It would at all Times be highly improper to trespass unnecessarily on your Majesty's invaluable Time, but more especially in the present arduous and eventful Conjunction of public Affairs; we therefore feel it our Duty, as briefly as may be, most humbly to observe, that we scarcely thought it possible that any Event could have added to that grateful Sense which we had long entertained of your Majesty's uniformly wise, mild, and just Government since your Accession to the Throne of these Realms; and yet your Majesty's recent Opposition to what you conscientiously thought had a Tendency to injure, eventually, our unrivalled Constitution in Church and State, as by Law established, and which your Majesty had sworn to maintain inviolate, has made so indelible an Impression upon us, that for such a striking Instance of firm, dignified, and unshaken Resistance, we beg most cordially to thank your Majesty, subjoining a most faithful Assurance that there is no Sacrifice which we will not at all Times be ready to make to protect your Majesty in the just Exercise of your Royal Prerogative, and in resisting all unconstitutional Encroachments on our civil and ecclesiastical Establishments. We are, may it please your Majesty, with the most profound Veneration, your Majesty's most faithful and most affectionate Subjects, the Master, Wardens, &c. &c. of the Town of Sheffield.
