P R E S E N T,

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS the Time limited by His Majesty's Order in Council of the Nineteenth Day of November last, for prohibiting the Exportation out of this Kingdom, or carrying Coastwise, Gunpowder or Salt-Petre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, will expire upon the Sixth Day of June next: And whereas it is judged expedient for His Majesty's Service, and the Safety of this Kingdom, that the said Prohibition should be continued for some Time longer, His Majesty doth therefore, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby order, require, prohibit, and command, that no Person or Persons whatsoever, (except the Master General of the Ordnance for His Majesty's Service,) do at any Time, during the Space of Six Months, to commence from the said Sixth Day of June next, presume to transport into any Parts out of this Kingdom, or carry Coastwise, any Gunpowder or Salt-Petre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, or ship or lade any Gunpowder or Salt-Petre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition on board any Ship or Vessel, in order to transporting the same into any Parts beyond the Seas, or carrying the same Coastwise, without Leave or Permission in that Behalf first obtained from His Majesty or His Privy Council, upon Pain of incurring and suffering the respective Forfeitures and Penalties inflicted by an Act passed in the Twenty-ninth Year of His late Majesty's Reign, intituled "An Act to empower His Majesty to prohibit the Exportation of Salt-Petre, and to enforce the Law for empowering His Majesty to prohibit the Exportation of Gunpowder, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition; and also to empower His Majesty to restrain the carrying Coastwise of Salt Petre, Gunpowder, or any Sort of Arms or

"Ammunition:"—And the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, the Master-General and the rest of the principal Officers of the Ordnance, and His Majesty's Secretary at War, are to give the necessary Directions herein, as to them may respectively appertain. *W. The humble Address of the Bishop, the Dean and Chapter, the College, the Archdeacons, and Clergy of the Diocese of Hereford.

SIRE,

WE, your Majesty's loyal Subjects, beg Leave to express our grateful Sense of the inestimable Blessings of civil and religious Liberty so long and eminently enjoyed by us under your paternal Government. To this Act of Duty we feel ourselves more especially impelled by your recent dignified Protection of that Establishment in Church and State, which can alone render those Blessings secure and permanent.

The mild Policy of your Majesty's Reign, which has relieved our Catholic Brethren from their grievous civil Disabilities, and permitted to them the unrestrained Worship of God according to the Dictates of their Conscience, and the Ritual of their Church, is not less grateful to our Feelings than agreeable to our Reason, and congenial with the Spirit of our most holy Religion. We shall sincerely rejoice in the Extension of a Policy so liberal and enlightened to the utmost Limits compatible with our national Safety; but we must, at the same Time, offer the Homage of our Hearts and Understanding to the pure Motive and sound Wisdom of the patriot King, who withholds political Power and Pre-eminence from those to whom the Constitution of our Protestant Monarchy has necessarily denied it. We wish, Sire, to preserve "the ancient Landmark which our Fathers have set," and to maintain the Ascendancy of that Protestant Principle which seated your Majesty's illustrious House upon the Throne of this

Kingdom. To the progressive Operation and ameliorating Influence of that Principle we attribute every Advance made by our Church towards Christian Purity, and every Accession gained to political Liberty; all the Improvements of a Reformed Religion, and all the Benefits of a glorious Revolution.

We deeply lament, Sire, but know not whether to attach our Pity or our Censure to the weak or the dissingenuous Conduct of those among your late confidential Servants, who ventured to introduce a public Measure as conformable to your Majesty's Will, which directly contradicted the known Conviction and determined Purpose of your firm and enlightened Mind. We cannot but mark with our most decided Disapprobation every Attempt to violate, in your Majesty's sacred Person and Character, that Liberty of Conscience with which every moral Being is invested by the Author of his Nature, and in the full Enjoyment of which the humblest of your Subjects is protected by the Laws of this Land.

Be assured, Sire, that as in the national Spirit and Resources your will find a Tower of Strength against your foreign Foes, so will the Father of his People ever have in their Gratitude, their Love, and their Veneration, a sure Defence against every rude Invasion of his personal Peace and Comfort, and against every undutiful Interference with the free Exercise of his undoubted Prerogative. Our fervent Prayer to him who ruleth in the Kingdoms of Men is, that he may long spare a Life dear to the Hearts of all your loyal Subjects, and enable you to continue to dispense Happiness to every Class of your People by the paternal Exercise of your public Power, and to instruct them by the Example of your private Life.

The renewed Appointment of Francis Lord Napier to represent your Royal Person in this Assembly, we regard as a most acceptable Proof of your Majesty's Approbation and Favour. Our Experience of the Ability with which he executes the Duties of his high Trust, and of his Zeal for maintaining the Privileges of the Church of Scotland, have ensured to him our respectful and cordial Attachment.

The Approbation which your Majesty is pleased to express of our Exertions in promoting the Objects which, on former Occasions, your paternal Wisdom has recommended to our Care, while it excites our Gratitude, and strengthens our Affection towards

We feel all the Importance of the Trust reposed in us by your Majesty, and all the Value of that Praise with which your Majesty is graciously pleased to honour us; and we pray earnestly to Almighty God, that he would fit us to lead our People in the Ways of Righteousness, and to support them, by the wholesome Doctrines of the Gospel, in the Hour of Trial.

We entreat your Majesty to accept our humble Acknowledgment for your continued Attention to the religious Interests of the Highlands and Islands of Scotland. It shall be our endeavour to apply your royal Bounty so as most effectually to promote the Object for which it is bestowed.

That Almighty God, the Father of our Lord Jesus Christ, may protect your Majesty's Person, and prosper your Government; that he may bless abundantly our gracious Queen, the Prince and Princess of Wales, and all the Members of your illustrious House; that he may long continue to us the Blessings which we enjoy under your Majesty's auspicious Reign; and that he may bestow upon you hereafter a Crown of Glory, are the Prayers of, May it please your Majesty, your Majesty's most faithful, most obedient, and most loyal Subjects, the Ministers and Elders met in this National Assembly of the Church of Scotland.

MAY it please your Majesty to accept the humble Expression of the dutiful and loyal Sentiments with which the General Assembly of the Church of Scotland presume to approach their gracious Sovereign.

It is the Happiness of your People that, during an auspicious Reign of Forty-seven Years, the Conduct of your Majesty has been uniformly governed by the Principles which placed the House of Brunswick upon the Throne of these Realms; and the Ministers and Elders of the Church of Scotland, attached to those Principles from Conviction, as well as by their Habits and Institutions, recollect with peculiar Satisfaction that your Majesty has exhibited the brightest Example of a sacred Regard to the Protestant Reformed Religion. While, in the Series of Indulgencies to your Roman Catholic Subjects, which has marked your Majesty's Reign, we recognize the enlightened Operation of a mild and tolerant Spirit, we have always found your Majesty the faithful Guardian of the Protestant Establishment. We have lately seen the Fences of that Establishment upheld by the firm and dignified Exercise of the constitutional Prerogative of the Crown; and feeling the Security which all our Rights and Privileges derive from the Solitude with which your Majesty discharges the Duties of the Sovereign of a free People, we unite with our Fellow-Subjects in offering the affectionate Tribute justly due to the royal Cares for the public Welfare.

While we hear with Admiration and Gratitude of the gallant Achievements of your Majesty's Forces by Sea and Land, we behold all around us submitting patiently to the Burdens and Sacrifices to which the Voice of their Country calls them; and we account it our bounden Duty to exert all our Influence in cherishing that true Patriotism which unites all Orders of Men in the national Defence.

That the God of Battles may bless your Majesty's Arms; that the Wisdom and Vigour of your Majesty's Councils may continue to establish your Throne in the Hearts of your Subjects; and that the British Sceptre may, till the latest Posterity be swayed by Princes of your illustrious House, formed by your Example to maintain the Liberties, and to possess the Confidence of a grateful People, are the
