A T the Court at the Queen's Palace, the 13th of May 1807,

PRESENT,

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council. / HEREAS by Order in Council, bearing Date the Eleventh of June, One thousand eight hundred and fix, His Majefty was pleafed, among other Things contained in the faid Order, to declare it, to be, His Pleafure that no Goods, Wares, or Merchandize which fhould be imported into the Settlement of the Cape of Good Hope, or the Territories or Dependencies thereof, from any Part of His Majefty's Dominions, fhould be fubject to any Duty ; His Majefty having taken into His Royal Confideration the prefent State of the Trade, Commerce, and Revenues of the faid Settlement, and the Territories and Dependencies thereof, is hereby pleafed, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, to revoke, and doth hereby revoke, fo much of the faid Order of the Eleventh of June, One thoufand eight hundred and fix, as exempts from Duty any Goods, Wares, or Merchandize which shall, after due Notice to be given by the Governor of the faid Settlement, as hereinafter-directed, be imported into the faid Settlement, or the Territories or Dependencies thereof, except Goods, Wares, and Merchandizes of the Growth, Produce, or Manufacture of Great Britain or Ireland, and fo much of the faid Order shall, from and after fuch due Notice, ceafe and determine : And His Majefty is further pleafed to declare, and it is hereby declared, that it fhall and may be lawful for the Governor of the faid Settlement, and of the Territories and Dependencies thereof, for the Time being, to impose on all Goods, Wares, and Merchandize not of the Growth, Produce, or Manufacture of Great Britain or Ireland, which shall be imported into the faid Settlement, or the Territories or Dependencies thereof, from any Part of His Majefty's Dominions after fuch due Notice, a Duty not exceeding Fifteen per Cent. on the Value thereof, fuch Duty to be rated and collected in the fame Manner as is in Ufe with Regard to the Import Duty now levied at the faid Settlement, and the Territories and Dependencies thereof, from and in Ships and Veffels belonging to the Subjects of Countries and States in Amity with His Majefty, and upon the Goods and Merchandize imported in the fame; provided always, that the Time of the Commencement of fuch Duty shall be fixed in the Proclamation, or other lawful Inftrument, which shall be made and iffued by the faid. Governor for the Purpole of impoling fuch Duty, which Time shall not be lefs than Six Months from the Day of ifluing fuch Proclamation or other lawful Instrument : And provided alfo, that the Rate of Duty imposed on the Importation of Goods (not the Growth, Produce, or Manufacture of Great Britain or Ireland) from any Part of His Majefty's Dominions, when so imported in British-built Veffels, owned and navigated according to Law, fhall in no Cafe be fo high as that which shall be imposed on the like Goods fo imported in the Veffels of Foreign States. W HEREAS in virtue of the Powers vefted in His Majefty by an Act, paffed in the Fortyfixth Year of His Majefty's Reign, intituled "An Act for reviving and continuing feveral Laws of Cuftoms relative to the effablishing Courts of Judicature in the Island of Newfoundland ; and to the prohibiting the Exportation from, and permitting the Importation to, Great Britain of Corn ; and for allowing the Importation of other Articles of Provifion without Payment of Duty, until the Twentyfifth Day of March, One thousand eight hundred and nine ; and for continuing feveral Laws relating to the granting a Bounty upon certain Species of British and Irish Linens exported from Great Britain, and taking off the Dutics on Importation into Great Britain of Foreign Raw Linen Yarns made of Flax; to the granting a Bounty upon the Importation into Great Britain of Hemp, and rough and undreffed Flax, from His Majefty's Colonies in America ; and to the Encouragement of the Greenland Whale Fifhery; and for reviving and continuing feveral Laws relating to the regulating the Prices at which Corn and Grain may be exported from Great Britain to Ireland, and from Ireland to Great Britain; and to the Admiffion to Entry in Great Britain of Oil and Blubber of Newfoundland, taken by His Majefty's Subjects carrying on the Fifhery from, and refiding in, the faid Ifland ; and for continuing an Act of the Twenty-third Year of His prefent Majelty, for the more effectual Encouragement of the Manufactures of Flax and Cotton in Great Britain; and for reviving and continuing feveral Laws relating to the permitting the Importation into Great Britain of Hides and other Articles in Foreign Ships; and to the prohibiting the Exportation from Ireland of Corn and Potatoes, or other Provisions ; and to the permitting the Importation into Ireland of Corn, Fifh, and Provisions without Payment of Duty, until the Twenty-fifth Day of March, One thousand eight hundred and eight; and for reviving and continuing an A&, paffed in the Parliament of Ireland in the Twentyfifth Year of His prefent Majelty, for the Encouragement of the Flaxen and Hemp Manufactures of Ireland, until the Twenty-fifth Day of March One thousand eight hundred and twenty-feven; and for amending and further continuing an AA, made in the Seventh Year of His prefent Majefty, for the free Importation into Great Britain of Cochineal and Indigo, until the Twenty-fifth Day of March, One thousand eight hundred and nine :" It was, amongst other Things, enacted, that an Act, made in the Forty-fourth Year of His prefent Majelty, intituled An Act for permitting, until the Fifth Day of May, One thousand eight hundred and five, the Importation of Hides, Calf-Skins, Horns, Tallow, and Wool, (except Cotton Wool,) in Foreign Ships, on Payment of the like Duties, as if imported in British or Irish Ships; which, by an Act made in the Forty-fifth Year of His Majefty's Reign, was revived and further continued until the Twenty fifth Day of March One thousand eight hundred and fix, and extended to Goat Skins imported in Foreign Ships, fhould be, and the fame was thereby revived and further continued until the Twenty-fifth Day of March One thousand eight hundred and eight : And whereas His Majefty was pleafed by His Order in Council, bearing Date the Twenty-fixth Day of November, One thousand eight hundred and fix, to permit, for the Space of Six Months, the Importation in Foreign Ships of any Hides, Pieces of Hides, dreffed or undreffed, Calf-Skins, or Pieces of Calf-

Horns, Tallow, and Wool, (except Cotton Wool,) and Goat Skins dreffed or undreffed, on the Duties specified in the faid Order : And whereas it is judged expedient that the faid Permiffion fhould be continued for fome Time longer, His Majefty is thereupon pleafed, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, to allow, and doth hereby allow, for and during the Space of Six Months, to commence from the Twenty-fixth Day of this inftant May, the Importation of any Hides, Pieces of Hides, dreffed or undreffed, Calf-Skins, or Pieces of Calf-Skins, dreffed or undreffed, Horns, or Pieces of Horns, Tallow, and Wool, (except Cotton Wool,) and Goat Skins, dreffed or undreffed, in any Foreign Ship or Veffel; and that, on the Arrival at any Port of the United Kingdom of any Foreign Ship or Veffel, with any of the Articles above mentioned, the faid Goods shall be admitted to Entry on Payment of the fame Duties of Cuftoms and Excife as are due and payable on the like Goods when imported in any British or Irish-built Ship or Veffel .- And the Right Honourable the Lords Commiffioners of His Majefty's Treafury are to give the neceffary Directions herein accordingly. WHEREAS Hoffilities have taken place between His Majefty and the Sublime Porte, it is this Day ordered by His Majefty, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, that no Ships or Veffels belonging to any of His Majefty's Subjects be permitted to enter and clear out for any of the Ports within the Dominions of the Grand Signor until further Order; and His Majefty is further pleafed to order, that a General Embargo or Stop be made of all Ships and Veffels whatfoever, belonging to the Subjects of the Grand Signor, now within, or which shall hereafter come into any of the Ports, Harbours, or Roads, within any Part of His Majesty's Dominions, together with all Perfons and Effects on board all fuch Ships and Veffels; and that the Commanders of His Majefty's Ships of War and Privateers do detain and bring into Port, all Ships and Veffels belonging to the Subjects of the Grand Signor, or bearing the Flag of the Ottoman Empire; but that the utmolt Care be taken for the Prefervation of all and every Part of the Cargoes on board any of the faid Ships or Veffels, fo that no Damage or Embezzlement whatever be fuftained; and the Commanders of His Majefty's Ships of War and Privateers are hereby inftructed to detain and bring into Port every fuch Ship and Veffel accordingly :- And the Right Honourable the Lords Commiffioners of His Majefty's Trealury, the Lords Commiffioners of the Admiralty, and the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, are to give the neceffary Directions herein as to them Skins, dreffed or undreffed, Horns, or Pieces of | may respectively appertain. The KING's Moft Excellent Majefty in Council.

HEREAS the City, Town, and Fortrefs of Montevideo, and its Dependencies, have been conquered by His Majefty's Forces, and the Territory and Forts of the fame are delivered up to His Majefty, and the fame are now in His Majefty's Poffeffion; His Majefty is thereupon pleafed to order and declare, and it is hereby ordered and declared, that all His loving Subjects may lawfully trade to and from the faid City, Town, and Fortrels of Montevideo, and its Dependencies, being in His Majefty's Poffeffion, including therein all and every the Territories belonging to or forming a Part of the Government of the fame; and that fuch Trade shall be fubject to the fame Duties, Rules, Regulations, Conditions, Restrictions, Penalties, and Forfeitures, to which the Trade to and from His Majefty's Colonies, Plantations, and Islands in the Weft Indies and South America is or fhall be fubject by Law, except that in Cafes where Duties have been, or fhall be, imposed by His Majefty's Commander in Chief, or Governor for the Time being, of the faid City, Town, or Fortrefs of Montevideo, the faid Duties shall in such Cafes be paid, and none other, until His Majefty's Pleafure therein shall be further declared.

And His Majefty is further pleafed to order and declare, and it is hereby ordered and declared, that all Commodities, being of the Growth, Produce, or Manufacture of the faid City, Town, and Fortrefs of Montevideo, and its Dependencies, being in His Majefty's Poffeflion, including therein all and every the Territories belonging to, or forming a Part of the Government of the fame, or which have been ufually exported therefrom, fhall be permitted to be imported into any Ports of the United Kingdom ; and that fuch Commodities fhall be fubject to the fame Duties, Rules, Regulations, Reftrictions, Conditions, Fenalties, and Forfeitures, as Articles of the like Sort are fubject to, coming from His Majefty's Colonies, Plantations, or Iflands in the Weft Indies or South America.

And it is hereby further ordered and declared, That it fhall not be lawful for any Slave or Slaves to be landed or imported, or brought into the faid City, Town, and Fortrels of Montevideo, and its Dependencies, including therein all and every the Territories belonging to, or forming a Part of, the Government of the fame as aforefaid, upon Pain of the Penalties and Forfeitures in that Cafe by Law provided:—And the Right Honourable the Lords Commiffioners of His Majefly's Treafury, and the Lords Commiffioners of the Admiralty, are to give the neceffary Directions herein, as to them may refpectively appertain. *W.
