## ELECTION OF A TEMPORAL PEER OF IRELAND.

WHEREAS Hostilities have taken place between His Majesty and the Sublime Porte, it is this Day ordered by His Majesty, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, that no Ships or Vessels belonging to any of His Majesty's Subjects be permitted to enter and clear out for any of the Ports within the Dominions of the Grand Signor until further Order; and His Majesty is further pleased to order, that a General Embargo or Stop be made of all Ships and Vessels whatsoever, belonging to the Subjects of the Grand Signor, now within, or which shall hereafter come into any of the Ports, Harbours, or Roads, within any Part of His Majesty's Dominions, together

with all Persons and Effects on board all such Ships and Vessels; and that the Commanders of His Majesty's Ships of War and Privateers do detain and bring into Port, all Ships and Vessels belonging to the Subjects of the Grand Signor, or bearing the Flag of the Ottoman Empire; but that the utmost Care be taken for the Preservation of all and every Part of the Cargoes on board any of the said Ships or Vessels, so that no Damage or Embezzlement whatever be sustained; and the Commanders of His Majesty's Ships of War and Privateers are hereby instructed to detain and bring into Port every such Ship and Vessel accordingly:—And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, and the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, are to give the necessary Directions herein as to them may respectively appertain. *W. WHEREAS the City, Town, and Fortrefs of Montevideo, and its Dependencies, have been conquered by His Majesty's Forces, and the Territory and Forts of the same are delivered up to His Majesty, and the same are now in His Majesty's Possession; His Majesty is thereupon pleased to order and declare, and it is hereby ordered and declared, that all His loving Subjects may lawfully trade to and from the said City, Town, and Fortrefs of Montevideo, and its Dependencies, being in His Majesty's Possession, including therein all and every the Territories belonging to or forming a Part of the Government of the same; and that such Trade shall be subject to the same Duties, Rules, Regulations, Conditions, Restrictions, Penalties, and Forfeitures, to which the Trade to and from His Majesty's Colonies, Plantations, and Islands in the West Indies and South America is or shall be subject by Law, except that in Cases where Duties have been, or shall be, imposed by His Majesty's Commander in Chief, or Governor for the Time being, of the said City, Town, or Fortrefs of Montevideo, the said Duties shall in such Cases be paid, and none other, until His Majesty's Pleasure therein shall be further declared.

And His Majesty is further pleased to order and declare, and it is hereby ordered and declared, that all Commodities, being of the Growth, Produce, or Manufacture of the said City, Town, and Fortrefs of Montevideo, and its Dependencies, being in His Majesty's Possession, including therein all and every the Territories belonging to, or forming a Part of the Government of the same, or which have been usually exported therefrom, shall be permitted to be imported into any Ports of the United Kingdom; and that such Commodities shall be subject to the same Duties, Rules, Regulations, Restrictions, Conditions, Penalties, and Forfeitures, as Articles of the like Sort are subject to, coming from His Majesty's Colonies, Plantations, or Islands in the West Indies or South America.

And it is hereby further ordered and declared, That it shall not be lawful for any Slave or Slaves to be landed or imported, or brought into the said

City, Town, and Fortrefs of Montevideo, and its Dependencies, including therein all and every the Territories belonging to, or forming a Part of, the Government of the fame as aforefaid, upon Pain of the Penalties and Forfeitures in that Cafe by Law provided:—And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, and the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, are to give the neceffary Directions herein, as to them may refpectively appertain.

WHEREAS by Order in Council, bearing Date the Eleventh of June, One thousand eight hundred and fix, His Majesty was pleafed, among other Things contained in the faid Order, to declare it to be His Pleafure that no Goods, Wares, or Merchandize which fhould be imported into the Settlement of the Cape of Good Hope, or the Territories or Dependencies thereof, from any Part of His Majesty's Dominions, fhould be fubject to any Duty; His Majesty having taken into His Royal Confideration the prefent State of the Trade, Commerce, and Revenues of the faid Settlement, and the Territories and Dependencies thereof, is hereby pleafed, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, to revoke, and doth hereby revoke, fo much of the faid Order of the Eleventh of June, One thousand eight hundred and fix, as exempts from Duty any Goods, Wares, or Merchandize which fhall, after due Notice to be given by the Governor of the faid Settlement, as hereinafter directed, be imported into the faid Settlement, or the Territories or Dependencies thereof, except Goods, Wares, and Merchandizes of the Growth, Produce, or Manufacture of Great Britain or Ireland, and fo much of the faid Order fhall, from and after fuch due Notice, ceafe and determine: And His Majesty is further pleafed to declare, and it is hereby declared, that it fhall and may be lawful for the Governor of the faid Settlement, and of the Territories and Dependencies thereof, for the Time being, to impofe on all Goods, Wares, and Merchandize not of the Growth, Produce, or Manufacture, of Great Britain or Ireland, which fhall be imported into the faid Settlement, or the Territories or Dependencies thereof, from any Part of His Majesty's Dominions after fuch due Notice, a Duty not exceeding Fifteen per Cent. on the Value thereof, fuch Duty to be rated and collected in the fame Manner as is in Ufe with Regard to the Import Duty now levied at the faid Settlement, and the Territories and Dependencies thereof, from and in Ships and Veffels belonging to the Subjects of Countries and States in Amity with His Majesty, and upon the Goods and Merchandize imported in the fame; provided always, that the Time of the Commencement of fuch Duty fhall be fixed in the Proclamation, or other lawful Instrument, which fhall be made and iffued by the faid Governor for the Purpose of impofing fuch Duty, which Time fhall not be lefs than Six Months from the Day of iffuing fuch Proclamation or other lawful Instrument: And provided alfo, that the Rate

WHEREAS in virtue of the Powers vefted in His Majesty by an Act, paffed in the Forty-fixth Year of His Majesty's Reign, intituled "An Act for reviving and continuing feveral Laws of Customs relative to the eftablifhing Courts of Judicature in the Ifland of Newfoundland; and to the prohibiting the Exportation from, and permitting the Importation to, Great Britain of Corn; and for allowing the Importation of other Articles of Provision without Payment of Duty, until the Twenty-fifth Day of March, One thousand eight hundred and nine; and for continuing feveral Laws relating to the granting a Bounty upon certain Species of British and Irish Linens exported from Great Britain, and taking off the Duties on Importation into Great Britain of Foreign Raw Linen Yarns made of Flax; to the granting a Bounty upon the Importation into Great Britain of Hemp, and rough and undreffed Flax, from His Majesty's Colonies in America; and to the Encouragement of the Greenland Whale Fishery; and for reviving and continuing feveral Laws relating to the regulating the Prices at which Corn and Grain may be exported from Great Britain to Ireland, and from Ireland to Great Britain; and to the Admiffion to Entry in Great Britain of Oil and Blubber of Newfoundland, taken by His Majesty's Subjects carrying on the Fishery from, and refiding in, the faid Ifland; and for continuing an Act of the Twenty-third Year of His prefent Majesty, for the more effectual Encouragement of the Manufactures of Flax and Cotton in Great Britain; and for reviving and continuing feveral Laws relating to the permitting the Importation into Great Britain of Hides and other Articles in Foreign Ships; and to the prohibiting the Exportation from Ireland of Corn and Potatoes, or other Provisions; and to the permitting the Importation into Ireland of Corn, Fish, and Provisions without Payment of Duty, until the Twenty-fifth Day of March, One thousand eight hundred and eight; and for reviving and continuing an Act, paffed in the Parliament of Ireland in the Twenty-fifth Year of His prefent Majesty, for the Encouragement of the Flaxen and Hemp Manufactures of Ireland, until the Twenty-fifth Day of March One thousand eight hundred and twenty-feven; and for amending and further continuing an Act, made in the Seventh Year of His prefent Majesty, for the free Importation into Great Britain of Cochineal and Indigo, until the Twenty-fifth Day of March, One thousand eight hundred and nine:" It was, amongst other Things, enacted, that an Act, made in the Forty-fourth Year of His prefent Majesty, intituled An Act for permitting, until the Fifth



Day of May, One thousand eight hundred and five, the Importation of Hides, Calf-Skins, Horns, Tallow, and Wool, (except Cotton Wool,) in Foreign Ships, on Payment of the like Duties, as if imported in British or Irish Ships; which, by an Act made in the Forty-fifth Year of His Majesty's Reign, was revived and further continued until the Twenty-fifth Day of March One thousand eight hundred and six, and extended to Goat Skins imported in Foreign Ships, should be, and the same was thereby revived and further continued until the Twenty-fifth Day of March One thousand eight hundred and eight: And whereas His Majesty was pleased by His Order in Council, bearing Date the Twenty-sixth Day of November, One thousand eight hundred and six, to permit, for the Space of Six Months, the Importation in Foreign Ships of any Hides, Pieces of Hides, dressed or undressed, Calf Skins, or Pieces of Calf-Skins, dressed or undressed, Horns, or Pieces of Horns, Tallow, and Wool, (except Cotton Wool,) and Goat Skins dressed or undressed, on the Duties specified in the said Order: And whereas it is judged expedient that the said Permission should be continued for some Time longer, His Majesty is thereupon pleased, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, to allow, and doth hereby allow, for and during the Space of Six Months, to commence from the Twenty-sixth Day of this instant May, the Importation of any Hides, Pieces of Hides, dressed or undressed, Calf-Skins, or Pieces of Calf-Skins, dressed or undressed, Horns, or Pieces of Horns, Tallow, and Wool, (except Cotton Wool,) and Goat Skins, dressed or undressed, in any Foreign Ship or Vessel; and that, on the Arrival at any Port of the United Kingdom of any Foreign Ship or Vessel, with any of the Articles above mentioned, the said Goods shall be admitted to Entry on Payment of the same Duties of Customs and Excise as are due and payable on the like Goods when imported in any British or Irish-built Ship or Vessel.—And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury are to give the necessary Directions herein accordingly.
