantations in America or the Welt Indies, or to the Island of Newfoundland, or to His Majesty's Forts and Settlements on the Coast of Africa, or to the Island of St. Helena, or to the British Settlements or Factories in the East Indies, the Exporters of fuch Articles do first make Oath of the true Destination of the same to the Places for which they shall be entered outwards, before the Entry of the same shall be made, and do gire full and fufficient Security, by Bond, except as hereinafter excepted,) to the Satisfaction of the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs, to carry the faid Articles to the Places for which they are fo entered outwards, and for the Purposes specified, and none other; and such Bond shall not be cancelled or delivered up until Proof be made to the Satisfaction of the faid Commissioners, by the Production, within a Time to be fixed by the faid Commissioners, and specified in the Bond, of a Certificate or Certificates, in fuch Form and Manner as shall be directed by the faid Commisfioners, shewing that the faid Articles have been all duly landed at the Places for which they were en-tered outwards: But it is His Majefty's Pleafure, nevertheless, that the following Articles, viz. Bar-Iron, White and Tarred Rope, Tallow or Mill Greafe, Tarpaulins for Waggon-Covers, Pitch, Tar, and Turpentine, shall be permitted to be exported, upon Payment of the proper Duties, without Bond being entered into by the Merchant Exporter, to

any of the British Plantations in the West Indies, or

to any of His Majesty's Settlements in South Ame- 1 rica; provided the Merchant Exporter shall first verify, upon Oath, that the Articles so exported are intended for the Use of a particular Plantation or Settlement, to be named in the Entry Outwards, and not for Sale; and that the faid Plantation or Settlement has not before been furnished with any Supply of the faid Articles during the fame Seafon; and provided also that the Exportation of the faid Articles shall, in no Case, exceed the Value of Fifty Pounds Sterling for any given Plantation or Settlement, whether by one or more Shipments within the fame Season: And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, and the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, are to give the neceffary Directions herein as to them may refpec-W. #### PRESENT,

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

THEREAS the French Government has iffued certain Orders, which, in Violation of the Usages of War, purport to prohibit the Commerce of all Neutral Nations with His Majesty's Dominions; and also to prevent such Nations from trading with any other Country in any Articles the Growth, Produce, or Manufacture of His Majesty's Dominious; and whereas the faid Government has also taken upon itself to declare all His Majesty's Dominions to be in a State of Blockade, at a Time when the Fleets of France and her Allies are themselves confined within their own Ports by the superior Valour and Discipline of the British Navy; and whereas such Attempts on the Part of the Enemy would give to His Majesty an unquestionable Right of Retaliation, and would warrant His Majesty in enforcing the same Prohibition of all Commerce with France, which that Power vainly hopes to effect against the Commerce of His Majesty's Subjects, a Prohibition which the Superiority of His Majesty's Naval Forces might enable him to support, by actually investing the Ports and Coasts of the Enemy with numerous Squadrons and Cruizers, fo as to make the Entrance or Approach thereto manifestly dangerous; and whereas His Ma-jesty, though unwilling to follow the Example of His Enemies, by proceeding to an Extremity fo distressing to all Nations not engaged in the War, and carrying on their accustomed Trade, yet feels Himself bound by a due Regard to the just Defence of the Rights and Interests of His People, not to fuffer such Measures to be taken by the Enemy, without taking some Steps on His Part to restrain this Violence, and to retort upon them the Evils of their own Injustice; His Majesty is thereupon pleased, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, to order, and it is hereby ordered, that no Vessel shall be permitted to trade from one Port to another, both which Ports shall belong to or be in the Possession of France or her Allies, or shall be so far under their Controul as that British Wessels may not freely trade thereat; and the Com-

manders of His Majefty's Ships of War and Privateers shall be, and are hereby instructed, to warn every Neutral Vessel coming from any such Port, and destined to another such Port, to discontinue her Voyage, and not to proceed to any such Port; and any Vessel after being so warned, or any Vessel coming from any such Port, after a reasonable Time shall have been afforded for receiving Information of this His Majesty's Order, which shall be found proceeding to another fuch Port, shall be captured and brought in, and, together with her Cargo, shall be condemned as lawful Prize. And His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, and the Judges of the High Court of Admiralty and Courts of Vice-Admiralty, are to take the necessary Measures herein as to them shall respectively ap-W. Copy of a Letter from Vice-Admiral Lord Collingwood. Commander in Chief of His Majefly's Ships and Vessels in the Mediterranean, to William Marsden, Efq; dated on board the Ocean, off Cadiz, the 20th of December 1806.

SIR, INCLOSE to you, to be laid before the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, the Copy of a Letter from Captain Pearle, Commander of His Majesty's Sloop the Haleyon, informing me of his having fallen in with a Ship, a Brig, and Zebeck of the Enemy's Cruizers, on the 13th inft. off Cape St. Martin's; and after an Action, highly creditable to this Officer and his Ship's Company, succeeded in capturing the Spanish Ship the Neptuno dios de los Mares, of Fourteen Guns and Seventy-two Men, the Brig and Zebeck making their Escape after their Fire was filenced.

I am glad of this Opportunity of giving to their Lordships my Testimony of the spirited and skilful Conduct of Captain Pearse in all the Duties on which he is employed. The prefent Instance of his having

attacked and fucceeded against an Enemy so very Inperior, demonstrates what his Ability is when there is Opportunity to exhibit it.

His Majefly's Ship Haleyon, Gibraliar My LORD, Bay, December 18, 1806.

I BEG Leave to inform your Lordship, that onthe 13th Inft. at Eight in the Morning, Cape St. Martin's S. S. W. Six Leagues. I perceived Three Sail standing out from the Land towards me, being on contrary Tacks, we closed fast; when within Four or Five Miles, I discovered they were Vessels of War, (a Ship, a Brig, and a Zebeck,) and shortly after steered directly for me; seeing they were superior, and Five Settees seen from the Tops coming from the same Quarter, I judged it prudent (as they seemed determined to bring me to Action) to close with them as foon as possible, and decide the Contest before any Assistance could be given from the other Five; at half-past Ten (being nearly within Musket-Shot) they hoisted Spanish Colours, and commenced Action; as foon as I got a breaft of the fecond Veffel, I got on the other Tack, and brought them to closer Action, which lasted till Twelve o'Clock, when their Fire slackened; at half-past, being nearly a Calm, the Brig and Zebeck hauled away to the Southward, affifted by their Boats and Sweeps, the Ship then nearest us endeayouring to do the fame to the Northward; we fwept after her, and in an Hour got close alongfide, when the struck her Colours; she proved to be a Spanish Polacre Ship (Privateer), the Neptuno dios de los Mares, of Fourteen Guns and Seventy-two Men, from Denia, going on a Cruize between Minorca and the Coast of Africa, with the other Two in Company; who, I am forry to fay, made their Escape, but not before their Fire had been filenced. The Five Settees, when within Three Miles, feeing the Ship deferted, returned to the Shore, and went anto the Port of Denia. Though extraordinary, I am happy to fay we had none killed, and only Three wounded, Lieutenant Briggs, my First, by a Splinter, in the Arm, whom I beg Leave to recommend to your Lordship's Notice; Lieutenant Pearse, who has been acting Three Years and a Half in this Vessel; and One Seaman. The Loss of the Enemy must be great. The wounded from the Ship are doing well, Nine in all. I give your Lordship the full Particulars of this Event, and trust my attacking so very superior a Force (seeing they were refolutely determined to bring me to Action) will meet your Lordship's Approbation, knowing I could depend upon my Officers and Ship's Company, whose cool, brave and steady Conduct on this, as on former Occasions, almost ensured me Success before the Action commenced-they merit my warmest Acknowledgments.

I cannot omit mentioning my having Four Paffengers, Captain Sullivan, of the Stit Regiment, who commanded the small Arms; Messrs. Purvis, Crokat, and a Neapolitan Messenger, were all of great Service, as we were Sixteen short of Com-plement. The Object of the Enemy's Fire was mostly directed at our Masts and Rigging, in which I am forry to fay we have fuffered very materially.

The Force opposed to the Haleyon was, Neptuno dios de los Mares, Fourteen Twelve Pounders, and Seventy-two Men; La Vergin di Solidad, Fourteen

Twelve and Eight-Pounders, and Seventy-eight, Men; El Vives, Twelve Eight and Six-Pounders, and Sixty-five Men.

W. fell in with, and captured Le Courier, French Cutter Privateer, (formerly His Majesty's Hired Armed Cutter Alert,) pierced for Fourteen Guns, but now mounting Seven, of different Calibres, Forty-two and Twenty-four-Pound Brafs Carronades, and Seventy Men; Four Days from Morlaix, without making a Capture.
