Council, is further pleafed to order, and doth hereby order, that not withflanding any Thing hereinbefore contained, the faid Permission and Authority to import and export shall cease and determine, or be varied and altered, before the Expiration of the abovementioned Period of Twelve Months, at the Expiration of Six Months after the Notification in the London Gazette, of any Order of His Majesty, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, for revoking, varying, or altering such Permission and Authority, or shall cease and determine at the Ex-piration of Six Months after the Ratification of a Definitive Treaty of Peace. WHEREAS the Time limited by His Majesty's Order in Council of the Twenty-second Day of December iast, prohibiting the transporting into any Parts out of this Kingdom of any Pig-Iron, Bar-Iron, Hemp, Pitch, Tar, Rofin, Turpentine, Anchors, Cables, Cordage, Mafts, Yards, Bowfprits, Oars, Oakum, Sheet-Copper, or other Naval Stores, will expire upon the Eleventh Day of this infrant July: And whereas it is judged expedient for His Majesty's Service, and the Safety of this Kingdom, that the faid Prohibition should be continued for some Time longer, His Majesty doth therefore, with the Advice of His Privy Council, hereby order, require, prohibit, and command, that no Person or Persons whosoever do at any Time, for the Space of Six Months, from the said Eleventh Day of this inflant July, prefume to transport into any Parts out of this Kingdom any Pig-Iron, Bar-Iron, Hemp, Pitch, Tar, Rosin, Turpentine, Anchors, Cables, Cordage, Masts, Yards, Bowsprits, Oars, Oakum, Sheet-Copper, or other Naval Stores, or do ship or lade any Pig-Iron, Bar-Iron, Hemp, Pitch, Tar, Rosin, Turpentine, Anchors, Carlos, Cordage, Maste, Yarde, Bousfarits, Oars, Carlos, Cordage, Maste, Yarde, Bousfarits, Oars, Carlos, Carlos Cables, Cordage, Masts, Yards, Bowsprits, Oars, Oakum, Sheet Copper, or other Naval Stores, on board any Ship or Vessel, in order to transporting the same into any Parts beyond the Seas, without I eave or Permission first being had and obtained from His Majefly or His Privy Council, upon Pain of incurring the Forfeitures inflicted by an Act paffed in the Thirty-third Year of His Majesty's Reign, intituled " An Act to enable His Majetty 46 to restrain the Exportation of Naval Stores, and 66 more effectually to prevent the Exportation of "Salt-Petre, Arms, and Ammunition, when pro-"hibited by Proclamation or Order in Council:" But it is nevertheless His Majesty's Pleasure, that nothing herein contained shall extend, or be construed to extend, to any of His Majesty's Ships of War, or any other Ships or Veffels or Boats in the Service of His Majetty, or employed or freighted by His Majetty's Board of Ordnance, or by the Commissioners of His Majesty's Navy; nor to prevent any Ship or Vessel from taking or having on board fuch Quantities of Naval Stores as may be neceffary for the Use of such Ship or Vessel during the Course of her intended Voyage, or by Licence from the Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, or the Commissioners of the Admiralty for the Time I thorifed by virtue of His Majesty's Commission for de-

being; nor to the Exportation of the faid feveral Articles to Ireland, or to His Majesty's Yards or Garrifons, or to His Majesty's Colonies or Planta-tions in America or the West Indies, or to Newfoundland, or to His Majesty's Forts and Settlements on the Coast of Africa, or to the Island of St. Helena, or to the British Settlements or Factories in the East Indies: Provided that upon the Exportation of any of the faid Articles for the Pur-poles of Trade to Ireland, or to His Majesty's Yards and Garrisons, or to His Majesty's Colonics and Plantations in America or the West Indies, or to the Island of Newfoundland, or to His Majefty's Forts and Settlements on the Coast of Africa, or to the Island of St. Helena, or to the British Settlements or Factories in the East Indies, the Exporters of fuch Articles do first make Oath of the true Destination of the same to the Places for which they shall be entered outwards, before the Entry of the same shall be made, and do give full and fufficient Security, by Bond, (except as hereinafter excepted,) to the Satisfaction of the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs, to carry the faid Articles to the Places for which they are fo entered outwards, and for the Purpofes specified, and none other; and fuch Bond shall not be cancelled or delivered up until Proof be made to the Satisfaction of the faid Commissioners, by the Production, within a Time to be fixed by the faid Commissioners, and specified in the Bond, of a Certificate or Certificates, in such Form and Manner as shall be directed by the faid Commis-sioners, shewing that the faid Articles have been all duly landed at the Places for which they were entered outwards: But it is His Majesty's Pleasure, nevertheless, that the following Articles, viz. Bar-Iron, White and Tarred Rope, Tallow or Mill Greafe, Tarpaulins for Waggon-Covers, Pitch, Tar, and Turpentine, shall be permitted to be exported, upon Payment of the proper Duties, without Bond being entered into by the Merchant Exporter, to any of the British Plantations in the West Indies, or to any of His Majesty's Settlements in South America; provided the Merchant Exporter shall first verify, upon Oath, that the Articles so exported are intended for the Use of a particular Plantation or Settlement, to be named in the Entry Outwards, and not for Sale; and that the faid Plantation or Settlement has not before been furnished with any Supply of the faid Articles during the fame Season; and provided also that the Exportation of the faid Articles shall, in no Case, exceed the Value of Fifty Pounds Sterling for any given Plantation or Settle-ment, whether by one or more Shipments within the fame Season: And the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury, the Commissioners for executing the Office of Lord High Admiral of Great Britain, and the Lord Warden of the Cinque Ports, are to give the neceffary Directions herein as to them may respec-Steph.
