The humble Address of the Lord Rector, Vice-Chancellor, Dean of Faculties, Principal, and Professors, of the University of Glasgow.

*Most Gracious Sovereign,*

WE, the Lord Rector, Vice-Chancellor, Dean of Faculties, Principal and Professors, of the University of Glasgow, in Senate assembled, humbly beg Leave to approach your Throne with the profoundest Sentiments of Loyalty, and of increased Attachment to your Majesty.

Contemplating with Veneration the inestimable Privileges secured to us by our happy Establishment in Church and State, which we and our Fathers have enjoyed without Interruption under the illustrious House of Hanover, we feel our Hearts warmed with the most lively Gratitude to Almighty God for blessing us with a King, who, during a long Reign in eventful Times, hath steadily maintained and acted upon those Principles which uphold the British Constitution, and which are no less conducive to the Interests of genuine Piety and useful Learning, than to the Prosperity and Happiness of his People.

While we abhor a Spirit of Intolerance, and rejoice in that Liberty of Conscience which all your Majesty's Subjects enjoy, we cannot but be alarmed at the Attempts made by those who hold the Catholic Faith, to obtain Possession of political Power, as tending to endanger our civil and religious Liberties. And we deem it our Duty at this interesting Crisis, with all Humility, to testify our most sincere Joy and Thankfulness to your Majesty, for your firm and dignified Conduct recently displayed, in resisting any Encroachment upon the civil and religious Establishments of your Dominions.

Deeply impressed with the Importance of the Duty entrusted to us, as the Instructors of Youth, we feel ourselves animated by your Majesty's gracious Example to exert ourselves in cultivating in their Minds the true Christian and Protestant Principles of our holy Religion, as the best Means of rendering them good Members of the Church, and useful Subjects of the State.

Done in the Senate House of the University, and signed in our Name, and by our Appointment, by the Lord Rector; the Seal of the University being also affixed, this 24th of April 1807.
