P R E S E N T,

The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS by an Act of Parliament, passed in the Forty-fifth Year of the Reign of His present Majesty, intituled "An Act for the more effectual Prevention of Smuggling," and by another Act, passed in the last Session of Parliament, intituled "An Act to make more effectual Provision for the Prevention of Smuggling;" the Commissioned Officers of His Majesty's Army, Navy, and Marines, and of the Militia while embodied, and of the Volunteers, or any other of His Majesty's Forces while on Service, and subject to the Provisions of any Act in Force for the Punishment of Mutiny and Desertion; and also the Warrant and Non-Commissioned Officers of His Majesty's Army, not being below the Rank of a Serjeant, who shall be approved of by the Officers for the Time being commanding the Regiments in which they respectively serve, as proper and qualified for the Service, are authorized, empowered, and required to seize all Ships, Vessels, Boats, Horses, Carts, and Carriages, and all prohibited and uncustomed and other Goods liable to Forfeiture and Seizure under any Laws in Force for the Prevention of Smuggling; and certain Rewards are by the said Acts of Parliament granted for the making of such Seizures, and the arresting of Persons found employed in Smuggling: And whereas certain Rewards have, under Orders in Council, been allowed and paid to the Officers and Soldiers of His Majesty's Army aiding and assisting the Officers of Customs and Excise in the making of Seizures of prohibited and uncustomed Goods, and also for the guarding of such Seizures to any Warehouse of the Customs or Excise: And whereas it will greatly tend to the forwarding of the Purposes of the said Acts of Parliament, if other Rewards were established and

allowed, instead and in lieu of those heretofore allowed and paid under Orders in Council, for such aiding, assisting, and guarding as aforesaid: And whereas by the said last-mentioned Act of Parliament, His Majesty in Council is empowered to direct and provide in what Manner, and in what Proportion, the said Rewards for the making of Seizures, or aiding any Officer of the Revenue therein, or guarding of any Seizures, shall be divided and distributed amongst the Commissioned, and Warrant, and Non-Commissioned Officers and Privates actually making, or the Privates actually aiding and assisting in the making, of the Seizures, and the Commissioned, and Warrant, and Non-Commissioned Officers and Privates of the Regiment, Battalion, or Corps to which the Persons actually making, or aiding or assisting in, any Seizure shall belong, His Majesty, having taken the same into Consideration, is thereupon graciously pleased, by and with the Advice of His Privy Council, to order and direct, and doth hereby order and direct, that the Rewards and Allowances allowed and paid under any former Orders in Council shall be discontinued; and that in future, where any Soldiers shall aid and assist any Officer or Officers of Customs or Excise in the making of any Seizure of any prohibited or uncustomed Goods, (at which Seizure no Commissioned, or any such Warrant or Non-Commissioned Officer as aforesaid, shall be present,) there shall be paid the Rewards following; that is to say,  
For all Spirits, of any Kind whatever, calculated and computed at an average Strength of One in Five under Hydrometer Proof, Two Shillings and Sixpence the Gallon.  
Tobacco and Snuff, Three Pence the Pound.  
Wine, Tea, Salt, and other Articles, Twenty-five per Cent. upon the Appraised Value thereof.  
And for every Horse seized with any such Spirits or Articles as aforesaid, the Sum of Forty Shillings.  
And that where any Commissioned, or Warrant,

or Non-Commissioned Officers or Privates, shall guard, or assist in guarding, any Seizure which shall have been made by any Officer or Officers of Customs or Excise, and at which Seizure no Commissioned, or such Warrant or Non-Commissioned Officer as aforesaid, shall be present, there shall be paid the Rewards following; that is to say,

For all Spirits of any Kind whatever, calculated and computed at an Average Strength of One in Five under Hydrometer Proof, One Shilling the Gallon.

Tobacco and Snuff, One Penny Halfpenny the Pound.

And for Wine, Tea, Salt, and other Articles, Ten per Cent. upon the Appraised Value thereof.

And His Majesty is further pleased, by and with the Advice aforesaid, to order and direct, and doth hereby order and direct, that in all Cases where any Soldiers shall aid and assist any Officer or Officers of Customs or Excise, where no Commissioned, or any such Warrant or Non-Commissioned Officer as aforesaid, shall be present in detaining, or assisting in detaining, any Person or Persons liable to be arrested or detained under the Provisions of either of the said Acts, there shall be paid a Sum equal to One Half of the Amount of the Sum which shall be awarded by the Commissioners of Customs or Excise respectively, for the arresting and Detention of any such Man or Men.

And His Majesty is further pleased, by and with the Advice aforesaid, to order and direct, and doth hereby order and direct, that such Sums shall be paid with all possible Dispatch, and without waiting for the Condemnation of such Goods; and whether such Goods shall be condemned or not by the Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs and Excise respectively, to the Agent or Agents of the Regiment, Battalion, or Corps to which the Soldiers so aiding and assisting, or the Commissioned, or Warrant, or Non-Commissioned Officers or Privates so guarding, shall belong; and the Commissioners of the Customs and Excise respectively are hereby required, once in every Three Months, to transmit to the Secretary at War an Account of all such Sums of Money, and to whom the same shall have been respectively paid.

And His Majesty, in pursuance of the said last-mentioned Act of Parliament, is also graciously pleased to order and direct, and doth hereby order and direct, that the Rewards given by any Act of Parliament relating to the Revenues of Customs or Excise in Cases of Seizures; and all Sums of Money arising out of any Shares of Seizures made by any Commissioned, or by any such Warrant or Non-Commissioned Officers as aforesaid, and also the Rewards hereinbefore specified for aiding, assisting, or guarding as aforesaid, shall be divided and distributed amongst the Commissioned, and Warrant, and Non-Commissioned Officers and Privates actually

present at the Seizure, or personally aiding and assisting, or guarding, and the Commissioned, and Warrant, and Non-Commissioned Officers and Privates of the Regiment, Battalion, or Corps to which they shall belong, in the following Proportions; that is to say, To the Commissioned, and Warrant, and Non Commissioned Officers and Privates actually present at any Seizure, or personally aiding and assisting, or guarding as aforesaid, as an Encouragement for their Exertion and Activity, the following Shares:

To the KING's Most Excellent Majesty,

The humble Address of the Presbyterian Synod of Ireland distinguished by the Name of Sui-

*Most Gracious Sovereign,*

WE, your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Ministers and Elders of the Presbyterian Synod of Ireland, distinguished by the Name



of Suiders, assembled in Synod at Market-Hill, July 9, 1807, humbly beg Leave to lay before your Majesty a Repetition of our Love and Veneration for your Majesty's Person and Government, and an Assurance of the same Loyalty which has marked our Conduct in the most trying Times; with Gratitude to Heaven we contemplate the Wisdom, the Benignity, and the Continuance of your Majesty's Reign over us; with heartfelt Joy we find that the Protestant Reformed Religion continues to be a primary Object of your Majesty's gracious Support and Patronage; and with entire Satisfaction we daily witness your Majesty's paternal Regard for every Class and Description of your Majesty's Subjects; we beg to assure your Majesty that the Presbyterian Suiders are bound by the strong Ties of Religion, Gratitude, and Interest to support our most gracious King and invaluable Constitution; and that we are ready to stand forward against all Enemies, foreign or domestic, whenever called on by your Majesty; and, in the mean Time, we feel ourselves bound by the Spirit of our most holy Religion to cultivate Peace, Harmony, and Good Will by all Means in our Power amongst every Class and Description of our Fellow-Subjects; we only beg Leave to say further, that our constant Prayer to the Sovereign Disposer of all Events is and shall be, that He may satisfy our King with long Life, and shew him his Salvation; that his Throne may be built up to all Generations, and that there may not fail one of the illustrious House of Hanover, inheriting the virtues of his Fathers, to sit on his Throne till the End of Time.

Admiralty-Office, September 11, 1807.

*Extract from the Journal of Admiral Gambier, Commander in Chief of His Majesty's Ships and Vessels in the Baltic, received at the Admiralty this Morning.*

August 23.

THE Battery on the left Wing of the Army (which is calculated to defend its Advance from the Annoyance of Gun-Boats) being completed and mounted with Thirteen Twenty-four Pounders, the Construction of Mortar Batteries, under Cover of the above, are in Progress. The Enemy observing these Movements, appeared Yesterday to be collecting their Praams and Gun-Boats near the Harbour's Mouth, in Preparation for a powerful Attack on our Works. Our advanced Squadron continuing in their Position for defending the Operations on Shore, were, about Ten A. M. attacked by Three Praams (carrying each Twenty Guns) and a considerable Number of Gun-Boats (said to be more than Thirty), in Addition to the Fire from the Crown Battery, Floating Batteries, and Block-Ships, which was continued for more than Four Hours. The Fire was returned with great Spirit from the Squadron, and some Attempts were

made to throw Mr. Congreve's Rockets, but the Distance was too great to produce much Effect from them. About Two P. M. the Gung-Brigs which were farthest advanced, not being able to make any Impression against so vast a Force, were ordered to retire, and the Firing ceased. I am happy to find the Squadron received no material Injury. We have, however, to regret the Loss of Lieutenant John Woodford, of the Cruiser, with Three Men killed in the several Vessels, and Thirteen Wounded. On the Part of the Enemy, it is believed, that One Gun-Boat has been disabled or sunk, and One of the Praams was observed to be towed out of the Action disabled. The new Battery at the Mill opened, and taking a Part in the Engagement, did considerable Execution. The Ships and Vessels undermentioned were engaged in this Affair, and I have acquitted myself of a most pleasing Duty in conveying to the Commanders, Officers, and Crews of the Sloops, Bombs, Gun-Brigs, and Boats, the warm Sense of Praise and Approbation with which their Bravery and Energy during so long and so heavy a Contest have inspired me.

August 24. Having Occasion to confer with Lieutenant-General Lord Cathcart, commanding the Army, respecting the Co-operation of the Fleet, I went on Shore to Head-Quarters for that Purpose. I learnt that the Right Wing of the Army is advanced near to the Town on the South-West, and are preparing Mortar Batteries to commence the Bombardment of it. The Enemy being obliged to withdraw their Out-Posts in that Quarter, have set Fire to the Suburbs to prevent them from affording cover to our Troops. The Vessels which were in Action Yesterday are getting their Damages repaired. No Attack has been made this Day by the Enemy's Flotilla against our Advanced Squadron.

August 25. Yesterday and this Day the Damage which several of the Gun-Brigs received in the Action on the 23d have been repaired, and the Vessels are again ready for Service.

N. B. The above Journal was brought to England by the Earnest Gun-Brig returning, according to her Orders to Yarmouth, after delivering the Dispatches with which she sailed for the Admiral.

*Extract of a Letter from Vice-Admiral Russell, Commander in Chief of a Squadron of His Majesty's Ships and Vessels employed in the North Sea, to the Honourable William Wellefley Pole, Secretary of the Admiralty, dated Majestic, off Heligoland, the 6th September 1807, and received last Night by Lieutenant Ramsay, of the Carrier Cutter.*

**I** BEG you will be pleased to acquaint my Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty, that I arrived at this Island, and anchored close to the Town, on the 4th Instant, at half-past Two P. M., but did not, as I expected, find the Explosion, the Wanderer, or the Exertion, with which their Lordships had intended to reinforce me.

Having found that Lord Falkland had, with his usual Zeal and Promptness, summoned the Garrison on the 30th Ultimo, and that his Proposals were rejected by the Governor, I was making my Arrangements to storm him with the Marines and Seamen of the Squadron if he did not instantly surrender, for at this Time the Value of the Island to us is immense.

At Six P. M. however, he sent out a Flag of Truce, desiring that an Officer might be sent in the Morning to treat on Articles of Capitulation; and I accordingly, at Daylight Yesterday Morning, dispatched Lord Viscount Falkland and Lieutenant D'Auvergne, (First of this Ship,) on that Service.

At Two P. M. the Deputation returned with the Articles of Capitulation, which I immediately ratified.

With a small Expence this Island may be made a little Gibraltar, and a safe Haven for small Craft even in the Winter; it is a Key to the Rivers Ems, Wefer, Jade, Elbe, and Eyder, the only Asylum at present for our Cruizers in these Seas.

I have appointed Lieutenant D'Auvergne as acting Governor until their Lordships' Pleasure is known; and I beg Leave to add, that, from his perfect Knowledge of both Services, his Zeal and Loyalty, and a high Sense of Honour, I know no Seaman more competent to the Trust.
