- vantages had coft about Two Thouland Five Hundred Men in killed, wounded, and Prifoners. The Nature of the Fire, to which the Troops were expofed, was violent in the Extreme. Grape Shot at the Corners of all the Streets, Musketry, Hand-grenades, Bricks, and Stones from the Tops of all the Houses, every Householder with his Negroes defended his Dwelling, each of which was in itfelf a Fortrels, and it is not, perhaps, too much to fay, that the whole Male Population of Buenos Ayres was employed in its Defence.

This was the Situation of the Army on the Morning of the 6th Inftant, when General Liniers addr. Fed a Letter to me, offering to give up all his Priforars taken in the late Affair, together with the 71fl Riegiment, and others, taken with Brigadier-Gener a Beresford, if I defitted from any further Attacl : on the Town, and withdrew His Majefty's Forces from the River Plata, intimating at the fame Time, 1 fom the exafperated State of the Populace, he could not answer for the Safety of the Priloners, if I perlifted in offenfive Meafures. Influenced by this Cont deration, (which I knew from better Authority to be founded in Fact,) and reflecting of how little Advantage would be the Poffeffion of a Country, the Inhabitants of which were fo abfolutely hoft le, I refolved to forego the Advantages which the Bravery of the Troops had obtained, and acceded to the annexed Treaty, which I truft will meet the A porobation of His Majefty.

I have no thing further to add, except to mention, in Terms of the highest Praise, the Conduct of Rear-Admir al Murray, whole cordial Co-operation has never licen wanting whenever the Army could be benefited by his Exertions. Captain Rowley, of the Royal N avy, commanding the Seamen on Shore, Captain Baymun, of His Majefty's Ship Africa, who fuperint ended the Difembarkation, and Captain Thompson, of the Fly, who had the Direction of the Gun-Bos ts, and had previoufly rendered me much Service by re connoitring the River, are all entitled to my belt T hanks. As his Character already flands fo high, it is

almost unne ceffary to flate that from my Second in Command, Major-General Levelon Gower, I have experienced every zealous and uleful Affiltance ; my Thank 1 are likewife due to Brigadiers-General Sir Samuel, Auchmuty and Lumley, and to Colonel Mahon and Brigadier-General Craufurd commanding Brigades. I cannot fufficiently bring to Notice the uncomme n Exertions of Captain Fraler, commanding the Royal Artillery, the Fertility of whole Mind, Z cal and Animation in all Cafes left Difficulties behind. Captain Squires of the Royal Engineers is also entitled to my best Thanks; nor should I omit the gallant Conduct of Major Nicholls of the 15th Regiment, who on the Morning of the 6th Inflant, being preffed by the Enemy near the Refidencia, charged them with great Spirit, and took Two Howitzers and many Prifoners. Lieutenant-Colonel Bradford, Deputy Adjutant General, has likewife a great Claim to my Approbation as a gallant and promifing Officer.

The Officers of my perfonal Staff, Lieutenant-Colonel Torrens, Military Secretary, Captains Brawn, Fofter, Douglas, and Whittingham, Aides du Camp, must also be mentioned by me in Terms of just Regard; the Knowledge which the latter poffeffes of the Spanish Language has been eminently ufeful to me

This Difpatch will be delivered to you by Lieutenant Colonel Bourke, Deputy Quarter-Mafter-General, who has afforded me that Affiftance which might be looked for from an Officer of his military Talents and Attachment to the Service ; to whom' I beg to refer you for any further Particulars respecting the military Operations in this Part of the World.
