AT the Court at the *Queen's Palace*, the 7th of *January* 1807,

P R E S E N T,

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS, in virtue of Powers vested in His Majesty by an Act passed in the Forty-first Year of His Reign, intituled, "An Act to empower His Majesty to regulate the Trade and Commerce to and from the Isle of Malta until the signing of a Definitive Treaty of Peace, and from thence until Six Weeks after the next Meeting of Parliament, and to declare the Isle of Malta to be a Part of Europe;" His Majesty was pleased by His Order in Council, bearing Date the Thirtieth July, One thousand eight hundred and one, to make certain Regulations for the said Trade and Commerce, which Act, by an Act, passed in the Forty-third Year of His Majesty's Reign, intituled, "An Act to continue several Laws relating to the suspending the Operations of Two Acts, of the Fifteenth and Seventeenth Years of the Reign of His present Majesty, for restraining the Negotiation of Promissory Notes and Bills of Exchange, under a limited Sum, in England; and to the prohibiting the Exportation from, and permitting the Importation to Great Britain, of Corn, and for allowing the Importation of other Articles of Provision, without Payment of Duty, until the Twenty-fifth Day of March, One thousand eight hundred and five; and to the regulating the Trade and Commerce to and from the Isle of Malta, until Six Months after the Ratification of a Definitive Treaty of Peace;" was, after a former Act of Continuance, further continued until Six Months after the Ratification of a Definitive Treaty of Peace; whereupon the said Order was, after former Orders of Continuance, further and lastly continued, by an Order of the Twenty-first December, One thousand eight hundred and three, until Six Months after the Ratification of a Definitive Treaty of Peace, unless His Majesty, with the Advice of His Privy Council,

should think fit otherwise to order and direct; and whereas His Majesty, with the Advice of His Privy Council, has thought fit otherwise to order and direct, His Majesty is, therefore, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, pleased to order, and it is hereby ordered, that the said beforementioned Order, bearing Date the Twenty-first December, One thousand eight hundred and three, be, and the same is hereby revoked and declared void; and in lieu thereof, His Majesty is pleased, by and with the Advice aforesaid, to order, and it is hereby ordered, that from and after the Date hereof, and until Six Months after the Ratification of a Definitive Treaty of Peace, unless His Majesty shall, in the mean time, otherwise order and declare, the Trade and Commerce to and from the Isle of Malta, and the Dependencies thereof, shall and may be carried on in any Ships or Vessels belonging to any of His Majesty's Subjects, owned and navigated according to Law; and in Trading Ships or Vessels belonging to the Subjects of States in Amity with His Majesty, of whatever Burthen, or in whatever Manner navigated; and in any Ship or Vessel belonging to any Person or Persons whatsoever, of whatsoever Description, and howsoever navigated, to which His Majesty may be graciously pleased to grant His Royal Licence or Authority for that Purpose; and the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, and the Lord Lieutenant of Ireland, are to give the necessary Directions herein, as to them may respectively appertain.

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the Forty-sixth Year of His Majesty's Reign, intituled "An Act to enable His Majesty annually to train
