To the KING's Most Excellent Majesty,

The humble Address of the Mayor, Recorder, Aldermen, Sheriff, and Common-Council of the ancient City of Canterbury, in Burghmote assembled.

May it please your Majesty,

WE, the Mayor, Recorder, Aldermen, Sheriff, and Common-Council of your ancient City of Canterbury, humbly beg Leave to express to your Majesty our most grateful Thanks for the Firmness your Majesty has manifested, in the Exercise of the just Prerogative of the Crown, on a Question of so much Importance, not only to the Religion of the Country, as by Law established, but to the dearest Interests of your Majesty's affectionate Subjects.

When we consider the paternal Care which your Majesty has at all Times evinced in the Support and Maintenance of our happy Constitution, how much must we feel animated with the most lively Zeal and Attachment to your Majesty's Person and Family, when we have this Re-assurance, that your Majesty's only Anxiety is the Preservation of that Constitution inviolate both in Church and State, and the Happiness and Prosperity of your People.

We most fervently pray that Providence may long preserve your Majesty to reign over a dutiful, loyal, and grateful Nation; and that those Blessings which we have uniformly enjoyed under your Majesty's benign Reign, may descend to our latest Posterity.

To the KING's Most Excellent Majesty,

WE, your Majesty's most faithful and loyal Subjects, the Freeholders, Justices of the Peace, and Commissioners of Supply of the County of Cromarty, ever impressed with the deepest Feelings of Affection and Duty for the paternal Anxiety which your Majesty has always shewn for the Interests of your People, beg Leave, more particularly at the present Time, to approach your Majesty with the strongest Expressions of Admiration and Gratitude for the Resolution and Steadiness you have so laudably manifested on a recent Occasion, in opposing, by a proper and reasonable Exercise of your Royal Prerogative, Measures directed against the Peace and Tranquillity of your Protestant Subjects, and which might ultimately have tended to have weakened the Foundation of our civil Constitution, connected as it is with the Established Religion of the Country.
