AT the Court at the *Queen's Palace*, the 4th of March 1807,

P R E S E N T,

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS the Island of Curaçoa and its Dependencies have been surrendered and placed under the immediate Protection of His Majesty's Arms, and the Territory and Forts of the same have been delivered up to His Majesty, and the said Island is now in His Majesty's Possession; His Majesty is thereupon pleased to order and declare, and it is hereby ordered and declared, that all His loving Subjects may lawfully trade to and from the said Island of Curaçoa, subject, nevertheless, to the same Duties, Rules, Regulations, Conditions, Restrictions, Penalties, and Forfeitures to which the Trade to and from His Majesty's Colonies, Plantations, and Islands in the West Indies is or shall be subject by Law:

And His Majesty is further pleased to order and declare, and it is hereby ordered and declared, that all Commodities, being of the Growth, Produce, or Manufacture of the said Island of Curaçoa, being in His Majesty's Possession, shall be permitted to be imported into any of the Ports of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland in British Ships, owned by His Majesty's Subjects, and navigated according to Law, subject to the same Duties, Rules, Regulations, Restrictions, Conditions, Penalties, and Forfeitures, as Articles of the like Sort are subject to coming from His Majesty's Colonies, Plantations, or Islands in the West Indies: And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, and the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, are to give the necessary Directions herein as to them may respectively appertain.

THIS Day the Lords being met, a Message was sent to the Honorable House of Commons by Sir Francis Molyneux, Gentleman Usher of the Black Rod, acquainting them, that *The Lords, authorized by virtue of His Majesty's Commission for declaring His Royal Assent to several Acts agreed upon by*

both Houses, do desire the immediate Attendance of the Honorable House in the House of Peers to hear the Commission read; and the Commons being come thither, the said Commission, empowering the Lord Archbishop of Canterbury, the Lord High Chancellor of Great Britain, and several other Lords therein named, to declare and notify the Royal Assent to the said Acts, was read accordingly, and the Royal Assent given to

An Act for further continuing, until the 25th Day of March 1808, certain Bounties and Drawbacks on the Exportation of Sugar from Great Britain, and for suspending the Countervailing Duties and Bounties on Sugar, when the Duties imposed by an Act of the last Session of Parliament shall be suspended.

An Act to continue, until the Twenty-fifth Day of March 1810, an Act of the Forty-fourth Year of His present Majesty, for permitting the Exportation of Salt from the Port of Nassau, in the Island of New Providence, the Port of Exuma, and the Port of Crooked Island, in the Bahama Islands, in Ships belonging to the Inhabitants of the United States of America, and coming in Ballast.

An Act to repeal Part of the Duty on the Importation of unmanufactured Tobacco into Ireland.

An Act for punishing Mutiny and Desertion, and for the better Payment of the Army and their Quarters.

An Act for the Regulation of His Majesty's Royal Marine Forces while on Shore.

An Act for continuing, until the First Day of August 1808, an Act of the Forty-fifth Year of His present Majesty, for allowing, under certain Restrictions, the bringing a limited Quantity of Coals, Culm, or Cinders, to London and Westminster by Inland Navigation.

An Act for enabling the Trustees for executing an Act, passed in the Forty-sixth Year of His present Majesty, intituled "An Act for taking down and rebuilding the Body of the Parish Church of Chertsey, in the County of Surrey, and for repairing the Tower thereof, and building a Vestry-Room near or adjoining to the said Church;" to raise a further Sum of Money for completing the Purposes of the said Act.

An Act for enlarging the Terms and Powers of

Two Acts of the Sixth and Twenty-seventh Years of His present Majesty, for repairing and widening the Road from Muckley Corner to Walfall and Wednesbury, and to Leigh Brook and Ocker Hill, and several other Roads in the County of Stafford, so far as the same relate to the Two First Districts of Road therein comprised.

An Act for continuing the Term, and altering and enlarging the Powers of an Act, passed in the Thirty-second Year of His present Majesty, for repairing and improving the Road from the Town of Chapel-en-le-frith, to or near to Euterclough Bridge, in the County of Derby, and other Roads therein-mentioned in the said County, and in the County Palatine of Chester.

Copy of a Letter from Rear-Admiral Sir Edward Pellew, Bart. Commander in Chief of His Majesty's Ships and Vessels in the East Indies, to William Marsden, Esq; dated on board the Culloden, in Madras Roads, the 29th August 1805.

SIR,

THE inclosed Letters from Captains Plampin and Lord George Stuart will convey to their Lordships, Intelligence of the Capture of La Bellone, La Henriette, and Isle de France, Privateers from the Mauritius.

I reflect with much Pleasure on the Capture of La Bellone in particular, as well from her superior Sailing, as her uncommon Success in the present and preceding War against the British Commerce in the Indian and European Seas. The commercial Interests of this Country are particularly secured by her Capture, which could not have been expected but under very favourable Circumstances.

His Majesty's Ship Powerful, Buck-Bay,

SIR, Trincomalee, 16th July, 1806.

I HAVE the Honour to inform you, that on Wednesday the 9th Instant, being at Anchor in this Bay, I received Information, by a Ship from Colombo, that La Bellone Privateer had returned to her old cruising Ground, off Dondra Head; in consequence of which I instantly put to Sea, and sent Directions to Captain Bakard, of the Rattlesnake, (who was in the Inner Harbour, taking in the Iron Ballast of the Sheerness, agreeably to your Orders,) to follow, and join me off the Baffles, which he did the next Morning at Daylight. My Intention was, if possible, to beat up as far as Tengall, into which Place La Bellone had chased the Ship above mentioned; but on Saturday Morning, being to the Southward of the Great Baffles, I found so much Wind, and such a heavy Sea, that the crippled State of my Masts obliged me to bear up

and run for the Little Baffles, intending to keep close in Shore under their Lee. The Morning being very thick, the Rattlesnake had fortunately separated in the Afternoon; about a Quarter past Three, being about Seven Miles to the Northward of the Little Baffles, a Ship was discovered on our Weather Beam, steering free, with Steering Sails set; we were soon convinced it was La Bellone, and very shortly after we had the Pleasure to see the Rattlesnake broad on his Weather-Quarter, so that he could not haul his Wind from us, without being forced to Action by her, he therefore preferred the Chance of crossing between us and the Shore, having at that Time a strong Land Wind, and we lying nearly becalmed; in this hope he was deceived, and was by Five o'Clock within Gun-shot of us, at which Time he hoisted his Colours, and fired a Broadside at us, and continued a running Fire until a Quarter before Seven, at which Time, finding there was no possibility of getting from us, he struck his Colours and brought to.

I am sorry to add, we had Two Men killed and Eleven wounded; the Enemy acknowledge only One killed, and Six or Seven wounded.

His Majesty's Ship Powerful, Buck-Bay, Trincomalee, June 15, 1806.

SIR,

I HAVE the Honour to inform that, pursuant to your Orders, I left Madras Roads early on the 4th Instant, and arrived at this Anchorage in the Forenoon of the 11th. Having received Intelligence that the Privateer, whose Description you favoured me with, had been seen but a few Days since in the Neighbourhood of Batecato; I put to sea again in the Afternoon, and being close in with the Land, a-bread of Friars Hood, the following Evening, I continued standing to the Southward, under easy Sail, all Night; at Day-Break of the 13th, we discovered a Ship on the Lee Quarter, with the Courses-up, on the opposite Tack, and had soon the Pleasure to be convinced, by her Appearance and Manœuvres, that it was the Ship we were in Search of. After a Chace of Eleven Hours, during the last Hour of which she continued firing her Stern-Chaces over us, (happily without Effect,) the Enemy struck his Colours, and brought to. The Ship proved to be La Henriette, mounting Twenty Guns, Four Twelve-Pounder Carronades, Two Nine Pounders, and Fourteen Six-Pounders, (Four of the latter were hove over during the Chace,) having on board One Hundred and Twenty-four Men, including Officers. She sailed from the Isle of France on the 7th of April.

I HAVE the Honour to inform you, after having spoke His Majesty's Ship Psyche, and delivered your Orders to Captain Wooldridge for his further Proceedings, on my Return to join you, I fell in with and captured, on the 8th Instant, (after a

Chace of Five Hours,) the French Brig Privateer L'Isle de France, mounting Six Twelve-Pounder Carronades and Two long Brass Nines, (the former of which she hove overboard during the Chace,) manned with Seventy-one Men, and had only been out Twenty-four Hours from Port N. W. She is a very fine Vessel, almost new, Copper-bottomed, and well found in every Thing (bound to India).

Extract of a Letter from Captain Christopher Cole to Rear Admiral Sir E. Pellew, Bart. Commander in Chief, &c. &c. dated His Majesty's Ship Culloden, at Sea, September 25, 1806.

I HAVE the Honour to report to you the Capture of L'Emilien Ship Corvette, of Eighteen Guns and One Hundred and Fifty Men, by His Majesty's Ship under my Command, after a Chace which lasted Two Days and a Night. At Two A. M. on the 25th, we got Possession of her close off the Shoals of Point Guadaveri. We found that she had driven her on Shore the Night before, and that she had hove overboard Twelve of her Guns, and had lost her Anchors and Boats, before she got afloat again.

L'Emilien was formerly His Majesty's Sloop Trincomalee; is Copper-fastened, and was considered to be one of the finest Cruizers out of the Isle of France.—She has heretofore annoyed our Trade by the Name of La Gloire; but has made no Captures since leaving the Isle of France, Two Months ago.

July 21, 1806.

I HAVE the Honour to inform you, that on my Arrival at this Place I found a French Privateer

Brig lying in the Cove, having been there nearly Five Weeks, and refitting for a Cruize. I immediately represented to the Sultan how wrong it was to allow French Privateers to come into his Port, and to refit their Vessels to cruize against the English, and requested he would send her out; after remaining there Three Days, he promised, if I would go out of Sight for Twenty-four Hours, he would send her out, which I accordingly did; but in the Dusk of the Evening sent all my Boats in, under the Orders of Lieutenant Rideout, who fell in with her at Daylight, when she hauled down her Colours. She is called the Vigilant, mounting Two Eighteen-Pounders; has been cruising Five Months in the Arabian Gulph, and had captured One Vessel, belonging to Surat.

Whereas it hath been humbly represented to His Majesty, that on the Evening of the 8th Instant, a very numerous Mob assembled in the Town of Dover for the Purpose of rescuing from the Custody of the Peace Officers several Smugglers, who stood charged with Felony; and that although Proclamation was made by the Mayor of the said Town for the Persons assembled to disperse themselves, and peaceably depart to their Habitations, or to their lawful Business, upon the Pains contained in the Act made in the First Year of the Reign of King George the First, for preventing Tumults and Riotous Assemblies, yet the said Mob, consisting of several Hundred Persons, did not disperse till the Arrival of a large Party of Cavalry and Infantry, about Two Hours after the said Proclamation, and succeeded in rescuing Three of the said Smugglers, and severely assaulted an Officer and a Private of the Shropshire Militia, and an Officer of the Royal Miners;

His Majesty, for better discovering and bringing to Justice the principal Persons engaged in the said Riot, and who, by not dispersing according to the said Proclamation, have committed Felony within the said Act, is pleased hereby to offer His most gracious Pardon to any one or more of the said Rioters, (except those who actually committed Acts of Violence,) who will discover



any one or more of his or their Accomplices, so that he or they may be apprehended and convicted of the said Felony.

THE Committee appointed to carry into Execution the Acts of Parliament for rendering more commodious, and for better regulating the Port of London, do hereby give Notice, that from and after Lady-Day next, the Office for conducting the Harbour-Master's Business of the Port of London will be removed from No. 41, Fore-Street, Limehouse, to the Canal Office at Blackwall, and that the present Office in St. Katharine's Square, below the Tower of London, will be continued as usual until further Notice; and the Committee have directed to be made public, for the Information of all Masters and Commanders of Ships, Vessels, and other Craft using or coming into the Port of London, as well as Pilots and all other Persons, the following Sections of the Bye-Laws for regulating the said Port, so far as relates to the Attendance of the First Harbour-Master at the Office nearest the Custom House, and also the Attendance of the other Harbour-Masters at each Extremity of the Canal in the Isle of Dogs, &c.

Sec. 3. And be it further ordained and established by the Authority aforesaid, That the First Harbour-Master shall constantly attend every Day, and shall regularly superintend the Conduct and Management of the whole Duty afloat during the Flood Tide in the Course of each Day, and shall, during the remaining Hours, attend for the Transaction of all Public Business at the Office situate nearest the Custom-House, or at such other Office or Place between the Tower of London and Blackwall aforesaid, as the said Mayor, Aldermen, and Commons in Common Council assembled, or any Committee or Committees appointed by them, shall deem necessary and proper, from Time to Time, to regulate and appoint in Writing; which Office shall continue open from Nine o'Clock in the Morning until Five o'Clock in the Afternoon each Day; and whenever the First Harbour-Master quits the said Office, a Notice in Writing shall be stuck up on the Door, or left in the Office, daily, announcing the Hour at which he means to return, for the Purpose of receiving any Communication relative to the Harbour-Service, upon Pain of forfeiting for every Default a Sum not exceeding Forty Shillings, nor less than Ten Shillings.

Sec. 14. And for the more speedy and easy Entrance and Exit of all Ships or Vessels into and out of the said Canal, Be it ordained and established by the Authority aforesaid, That one of the said Harbour-Masters doing alternate Duty as aforesaid, shall, at the Discretion and by the Appointment of the said Board of Harbour-Masters as aforesaid, attend and remain at the Eastern Extremity of the said Canal; and the other of the said Harbour-Masters doing alternate Duty as aforesaid, shall, at

the like Discretion and Appointment of the said Board of Harbour-Masters as aforesaid, attend and remain at the Western Extremity of the said Canal from the Time of Half Flood until the Expiration of One Hour after high Water, in the Day, to direct, manage, and order, in such Manner as to such Harbour-Masters shall seem most easy, convenient, and expeditious, the Entrance and Exit of all Ships or Vessels passing into, through, or out of the said Canal, on Pain of forfeiting for every Time when such Harbour-Master shall be found absent from his Duty in this Behalf, a Sum not exceeding Forty Shillings, nor less than Ten Shillings.
