**LONDON DOCKS.
BY THE LORDS COMMISSIONERS OF
HIS MAJESTY'S TREASURY.**

WHEREAS by an Act, passed in the Forty-third Year of His present Majesty's Reign, intituled, "An Act for permitting certain Goods imported into Great Britain to be secured in Warehouses, without Payment of Duty," it is enacted,

That it should be lawful for the Importer or Importers, Proprietor or Proprietors, Consignee or Consignees of any of the Goods, Wares, or Merchandize enumerated or described in the Table thereunto annexed, marked (B), and which shall be legally imported and brought into the Port of London, to lodge and secure the same under the Joint Locks of the Crown and the London
