PROCLAMATION.

Calling of another.

GEORGE R.

HEREAS We think fit, by and with the Advice of Our Privy Council, to diffolve this present Parliament, which stands prorogued to Wednesday the Thirteenth Day of May next: We do therefore publish this Our Royal Proclamation, and do hereby diffolve the faid Parliament accordingly; and the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and the Knights, Citizens, and Burgesses, and the Commissioners for Shires and Burghs, of the House of Commons, are discharged from their Meeting and Attendance on the faid Wednesday, the Thirteenth Day of May next. And We being defirous and refolved, as foon as may be, to meet Our People, and to have their Advice in Parliament, do hereby make known to all Our loving Subjects Our Royal Will and Pleasure to call a new Parliament: And do hereby further declare, that, with the Advice of Our Privy Council, We have this Day given Order that Our Chancellor of that Part of Our United Kingdom called Great Britain, and Our Chancellor of Ireland, do respectively forthwith issue out Writs in due Form, and according to Law, for calling a new Parliament. And We do hereby also, by this Our Royal Proclamation under Our Great Seal of Our United Kingdom, require Writs forthwith to be iffued accordingly by Our faid Chancellors re-spectively, for causing the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and Commons, who are to serve in the said Parliament, to be duly returned to, and give their Attendance in, Our faid Parliament; which Writs are to be returnable on Monday the Twenty-fecond Day of June next.

PROCLAMATION,

For disfolving the present Parliament, and declaring the In order to the Electing and Summoning the Sixteen Peers of Scotland.

GEORGE R.

WHEREAS We have, in Our Council, thought fit to declare Our Pleasure for summoning and holding a Parliament of Our United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, on Monday the Twenty-fecond Day of June next enfuing the Date hereof: In order therefore to the electing and fummoning the Sixteen Peers of Scotland, who are to fit in the House of Peers in the said Parliament; We do, by the Advice of Our Privy Council, iffue forth this Our Royal Proclamation, flrictly charging and commanding all the Peers of Scotland to affemble and meet at Holy Rood House, in Edinburgh, on Tuesday the Ninth Day of June next ensuing, between the Hours of Twelve and Two in the Afternoon, to nominate and choose the Sixteen Peers to fit and vote in the House of Peers, in the faid enfuing Parliament, by open Election and Plurality of Voices of the Peers that shall be then present, and of the Proxies of such as shall be abfent, (fuch Proxies being Peers, and producing a Mandate in Writing, duly figned before Witneffes, and both the Conflituent and Proxy being qualified according to Law). And the Lord Clerk Register, or such Two of the Principal Clerks of the Session, as shall be appointed by him to officiate in his Name, are hereby respectively required to attend such Meeting, and to administer the Oaths required by Law to be taken there by the faid Peers, and to take their Votes; and immediately after fuch Election made, and duly examined, to certify the Names of the Sixteen Peers fo elected, and fign and attest the same, in the Presence of the said Peers the Electors; and return such Certificate into Our High Court of Chancery of Great Britain. And We do, by this Our Proclamation, strictly command and require the Provost of Edinburgh, and all other the Magistrates of the said City, to take especial Care to preserve the Peace thereof, during the Time of the faid Election; and to prevent all

Manner of Riots, Tumults, Diforders, and Violence whatfoever. And We strictly charge and command, that this Our Royal Proclamation be duly published at the Market Cross at Edinburgh, and in all the County Towns of Scotland, Twentyfive Days at least before the Time hereby appointed for the Meeting of the said Peers to proceed to such Election.

Witness Ourself at Westminster, the Twentyninth Day of April, One thousand eight hundred and seven, in the Forty seventh Year of our Reign.

Mr. Matthias, and Mr. Newton; being the Delegates appointed by the University to attend on this Occasion, honoured by the Presence of His Royal Highness the Duke of York, in his Academical Habit, and accompanied by His Grace the Duke of Beaufort, the Marquis Wellesley, the Earls of Dartmouth and Aylesford, the Viscount Mountjoy, the Lord Amherst, the Right Honourable Charles Abbot, peaker of the House of Commons, one of the Members for the University; the Right Honourable George Canning, one of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State; and the Right Honourable Sir William Scott, the other Member for the Univerfity; and feveral other Noblemen and Gentlemen, who were educated at the University, waited upon the King to present the following Address to His Majesty:

To the KING's Most Excellent Majesty.

Most Gracious Sovereign, WF, your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Chancellor, Masters, and Scholars of the University of Oxford, cannot but be desirous of offering to your M. jefty, on every just Occasion, our Expressions of faithful and unalterable Attachment to your Majesty's sacred Person, and our grateful Sense of the invaluable Bleffings we enjoy under your mild and paternal Government; but at the present Moment we feel it to be peculiarly our Duty to approach your Majesty with our most humble and sneere Tribute of Gratitude, for the fignal Proof so recently given by your Majesty of your vigilant and anxious Attention to the Security both of our civil and religious Ellablishments, and for the great Example you have displayed to the World of a conscientious Adherence to the Principles on which your Majesty's royal Ancestors were placed upon the Throne of this Kingdom.

We unfeignedly profess to Your Majesty, that we

are, in every proper and rational Sense of the Term, the Firm Advocates of Religious Toleration. We look back therefore with Satisfaction to the many and liberal Indulgences, which, during the long course of Your Majesty's beneficent Reign, have been granted to those among our Fellow-Subjects who unfortunately differ from us in Religious Opinion; but at the same Time, we cannot forbear to testify our strong Conviction, that it is still indispensably necessary to uphold the great fundamental Laws enacted by the Wisdom of our Foresathers for the Desence and Support of the Protestant Government, and Protestant Church, as they are happily established in this United Kingdom.

We beg Leave folemnly to affure your Majesty, that we shall not cease to offer up our Prayers to the Almighty for the Continuance and Preservation of a Life so justly dear to us; and that our earnest Endeavours shall always be exerted to impress on the Minds of those who are committed to our Care the genuine Principles of that pure and holy Faith, which, under Divine Providence has hitherto contributed so essentially, by its salutary Influence, to the Stability of your Majesty's Government, and to the Freedom, Peace, and Happiness of your People.

Given at our House of Convocation, under our Common Seal, this 23d Day of April, in the Year of our Lord 1807.

To which Address His Majesty was pleased to return the following most gracious Answer:

I THANK you for your loyal and dutiful Address. Your Attachment to the Principles of a just and enlightened Toleration, and your regard for those fundamental Laws which were enaded by the Wisdom of our Forefathers, for the Defence of the Protestant Church and Government, give me the greatest Satisfation.

The Assurances I receive from you of your continued Exertions in endeavouring to impress on the Minds of those who are committed to your Care the Principles of our pure and Holy Faith, and the Value of our excellent Constitution, assort Me the strongest Proof of your Determination to support Me in all My Endeavours to preserve, unimpaired, our present System of Government, and thereby to secure the Freedom, Peace, and Happiness, which My People have so long enjoyed, on a firm and lasting Foundation.

DISPATCH, of which the inclosed is a Copy, has been received this Day at the Office Viscount Castlereagh, One of His Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, from Major-General Fraser, dated Alexandria, the 25th of March, 1807, addressed to the Right Honourable William Windham:

Alexandria, March 25, 1807. T is with much Satisfaction I have the Honour to inform you, that, in the Afternoon of the 20th Current, the Town and Fortreffes of Alexandria, with Two Turkish Frigates and a Corvette, furrendered to His Majesty's Arms by Capitulation; and that they were taken Possession of on the memorable Morning of the 21st, by the Troops under my Command.

You are already apprifed of my having been detached on this Service, with a Body of Troops from Messina, by his Excellency General Fox, under convoy of His Majesty's Ships Tigre and Apollo; and the Wizard Sloop was sent forward by Captain Hollowell, to get Intelligence from Major Miffet, whom I had been by my Instructions directed to confult as to the best Plan of Operations for effecting

the Purpofes of the Expedition.

I have now to acquaint you, that in the Night of the 7th Instant, (the Day after we failed,) the Apollo Frigate, with Nineteen Transports out of Thirty-three which conveyed the Troops, parted Company, and that the other Fourteen, with the Tigre, came to an Anchor to the Westward of Alexandria on the 16th.

On our getting near the Land we faw the Wizard. and Captain Palmer immediately brought me the Intelligence he had received from Major Miffet, together with a Letter from him, flating that he had not come off himself, thinking his Presence in Alexandria absolutely necessary to counteract the Intrigues of the French Conful, who was endeavouring to prevail upon the Governor to admit a Body of Albanians from Rosetta, to assist in the Defence of the

He earneftly recommended me to land the Troops immediately, as the Inhabitants were well affected towards us, and that he had fanguine Hopes we should be able to get Possession of it without firing a Shot.

Before I determined, however, upon this Meafure, I deemed it prudent to acquaint Major Miffet with the very diminished State of my Force, and I therefore sent in my Aide de Camp, Captain A'Court, of the 31st Regiment, with a Flag of Truce to him, with a detailed Account of it, and at the same Time a Manifesto to the Governor and Inhabitants, (a Copy of which I inclose,) which had not the desired Effect, but on the contrary, was treated by the Governor with Contempt.

The Major, however, in Reply, strongly urged my immediately landing; still repeating that we should not meet with any Resistance, and that my doing so would be the only Means of preventing the Garrison being reinforced by the Albanians, who had actually been sent for, and might be expected in the Course of Twenty-sour Hours.

These Considerations led me to follow his Advice; and accordingly I landed that Evening (the 17th) as many Troops as our small Number of Boats could convey, a few Miles to the Eastward of Marabout, without Opposition, though I could only take up a Position for the Night; as, before the next Landing could be effected, such a Surf had arisen on the Beach, as totally to prevent the Second Division

from approaching the Shore.

The next Morning however, with Infinite Difficulty and Risk they were landed; but finding my Situation now from the increased Height of the Surf and Appearance of the Weather, to be very precarious, both with Respect to getting Provisions or Stores on Shore, or having any Communications with the Transports, I determined at all Hazards to force my Way to the Western Side, where I could receive Supplies from Aboukir Bay, at the same Time resolving to attempt (in passing) to get into the Town even with the small Force I had, and push my Way, if possible, into the Forts that commanded it, a Matter I had reason to believe from Major Misset and others, would not be very difficult to accomplish. I therefore moved forward about Eight o'Clock

I therefore moved forward about Eight o'Clock in the Evening of the 18th, and in our Way forced a pallifaded Intrenchment, with a deep Ditch in front of it, (that had been thrown up by the Turks, as a Defence against the Mamelukes and Arabs on the Western Side) stretching from Fort des Bains to Lake Mariotis, strengthened by Three Batteries mounting Eight Guns, exclusive of Fort des Bains on its Right Flank, mounting Thirteen

Guns.

This we effected with very little Lofs, though under a heavy Fire of Cannon and Musketry, and proceeded within a few Yards of Pompey's Gate, where we found the Garrison prepared to receive us, the Gate barricadoed, and the Walls lined with Troops and Armed Inhabitants;—this, added to the Smallness of my Force, (not exceeding One Thousand Men of all Descriptions,) led me to think the Risk too great, and I determined to proceed to the Westward, as I had originally intended, where I arrived in the Morning of the 19th, and took up my Position on the Ground the British Troops occupied in the Action of the 21st, immediately sending Detachments to take Possession of Aboukir Castle, and the Cut between the Lakes Maadie and Mariotis, by which Communication the Reinspreement of Albanians was expected in Alexandria; in both these Attempts we succeeded.

The next Day, the 20th, I fent in (by a friendly

Arab that had stolen out of Town and joined us) a Manisesto, addressed to the Inhabitants, warning them of the Danger of implicating Friends and Foes, in the Event of taking the Place by Assault, and urging them to force the Governor to capitulate. This had the desired Effect; a Flag of Truce was sent out; and a Capitulation, (of which I herewith inclosed a Copy) was agreed to and signed

Although this Service has fortunately not been of long Duration; yet, from the Scantiness of our Numbers, and the Scarcity of all Sorts of Supplies, as well Military Stores as Provisions, (which the boisterous State of the Weather completely prevented our receiving,) our Situation was, for some Time, rather critical; and I am happy to have it in my Power to bear Testimony to the Patience and Cheerfulness with which the Troops bore every Privation, and the Ardour and Spirit they shewed in the Attack of the Enemy's Works, as well as the Inclination and Wish they displayed to have stormed the Place, had I deemed that Step adviseable.

To Major-General Wauchope, the Honourable Brigadier General Stuart, and Colonel Oswald, who landed with and accompanied me, I feel myfelf under great Obligations for their Exertions and Affiftance in carrying on the Service; and I am much indebted to Lieutenant-Colonel Airey, acting as Deputy Adjutant-General, and Captain Green, acting as Deputy Quarter-Master-General, for the great Attention and Zeal shewn by them in forwarding and executing the Duties of their respective Departments; and I think it but Justice to Captain Pym, and to the Officers and Men of the Detachment of the Royal Artillery that was with me, to mention the very great Zeal and Alacrity which they difplayed on every Occasion, which I am confident would have been equally conspicuous on the Part of Captain Burgoyne and the Officers of the Engineers, had Circumflances permitted them to have acted.

To Captain Hallowell, and the Officers, and Seamen of His Majefty's Ship Tigre, I cannot fufficiently express my Acknowledgements for the Affistance they afforded me, and for the Readiness with which they stood forward on all Occasions. Captain Hallowel landed and marched with me to the Attack of the Enemy's Entrenchments, and to the very Gates of the City, and remained on Shore until the Place surrendered; from his Advice and local Knowledge,

I derived much ufeful Information.

Captain Withers of the Royal Navy, Agent of Transports, is also entitled to Praise, for his Activity in landing the Troops, and for the Exertions he afterwards made for supplying them with Provisions.

afterwards made for supplying them with Provisions. I fend you herewith a Return of the killed, wounded, and missing, together with Returns of Prisoners made, and of the public Stores of different Descriptions, found in the several Batteries and Magazines.

Said Mahamed Naim Effendi being commissioned by his Excellency Emen Bey, the Governor, and Hagg Mahamet Kattp and his Ibrahim Chieflain of the People, activities and his Siesses Author Charles and People activities. companied by Signor Antonio Godard, propose to place the Gity and Forts in the Possession of the Commanders in Chief of the Land and Naval Forces of His Britannic Majesty, His Excellency Major General Fraser, and Captain Hallowell, upon the soloning Conditions. lowing Conditions, viz.

I. All privare Property of Individuals, whether on Land, or embarked shall be respected. The Religion of the Inhabitants, their Mosques, and their Laws shall be respected, as well as their

Houses, and Families.

II. The Commandant, His Excellency Emen Bey, as well as the Commandant of the Marine, Satek Aga, and Mahamet Naim Effendi, with all the Official Retinue of the Goverment, the Troops and the Crews of the Vessels, belonging to Government, shall be fent to a Port of Turkey, with the Arms and Baggage of Individuals, but they are to consider themselves as Prisoners of War, and shall not be engaged to take up Arms against the British Forces, or their Allies, until exchanged.

III. The Veffels belonging to Government, and all Public Property, shall be given up to the British Forces; and Commissaries shall be appointed on

both Sides to make an Inventory.

IV. All Ottoman Veffels belonging to Individuals, and all Property belonging to private Subjects of the Sublime Porte, which shall be found within Alexandria, shall be respected. Such Persons as wish to remain in the Country shall have the Liberty to do fo, if their Conduct and Characters shall make it fafe; and those who wish to depart may carry with them their Properties, and shall be furnished with Passports for landing in any Port of Turkey, which shall not be blockaded.

V. There shall be a general Amnesty for all the

Inhabitants, nor shall any Notice be taken of the Conduct they may have held during the Defence of

VI. There shall be no Seizure of the Property of Individuals, if they shall not become Enemies of

Great Britain.

VII. The Gate of Rosetta shall be placed at Night in the Hands of the Forces of His Britannic Majefty, as well as Fort Cretin and Fort Caffarellie.

Admiralty-Office, May 9, 1807. Extrast of a Letter from Vice-Admiral Lord Colling-wood, Commander in Chief of His Majesty's Ships and Vessels in the Mediterranean, to William Marfden, Ejq; dated on board the Ocean, off Cadiz, the 27th of April, 1807.

HE Delight Sloop joined me last Night, having left Alexandria on the 28th laft, and brought an Account of the Surrender of that City and its Fortresses to His Majesty's Forces by Capitulation, on the 20th Ult. A Copy of Captain Hallowell's Letter, relating the Circumstances of this Capture, I inclose for the Information of the Lords Commilfioners of the Admiralty, in which their Lordships will find an Example of great Zeal and Ability in conducting this Enterprize, by the Commanders of the Sca and Land Forces, where they acted with a Promptitude and Judgment which prevented Refiltance. Two Frigates and a Corvette were found in the Western Harbour, and surrendered by the Capitulation.

> His Majefly's Ship Tigre, off Alexandria, March 24, 1807.

HAVE the Honour to acquaint you, that, in Obedience to your Orders, addressed to the senior Officer at Sicily, I failed from Meslina on the 6th Instant, with the Troops under the Command of Major-General Fraser, destined to take Possession of

STR.

On the 15th we reached the Arabs Tower with Fourteen Sail of the Convoy, Nineteen having parted



on the Night of the 7th in a heavy Squall and thick Weather. With fo fmall a Proportion of the Army the General did not think it prudent to shew the Transports, until he had received some Information of the Enemy's Force. I therefore stood in with the Tigre on the 16th, having Major General Fraser on board, (leaving the Convoy in the Offing) hoping to afcertain from Major Miffet, the British Resident, and Mr. Briggs, the Vice-Conful, (whom we expected to find in the Wizard Brig, which had been previously detached to receive them on board,) the Strength and Difposition of the Garrison and Inhabitants of the Place. On the Evening of the fame Day, having received most fatisfactory Accounts from Major Miffet and Mr. Briggs, of the friendly Disposition of the Inhabitants towards us, and the little Prospect there was of meeting any Op position on our Landing, the Transports were called in, and we all anchored off the Western Harbour. A Summons was immediately fent, demanding Poffession of the Fortresses, and promising Protection to the Persons and Private Property of every Individual; but, contrary to our Expectations, the Officers who had been fent with the Summons, returned the Morning after, with a Declaration from the Governor that he would defend the Place to the laft Extremity.

As our intentions were now known to the Enemy, every Delay on our Part would have afforded them an Opportunity of trengthening their Polition. The General therefore determined on landing immediately with the Force he had with him, and on the Evening of the 17th, between Six and Seven Hundred Troops with Five Field Pieces, and Fiftyfix Seamen under Lieutenant Boxer, were put on Shore near the Ravine, from Lake Mariotis to the Sca, without Opposition: but from the heavy Surf which got up during the Night, it was late in the Afternoon of the following Day, before the Remainder could be got on Shore. As soon as the Whole were collected and formed, they moved forward and attacked the Enemy's advanced Works, which were carried with little Loss. And as we had been informed that a Number of Albanians were expected from Rosetta and Cairo, to reinforce the Garrison, the Army took up a Position to the Eastward of Alexandria, occupying the Cut on the Canal, by which all Communication was cut off between Alexandria and Rosetta.

On the 19th the Apollo and remainder of the Convoy appeared in the Offing, and having joined, the proceeded with all the Transports to Aboukir Bay, where they began on the 20th to land their Troops, (the Castle of Aboukir having been previously occupied by us previous to their anchoring.) The Appearance of such a Reinforcement induced the Governor to offer Terms of Capitulation, similar to those which we at first proposed; which were accepted on the 20th in the Asternoon, and Possession taken of the Heights of Cassallie and Cretin, at Two o'Clock on the Morning of the 21st

As the General did me the Honour to express a Wish that I should remain on Shore from the Time of our first Disembarkation, I left the Tigre in Charge of Mr. Fowell First Lieutenant, and to him, and Captain Withers (principal Agent for the Transports,) and all the Officers and Men of the Tigre and Transports, I feel much indebted for their Exections, which was a most ardous Service from the

great Distance they had to row, and the heavy Surf they had to encounter on the Beach.

As the General directed all the Movements of the Army in Person, it does not become me to enter into any farther Details; I shall only observe, that the utmost Harmony prevailed during the Whole of our Operations.

I have the Honour to inclose you a Copy of the Articles of Capitulation*, which has put us in Pos-fession of the Fortresses and Harbour; and beg to offer my Congratulations on its being accomplished with so little Loss.

In the Old or Western Port we have taken Two Turkish Frigates and a Corvette, all mounting Brass Guns; One carrying Twenty-eight Eighteen-Pounders on her Main-Deck, Six Eighteen-Pound Carronades, and Four long Nine-Pounders on her Quarter-Deck, and Two Nine-Pounders on the Forecastle; the other Twenty-six Twelve-Pounders on the Main-Deck, and Eight Six-Pounders on the Quarter-Deck. The Corvette Fourteen Six-Pounders and Two Eighteen Ponnders, long Guns.

TRANSMIT to you, for the Information of the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, the Copy of a Letter from Captain Raitt, of His Majesty's Sloop the Scout, giving an Account of his having, on the 27th Instant, driven on Shore on the Coast of Spain, where she was destroyed, one of the largest of the Enemy's Privateers which insest the Streights of Gibraltar.

Captain Raitt has fince been informed the Privateer was named the Admiral of Tariffa, commanded by Sebastian Boralta, mounting Two Twenty-four-Pounders, and Two Eighteen-Pounders, long Guns, and Six Twelve-Pounder Carronades, with One Hundred Men.

My Lord, March 30, 1807.

I BEG Leave to inform your Lordship, that, on the 27th Instant, at half past Eleven A. M. I obferved a Spanish Felucca Privateer to Windward, with Top-sail Yards and Top-gallant Yards across. At half past Twelve, observed him to anchor under Cape Plata; made all Sail to Windward in Chase; but, owing to light variable Winds, and the Tide setting to the Westward, was not able to get within Gun-shot of him before Five P. M. At that Time he had his Vessel moored with Springs on his Cables, and a Stream Anchor on Shore, that kept him End on; he had Two long Twenty-sour-Pounders in his Bow, which went over and over us as we were working in Shore. At half past Five opened our Fire

on him; and in Ten Minutes forced him to cut his ! · Cables, and run on Shore. I think that fome of our Shot must have struck him between Wind and Water, as he was not Two Minutes on Shore before The was full of Water, and fell on her Broadfide; at that Time our Grape Shot was going over him. She was one of the largest Privateers on the Station; I am informed mounted Ten Guns, Two long Twenty-four-Pounders, and Two long Six-Pounders, and Six Twelve-Pounder Carronades; faid to have betwixt Ninety and One Hundred Men on board, of which he must have loft a great Number, as the Surf was high on the Beach, which prevented me from fending my Boats in to cut away his Masts, which was the only Thing that could be done, as the Sea was going half Mast up on board of him; they brought a heavy Gun down on Shore to bear on us, but I am happy to inform your Lordship did us no Damage: I have no Person hurt on board. On the 28th, I flood into the Bay to fee what was become of him; found him a complete Wreck, with his Mizen Mast over the Side.

On this Occasion I am forry to add the Service has to lament the Lois of Lieutenant Watson, who commanded the boarding Party, together with that of One Serjeant, One Corporal, and Two Private Marines, killed; and Four Seamen and Five Ma-

rines, wounded.

BE pleased to inform my Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, that, having received Informa-tion of a small Spanish Privateer plundering a Dane off the Burlings, I directed Lieutenant Hemings, of the Richmond Gun-Brig, to proceed off there, and endeavour to take and destroy her. And I have much Pleasure in inclosing a Copy of Lieutenant Hemings's Letter to me of the 20th Instant, informing me of his having done fo; and much Credit is due to his Sub-Lieutenant, Mr. Bush, for his gallant Conduct in effecting it, against a Superiority of Force opposed to, and ready to receive, him.

I have fent Eleven of the Prisoners on board the Fortunée, to be fent to England by the first Conveyance; the other, being badly wounded, remains on board this Ship.

AGREEABLE to your Order of the 12th, I loft no Time in proceeding off the Burlings; but the Wind blowing hard, with a heavy Sea from the Northward, I did not reach them before the 16th. I continued to beat to the Northward, towards Cape Maudigo, till the 19th, when, feeing a Lugger with Spanish Colours flying, at Anchor in a little Bay, (not laid down in any of my Charts,) about Six Leagues to the Northward of Peruche, I immediately began Preparations for destroying her; and having ordered the Gig and Jolly Boat to be got ready as soon as it was dark. I fent them away, and, about Ten o'Clock, the Boats returned with

the Lugger. Mr. Bush, my Sub-Lieutenant, and Ebenezer Lyons, my Boatfwain's-Mate, who commanded the Boats, informed me that the Veffel was perfectly prepared, and that the discharged Four large Guns at them as foon as she perceived they were within her Reach, by which, I am forry to fay, Three of our Men were wounded, One, I fear,

dangeroufly.

I must beg Leave to recommend the Forbearance of the Officers and Men on this Occasion; who, notwithstanding the heavy Guns that were opposed to them, carried her Sword in Hand. She had Thirty-fix Men on board, all of whom jumped overboard, or were otherwise disposed of, except Twelve, which are made Prisoners, some of them are badly wounded. She proves to be the Galliard, of Vigo, Four Four-Pounders, and Thirty-fix Men; has been cruizing on this Station Two Months, and is, no doubt, the Vessel that has committed so many Depredations on the Trade of England, as well as other Nations. Her Captain is a Prisoner, and among the Wounded.

According to your Orders I destroyed her as foon as I possibly could after Possession.
