P R E S E N T,

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS the Time limited by His Majesty's Order in Council of the Nineteenth Day of November last, for prohibiting the Exportation out of this Kingdom, or carrying Coastwise, Gunpowder or Salt-Petre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, will expire upon the Sixth Day of June next: And whereas it is judged expedient for His Majesty's Service, and the Safety of this Kingdom, that the said Prohibition should be continued for some Time longer, His Majesty doth therefore, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby order, require, prohibit, and command, that no Person or Persons whatsoever, (except the Master-General of the Ordnance for His Majesty's Service,) do at any Time, during the Space of Six Months, to commence from the said Sixth Day of June next, presume to transport into any Parts out of this Kingdom, or carry Coastwise, any Gunpowder or Salt-Petre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition, or ship or lade any Gunpowder or Salt-Petre, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition on board any Ship or Vessel, in order to transporting the same into any Parts beyond the Seas, or carrying the same Coastwise, without Leave or Permission in that Behalf first obtained from His Majesty or His Privy Council, upon Pain of incurring and suffering the respective Forfeitures and Penalties inflicted by an Act passed in the Twenty-ninth Year of His late Majesty's Reign, intituled "An Act to empower His Majesty to prohibit the Exportation of Salt-Petre, and to enforce the Law for empowering His Majesty to prohibit the Exportation of Gunpowder, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition; and also to empower His Majesty to restrain the carrying Coastwise of Salt Petre, Gunpowder, or any Sort of Arms or Ammunition:"—And the Right Honorable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, the Master-General and the rest of the principal Officers of the Ordnance, and

His Majesty's Secretary at War, are to give the necessary Directions herein, as to them may respectively appertain. *W. Fawkener.*

To the KING's Most Excellent Majesty.

WE, your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Dean and Canons of the Free Chapel of *St. George*, within your Majesty's Castle at *Windsor*, beg Leave to approach your Majesty with the Expression of our heartfelt Gratitude for the recent Proof which we have witnessed of your Majesty's persevering Solicitude for the Interests of Religion, in the Resistance of Measures which we conceive to be prejudicial to the Established Church, and, consequently, repugnant to the Principles upon which, under the good Providence of God, your Majesty is seated on the Throne of these Realms

Aware of our peculiar Duties as Ministers of Religion, we are not desirous to intrude into Questions of State; but we humbly conceive that, in every Question which so immediately relates to the Well-being of the Church to which we belong, the very Character which we bear calls upon us to express the Interest which we feel, and at this peculiar Juncture, openly to avow the Sense which we entertain of the Firmness and Magnanimity with which the Prospect of Danger to the Ecclesiastical Constitution has been so seasonably provided against, and so effectually repelled.

With the Experience of the whole Course of your Majesty's long and auspicious Reign before us, we did not stand in Need of this additional Evidence to convince us, that we can possess no better Security for the Preservation of our religious Rights and Privileges, than that of your Majesty's Protection and Support; and we therefore humbly beg to join with our Thanks to Almighty God for so signal a Mark of Divine Favour to this Nation, our fervent Prayer, that he may be graciously pleased long to preserve your Majesty's valuable Life; that the inestimable Blessings which we enjoy under your mild
