WHEREAS, in virtue of the Powers vested in His Majesty by an Act, passed in the last Session of Parliament, intituled "An Act for reviving and continuing several Laws of Customs relating to the establishing Courts of Judicature in the Island of Newfoundland; and to the prohibiting the Exportation from, and permitting the Importation to, Great Britain, of Corn, and for allowing the Importation of other Articles of Provision without Payment of Duty, until the Twenty-fifth Day of March, One thousand eight hundred and nine; and for continuing several Laws relating to the granting a Bounty upon certain Species of British and Irish Linens exported from Great Britain, and taking off the Duties on Importation into Great Britain of Foreign Raw Linen Yarns made of Flax; to the granting a Bounty upon the Importation into Great Britain of Hemp, and rough and undressed Flax, from His Majesty's Colonies in America, and to the Encouragement of the Greenland Whale Fisheries; and for reviving and continuing several Laws relating to the regulating the Prices at which Corn and Grain may be exported from Great Britain to Ireland, and from Ireland to Great Britain; and to the Admission to Entry in Great Britain of Oil and Blubber of Newfoundland, taken by His Majesty's Subjects carrying on the Fishery from, and residing in, the said Island; and for continuing an Act of the Twenty-third Year of His present Majesty, for

the more effectual Encouragement of the Manufactures of Flax and Cotton in Great Britain; and for reviving and continuing several Laws relating to the permitting the Importation into Great Britain of Hides and other Articles in Foreign Ships; and to the prohibiting the Exportation from Ireland of Corn or Potatoes, or other Provisions, and to the permitting the Importation into Ireland of Corn, Fish, and Provisions, without Payment of Duty, until the Twenty-fifth Day of March One thousand eight hundred and eight; and for reviving and continuing an Act, passed in the Parliament of Ireland in the Twenty-fifth Year of His present Majesty, for the Encouragement of the Flaxen and Hempen Manufactures of Ireland until the Twenty-fifth Day of March One thousand eight hundred and twenty-seven; and for amending and further continuing an Act made in the Seventh Year of His present Majesty for the free Importation into Great Britain of Cochineal and Indigo, until the Twenty-fifth Day of March One thousand eight hundred and nine."

His Majesty was pleased by His Order in Council, bearing Date the Eighth Day of October last, to permit for the Space of Six Months, from the Sixteenth Day of the said Month of October, the Importation of sundry Articles of Provisions, therein specified, Duty free: And whereas it is judged expedient that the said Permission should be continued for some Time longer, His Majesty is thereupon pleased, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council to allow, and doth hereby allow, for and during the Space of Six Months, to commence from the Sixteenth of this instant April the Importation into any Port or Place of Great Britain of any Beans, called Kidney or French Beans, Tares, Lentiles, Calavancies, and all other Sorts of Pulse; and also of Bulls, Cows, Oxen, Calves, Sheep, Lambs, and Swine, and of Beef, Pork, Mutton, Veal, and Lamb, (except Salted Beef, and Pork,) and of Bacon, Hams, Tongues, Butter, Cheese, Potatoes, Sago, Sago Powder, Tapioca, Vermicelli, Millet Seed, Poultry, Fowls, Eggs, Game, and Sour Crout, in any British Ship or Vessel, or in any other Ship or Vessel belonging to Persons of any Kingdom or State in Amity with His Majesty, and navigated in any Manner whatever, without Payment of any Duty whatsoever; provided that a due Entry shall be

made of all such Articles as aforesaid, that shall be so imported with the proper Officers of the Customs at the Port where the same shall be imported, under the Penalties and Forfeitures mentioned and referred to in an Act passed in the Thirty-ninth Year of His present Majesty; and the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury are to give the necessary Directions herein accordingly.

Your Majesty's faithful Citizens of London feel it no less their Pride and Exultation, than their bounden and indispensable Duty, to express the Sentiments of Satisfaction which animate their Hearts, at the wise and dignified Measures pursued by your Majesty, securing the glorious Independence of the Crown as one of the Three Estates of our well tempered and invaluable Constitution.

That your Majesty may be long spared to us by an over-ruling Providence, and that the People of this Land may be long sensible of the Blessings of

your Majesty's most auspicious Government, in the Protection of every Thing dear to them, is the ardent Prayer of your Majesty's loyal Citizens of London.

THE Undersigned Minister Plenipotentiary from His Majesty the King of Sweden, has the Honour to communicate, by Order of his Court, to the Ministry of His Britannic Majesty, that His Swedish Majesty, influenced by the same Reasons which obliged him to blockade the Mouth of the River Peene, (as was officially communicated by the Undersigned on the 3d of this Month,) has judged it equally indispensable to establish the most strict and rigorous Blockade at the Mouth of the River Oder; and that consequently this latter River is, and must be considered as being, in a State of Blockade.

The Undersigned avails himself of this Opportunity to renew to His Excellency Mr. Secretary Canning, the Assurances of his high Consideration.

MY LORD, Emerald at Sea, April 14, 1807.

I BEG to inform you that His Majesty's Ship under my Command, Yesterday, captured a Spanish Polacre Ship from La Guira, loaded with Cocoa, Bark, Indigo, &c. which I was convoying as far as the Limits of my Station, when a Report being made of a Sail on the Weather-bow this Morning at Day-light, I gave Chace, and after a very hard Run of Ten Hours, had the good Fortune to capture the Austerlitz of Nantes, a Privateer Brig, carrying Fourteen Nine-Pounders, and Ninety-six Men. She is quite new, appears to sail extremely fast, and is in my Opinion perfectly adapted for His Majesty's Service. The Austerlitz was fitted for a Five Month's Cruize, and had been out Eight Days from Nantes without making any Capture.

SIR,

I HAVE the Honour to inform you of His Majesty's Ship Bacchante under my Command (Mediator in Company) having captured, on the 14th Instant, off Cape Raphael, the French National Schooner Dauphin, after a Chace of Ten Hours. She mounted One long Twelve and Two Four-Pounders, but the Two latter she hove overboard in the Chace; and had on board Seventy-one Men.

I am extremely happy in having captured this Vessel, as she has done much Mischief to our Trade, and was returning from a successful Cruize to St. Domingo.

SIR,

HAVING captured the French National Schooner as mentioned in my Letter of the 16th Instant, which I found was well known in Samana, (that Nest for Privateers,) and having consulted with Captain Wise, of the Mediator, whom I fell in with off the Mona, under similar Orders to myself, cruising for the Annoyance of the Enemy, (whose Vessels are principally Privateers in these Seas,) I took him under my Orders, and arrived at a Determination to send the captured Vessel in, under her former Colours, to disguise this Ship as a Prize, and the Mediator as a Neutral, which Stratagem so completely deceived them, that we got through the intricate Navigation of the Harbour, and anchored within Half a Mile of the Fort, before the Enemy discovered their Mistake, and opened their Fire upon us from the Fort, which I have the Pleasure to acquaint you, Sir, after a heavy Cannonade of Four Hours from the Ships, was carried by Storm, by the Seamen and Marines of both Ships, landed under the Command of Captain Wise, assisted by Lieutenants Baker, Norton, and Shaw. We found in the Harbour an American Ship, and an English Schooner, Prizes to the Vessels aforementioned, and Two French Schooners then fitting for Sea as Cruizers. I am concerned to say, the Mediator suffered considerably; the Fire of the Enemy being chiefly directed against her, but not so much as might be expected from the commanding Situation of the Fort, which was manned, principally by the Crews of the Privateers. The Behaviour of the Officers and Men of both Ships was such as always distinguishes British Seamen, and great Credit is due to the Masters for carrying the Ships through so difficult a Navigation, which caused this Enterprize to be so completely successful.

The Fort and Cannon were destroyed by Lieutenant Gould when we evacuated the Place on the 21st Instant. The Enemy's Loss must have been considerable, though we could not ascertain the Number, from their retreating to the Woods.

Dublin Castle, April 19, 1807.

THE Duke of Richmond, who embarked at Holyhead on the Night of the 18th Instant, on Board His Majesty's Yacht the Dorset, arrived in this Harbour at Eight o'Clock this Morning.

His Grace on his Arrival in Dublin, was received by the Lord Mayor, Aldermen, Sheriffs, and Commons of the City of Dublin.

His Grace, attended by a Squadron of Dragoons, proceeded to the Castle, and the Council having assembled at Half-past Ten o'Clock, His Grace was introduced in Form to His Grace The Duke of Bedford, who received him sitting under the Canopy of State in the Presence Chamber, from whence a Procession was made in the usual State to the Coun-

cil Chamber. The Council sitting, His Grace's Commission was read, and the Oath being administered to him, His Grace was invested with the Collar of the most illustrious Order of Saint Patrick, and received the Sword of State from the Duke of Bedford. His Grace afterwards repaired to the Presence Chamber, and received the Compliments of the Nobility, and other Persons of Distinction, upon his safe Arrival, and taking upon him the Government of Ireland.

Dublin-Castle, April 21, 1807.

THIS Day at Four o'Clock, His Grace the Duke of Bedford, late Lord Lieutenant of Ireland, left the Castle in order to embark on board His Majesty's Yacht the Dorset, on his Return to England.

His Grace the Duke of Richmond, Lord Lieutenant, and the Duke of Bedford, went together from the Castle in the State Coach, preceded by the leading Coaches, in which were the Officers of State, to the South Wall, where the Yacht lay. They were escorted by a Squadron of Dragoons, and attended by a great Number of the Nobility and Persons of Distinction; the Lord Mayor, Sheriffs, several of the Aldermen and principal Citizens, in their Carriages, followed by a Concourse of People, to the Water-side: the Streets were lined by the Regiments of Infantry on Dublin Duty. The Duke of Bedford received every Demonstration of Respect, in passing through the Streets, from the People, who testified their Regard by repeated Wishes for his Welfare and safe Return to England.

chandize, and wherein the same might respectively be safely and securely deposited, and remain under the Regulations and Directions in the said Act contained; and the said Lord High Treasurer, or Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury for the Time being, or any Three or more of them, were thereby authorized and empowered, by Writing under his or their Hand or Hands, to certify and make known his or their Approbation of such Warehouses, which Certificate should be published Three Times at least, in the London Gazette, and in Two or more public Morning Newspapers usually circulated in London.

And whereas the Table marked (B), above referred to, is in the Words following, viz.
