

His present Majesty, for repairing the Road from Banbury, in the County of Oxford, through Daventry and Cottelbach, to Lutterworth, in the County of Leicester.

An Act for continuing the Term, and altering and enlarging the Powers, of Two Acts, of the Sixth and Twenty-seventh Years of His present Majesty, for repairing the Road from High Bullen, in Wednesbury, to the further End of Darlaston-Lane, and other Places therein named, in the County of Stafford.

An Act for continuing the Term, and altering and enlarging the Powers, of Two Acts, of the Fifth and Twenty-sixth Years of His present Majesty, for repairing the Road from Birstall to Nunbrook, and from Bradley-Lane to Huddersfield, in the County of York.

An Act for continuing the Term, and altering and enlarging the Powers, of several Acts, for repairing the Roads from the Parish of Cranbrooke to Appledore Heath, and other Roads, in the County of Kent.

An Act to continue the Term, and alter and enlarge the Powers, of so much of Three Acts, of the Fifth, Ninth, and Twenty-sixth Years of His present Majesty, as relate to the Repair of the Road from Wat's Cross to Cowden, and the Roads from Sevenoaks Common to Crockhurst Hatch Corner, and Penhurst Town to Southborough, in the County of Kent.

An Act for continuing the Term, and altering and enlarging the Powers of an Act, of the Twenty-sixth Year of His present Majesty, for repairing so much of the Road from the Town of Newcastle-upon-Tyne to the City of Carlisle, as lies within the County of Northumberland.

An Act for continuing the Term, and altering and enlarging the Powers, of Two Acts, of the Fifth and Twenty-sixth Years of His present Majesty, for repairing several Roads in and near Great Torrington, in the County of Devon.

And Twenty-two Private Acts.

WE, the Lord Mayor, Aldermen, and Commons of the City of London, in Common-Council assembled, most humbly entreat your Royal and Serene Highness to accept our sincere Congratulations on your safe Arrival in this Imperial Country.

The Return to her native Land of an illustrious Princess to nearly and dearly allied to our beloved Sovereign, and to the royal and amiable Consort of the Heir Apparent to the Throne of this United Kingdom, cannot but renew the most lively Sentiments of Affection in the Hearts of His Majesty's loyal Subjects, and a warm Participation of those Feelings which a Meeting so interesting to the Royal Family must have occasioned.

Deeply impressed, Madam, as we are by the extraordinary Events which have occasioned your Return, we trust your Royal and Serene Highness will permit us to express the sincere Joy we feel at your Restoration to the Shores of a free and loyal People, not more attached to a good and venerable King by Duty to his supreme and august Station, than by Affection to his sacred Person and Family.

My Lord,

I return your Lordship, and the Aldermen, and Commons of the City of London, my grateful Thanks for an Address which has given me the most heartfelt Satisfaction.

It affords an additional Instance of the loyal Attachment of the City of London to the King, and of their affectionate Regard for His Majesty's Royal Family.

They were all received very graciously, and had the Honour to kiss Her Royal Highness's Hand.

Whitehall, August 11, 1807.

The King has been pleased to appoint the Right Honourable James Earl of Malmesbury, Knight of the Most Honourable Order of the Bath, to be Lord Lieutenant of the County of Southampton, and of the Town of Southampton and County of the same.

The King has also been pleased to grant to James Edward Harris, Esq; (commonly called Viscount Fitz Harris,) the several Offices of Governor and Captain of the Isle of Wight, and Governor of Carisbrook Castle, in the said Isle.

Whitehall, August 7, 1807.

The King has been pleased to grant unto Thomas Norcliffe Dalton, of Langton, in the County of York, heretofore of the City of York, Esq; His Royal Licence and Authority, that he and his Issue may assume and take the Surname of Norcliffe, instead of that of Dalton, and bear and use the Arms of Norcliffe, in compliance with an Injunction and Proviso contained in the last Will and Testament of his Great Uncle, Thomas Norcliffe, late of Langton aforesaid, Esq; deceased, bearing Date the 23d August 1756; such Arms being first duly exemplified according to the Laws of Arms:

And also to order, that this His Majesty's Royal Concession and Declaration be registered in His College of Arms.
