The KING's Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

IT is this Day ordered, by His Majesty in Council, That the Parliament, which stands prorogued to Thursday the Twenty-fourth Day of this instant September, be further prorogued to Tuesday the Tenth Day of November next.

Admiralty-Office, September 18, 1807.

WHEREAS it is desirable that the Right Honourable the Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty should avail themselves of the Voluntary Services of such Seamen as are employed in the Greenland and British Fisheries, or who are otherwise protected by any Acts of Parliament now in Force, for the Purpose of assisting to fit out and navigate to the Ports of this Kingdom the Danish Ships and Vessels of War now at Copenhagen, which lately surrendered to His Majesty's Arms; Notice is hereby given, that their Lordships will direct an Allowance of Two Pounds Ten Shillings to be paid to every Seaman protected as aforesaid, who shall voluntarily offer his Service to, and be approved of by Captain Richbell, the Officer employed to regulate the Impress Service in London; the Commanders in Chief of His Majesty's Ships and Vessels at Sheerness, the Downs, Leith, or Yarmouth, or such Officers as they shall appoint; or the several Officers employed on the Sea Fencible or Regulating Service at Harwich, Aldborough, Yarmouth, Wells, Lynn, Boston, Barton, Hull, Whitby, Hartlepool, North Shields, Berwick, and Leith, on or before the 25th Instant, together with Able Seaman's Pay, and to be provided with suitable Bedding during the Time he shall be

so employed: Each Person, upon volunteering for the above-mentioned Service, will be furnished with an Order for his Discharge, to be kept in his Possession, which Order will entitle him to his Pay and the Gratuity hereby offered, and also to his Discharge on the Arrival of the Danish Ship on board which he may be embarked at her Moorings in Port; and Measures will be taken for conveying all Persons who shall be employed on the said Service to the respective Ports at which they entered, free of Expence, upon their being discharged as aforesaid. WHEREAS by an Act of Parliament, passed in the Forty-fifth Year of the Reign of His present Majesty, intituled "An Act for the more effectual Prevention of Smuggling;" and by another Act, passed in the last Session of Parliament, intituled "An Act to make more effectual Provision for the Prevention of Smuggling;" the Commissioned Officers of His Majesty's Army, Navy, and Marines, and of the Militia while embodied, and of the Volunteers, or any other of His Majesty's Forces while on Service, and subject to the Provisions of any Act in Force for the Punishment of Mutiny and Desertion; and also the Warrant and Non-Commissioned Officers of His Majesty's Army, not being below the Rank of a Serjeant, who shall be approved of by the Officers for the Time being commanding the Regiments in which they respectively serve, as proper and qualified for the Service, are authorized, empowered, and required to seize all Ships, Vessels, Boats, Horses, Carts, and Carriages, and all prohibited and uncustomed and other Goods liable to Forfeiture and Seizure under any Laws in Force for the Prevention of Smuggling; and certain Rewards are by the said Acts of Par-
