

FIRST LOTTERY 1807.

THE Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of His Majesty's Treasury having contracted for the Sale of the First Lottery for the Year 1807, consisting of Twenty Thousand Tickets, to be accompanied with an after Drawing or supplementary Lottery of Six Thousand Tickets, which are to be given as Prizes in the principal Lottery, according to a Scheme already approved by them; the said Lords Commissioners, whose Names are hereunto subscribed, in pursuance of the Power vested in them by the Act of the last Session of Parliament, for granting His Majesty a Sum of Money to be raised by Lotteries, do hereby order and direct as follows:

That every Ticket in the Principal Lottery which shall be drawn a Prize of a Ticket in the Supplementary Lottery, shall entitle the Bearer thereof to such Benefit as shall belong to the Ticket bearing the same Number in the Supplementary Lottery.

That every lawful Share of a Ticket in the principal Lottery, which shall be drawn a Prize of a Ticket in the Supplementary Lottery, shall entitle the Bearer thereof to the like Share of the Benefit which shall belong to the Ticket bearing the same Number in the Supplementary Lottery.

That the Managers and Directors of the Lotteries, to be drawn in pursuance of the aforesaid Act, shall prepare Six Thousand Tickets, to be put into the Prize and Blank Box or Wheel of the Principal Lottery, for entitling the Holders of the Tickets against which the same shall be drawn, to Tickets bearing the same Numbers in the Supplementary Lottery, and shall cause the same to be expressed in the following Form:

A Ticket in the Supplementary Lottery bearing the same Number, together with the Benefit which may belong thereto.

which Six Thousand Tickets shall be rolled up and fastened in the same Manner as the other Prize Tickets, and the Blank Tickets to be put into the Box or Wheel marked with the Letter B. according to the Directions of the said Act, and shall be mingled therewith in the said Box or Wheel in the usual Manner.

That such of the Tickets in the Principal Lottery divided into Shares, and deposited at the Stamp Office in London or Dublin pursuant to the aforesaid Act, as shall be drawn Prizes of Tickets in the Supplementary Lottery, shall remain in the said Offices respectively until the Supplementary Lottery shall be drawn; and such of the Tickets in the Principal Lottery as shall be entitled to a Benefit of 50l. or under in the Supplementary Lottery, shall remain Three clear Days longer; and such as shall be entitled to a greater Benefit than 50l. in the Supplementary Lottery shall remain Fourteen clear Days longer; at the Expiration of which Time the same shall be delivered back to the Proprietor on returning the Receipt given for the same: But every Person holding a Share in any such Ticket may, by giving Notice to the Receiver-General, or other Person having the Custody thereof, cause the same to be still further detained till the Share shall be paid, or Security given, in the same Manner as the aforesaid Act directs in case the Ticket had been

drawn a Money Prize in the Principal Lottery; and in Default thereof, such further Measures shall be taken with respect to such Ticket as if the same had been drawn a Money Prize in the Principal Lottery.

That, for the Supplementary Lottery, the said Managers and Directors shall cause Six Thousand Tickets to be prepared in the usual Manner, bearing the same Numbers with such of the Tickets of the Principal Lottery as shall have been drawn Prizes of Tickets in the Supplementary Lottery; and shall cause the same to be rolled up and fastened, and to be cut off into a Box marked with the Letter A, in the same Manner as the said Act directs with respect to the numbered Tickets in the Principal Lottery; and that the said Managers and Directors shall cause Six Thousand other Tickets to be prepared in the usual Manner, to designate the Prizes and Blanks in the said Supplementary Lottery, according to the Scheme already approved of, and transmitted to the said Managers and Directors, and shall cause the same to be rolled up and fastened, and to be cut off into a Box marked with the Letter B, in the same Manner as the said Act directs with regard to the Prize and Blank Tickets in the Principal Lottery; and that the Supplementary Lottery, thus prepared, shall be drawn in the Manner prescribed by the said Act with regard to the Principal Lottery; and that the Drawing thereof shall begin on Thursday the 19th Day of November next, and shall end on the following Day.

NOTICE TO MARINERS.

IN virtue of an Act of Parliament, Geo. III, c. 132, authorising the Honourable the Commissioners of Northern Light-Houses to erect a Light-House on the Bell-Rock, to place a Floating Light there, and to collect Duties thereupon, Notice is hereby given, that a Vessel, fitted out for a Floating Light, is now moored off the Cape or Bell Rock, situated at the Entrance of the Friths of Forth and Tay, in N. Lat. 56 Deg. 27 Min. and W. Long. 2 Deg. 27 Min.

The Moorings of this Light consist, of a Mushroom Anchor, with a Chain, laid down in 17 Fathoms Water, the Bell Rock bearing by the Compass, E. S. E. distant One Mile; the Red Head, N. by E. $\frac{1}{2}$ E. distant Thirteen Miles; Fifeness, S. W. $\frac{1}{4}$ W. distant Twelve Miles; and the Island of May, S. W. $\frac{1}{4}$ S. distant Seventeen Miles.

The Light will be from Oil, and will be lighted upon the Night of the 15th Day of September 1807, and thereafter every Night, from the going away of Daylight in the Evening till the Return of Daylight in the Morning. To distinguish this Light from the Double Lights at the Tay and Seares, and from the Single Light on the Island of May, Three distinct Lights will be shown by a Lantern hoisted to the Top of each Mast, and these will be visible from every Point of the Compass; the Lanterns on the Fore and Mizzen Mast being elevated 23 Feet, and that on the Mizzen Mast 31 Feet above the Vessel's Deck; the Lights, when seen from either Side of the Ship, will have the Appearance of a Triangle, but if seen End-on, will appear as Two Lights, the one above the other.
