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Warsaw, March 29.

THE Alliance between this Crown and the Czar of *Moscovy* is the chief Matter that continues to employ the Dyet; the Ambassadors and the Commissioners appointed to Treat with them, are daily in Conference, and have formed a Project of Articles, by one of which the Czar will be obliged to joyn 20000 Men to the Forces of this Crown, and besides, to have 300000 Men in the Field under the Command of his own Generals; and in the general we are informed, that the Proposals which the Ambassadors have made, are well enough liked by those that think it the Interest of this Kingdom, to enter at this time into Engagements with the Moscovites against the Turks, and that the only thing that keeps them from closing with the Terms that are offered, is a mistrust they have, (grounded upon the Advices they of late received, that the Turks and Moscovites are Treating a Peace) that the Moscovites set this Negotiation on foot, and pursue it now with so much seeming earnestness, to obtain better Conditions from the Turks for themselves; but this Alliance meets with a far greater obstruction from those who would not have this Crown enter into a War against the Turks, but endeavour to continue the Peace it now enjoys; and of this opinion are those which are look'd upon here to be of the French Interests. On the other hand, the Popes Nuncio, and the Emperors Minister have been to visit the Moscovite Ambassadors, and endeavour all they can to bring this Alliance to a speedy conclusion.

Genova, April 2. The 28th past came in here the *Suffex* Capt. *Wenborne* from the *Canaries*, and the same day sailed the *Reserve* Capt. *Boucher*, and the *Merchants Goodwill* Capt. *Tremblet* for *Legborne*. Here arrive several Dutch Ships, both from the East and West.

Lintz, April 1. Their Imperial Majesties purpose to remove from hence the 9th of this Month, the young Arch-Duke being pretty well again. The Colonels of the old standing Regiments are raising 9000 Men, under the name of Recruits, which may hereafter, if it be thought necessary, be formed into new Regiments, and in the mean time the Pay of the Officers, which would amount to a very considerable Sum, will be saved. It is reported that the Poles and the Moscovites have made an Alliance against the Turks, which we shall be very glad to hear confirmed, for that such a War will sufficiently employ the Ottomans, and divert the designs they might otherwise have had towards *Hungary*.

Vienna, April 3. The Chancellor, and several of the Chief of the Nobility of *Hungary*, arrived here two days since, to expect the Emperors return hither, to receive his Orders in several Matters relating to the Meeting of the Dyet; whither it is said, some of the Chief of the Hungarian Malecontents refuse to come, because they hear that the Emperor intends to have a Garrison of three or four thousand Men in the Place where the Dyet is to meet, for the security of his Person when he comes thither. The Letters we receive from *Warsaw* bring us very acceptable News, for they tell us, that the Moscovite Ambassadors had had Audience of the King and the Dyet, and that there was great appearance, that the Offensive and Defensive Alliance, which has been so long Negotiating, would now be finally concluded, which we hope our next Letters will bring us the confirmation of.

Berlin, April 5. The Letters from *Poland* give us great hopes that the Alliance between that Crown and the Czar of *Moscovy* will be very speedily perfected, notwithstanding the Endeavours that are used by some Persons to hinder it. The Court goes from hence the beginning of the next Month for *Magdeburg*.

Strasbourg, April 8. The French are marking out a Camp near *Landaw*, whither their Troops are Marching. We are assured that the Marriage of the Elector of *Bavaria* with the Princess of *Saxe-Eysenach* is concluded.

Cologne, April 11. Prince *William* of *Furstemberg* parted from hence the last week for *Paris*, from whence we are expecting his Brother the Bishop of *Strasbourg*, who, as we are told, intends to be present at the Election, which the Chapter of *Strasbourg* is going to make of a Dean, in the room of the Count of *Coningssec*, in which there is like to be a Contest between those of the Imperial and the French Interests.

Hamburg, April 11. The Letters from *Postdam* give us an Account, that the Elector of *Brandenburg*, who had been very ill of the Gout, was very well again, and that he intended to goe in a day or two to *Berlin*, and from thence to *Magdeburg* to receive the Homage of those his Subjects, and afterwards to *Cleves*. We do not yet hear of the King of *Denmarks* departure from *Copenhagen* towards these parts; however, the Discourse continues, that there is an Enter-view intended between him, the Elector of *Brandenburg*, and the Elector of *Saxony*, at *Wismar*. The Duke of *Zell* has given out Commissions for the raising of Men, which we suppose are only meant for Recruits for the Regiments that are now on foot.
