Pembrook May 25.

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E have here a report that the Garland Fregat going from this Harbor, had above an hours difpute with a Privateer, about a League from the moare, the Guns being heard near this place, and tis believed the Privateer is taken. Pendennis, May 27. This morning came in the Mermaid

and the Sorlings, having without any adventure, been crufing upon the Coaffs. Yesterday past by this Harbor, nine orten fair ships, which we are informed are Swedes from France, laden with Wine and Salt.

Plymouth, May 28. Yefterday the Anne Fregat brought in here a pretended Swede of 250 Tuas, laden with Salt, Honey, Linnen Cloth, Wines, and other Commodities, but is supposed prize, the Skipper proving an Hollander; and his pals gotten at the Hague.

Scadic, May 10. Ten thips of the Armada are fitted up, and ly ready to take in their Provisions for a Voyage, but to what tertain place is not yet known, though supposed only to ly upon the Coasts of Portugal. Several ships are lately arrived here from Genoua, and other places of the Levant with Wheate, which is now much fallen in its price, from 21 to 14 or 15 Rials the Fanega, which contains about 11 Gallons Winchester measure. The Turks Vessels are very numerous, and ply hard about the Streights mouth, where they have lately taken three small Prizes laden with Wheate. The Santta Clara of Genoua, with the fame lading, was about three daies fince unhappily caft away, upon the Diamond, a

Rock in the entry of the Bay of Cadia.

The Hamburgh Convoy of 14 Merchant ships about the same time arrived from Malaga at this Port, and in a weeks time may fail Northwards in company with the Oftend Fleet, in which are to Emba que under Convoy of two men of Wat, in which are to Emba que Regiment of Soldiers for Flanders, that were lasely fent from Maples. The going out of the Fleet for New Spain, is as yet uncertain, two men of War are ordered to conduct the Quickfi'ver fhips : On the first man of War that goes tothe ladyes, is to embarque Don Lorengo Santos, de fan Pedro, Regent of Seville, intending for the Canaries, to settle the late broyles occasioned by those of Teneriff, against the Canary Company; taking with him several of their Factors, whom he intends to Right in their possessions, Estates and Debts.

Cologne, May 22. From Rathbonne we are told, that the Diet is expecting his Imperial Mijefties refolution as to the gene al reformation of their Coins : fome intentions there are to have a particular Assembly called for the appro-bation of such Coins as shall be generally current; to which purposes all the provinces, as being equally concerned, shall send their Deputies: They are now falling upon the regu-lation of their Politie. The Electoral Colledge is much contermed at the procedure of the King of France, and at his thoughts of obliging the Empire to give him passage for his Forces: 'tis believed that the Cardinal de Sa'tzbourg will for some longer time defer his voyage to Rome. Legorne, May 16. The Duke de Medina Sidonia, is in the Captain Gally of Naples cone for Spain, having fet fail from hence the eight instant, the other three Gallies returning in two daies after for Naples, where as twas faid they were to joyn with two others of that lame fquadron, together with the squadrons of Sicily, Maltha and Rome, intending to make up a Fleet, under the Standard of the Church, and altogether to set fail for Candia, to assist the Venetians in their Wars.

Here is lately arrived in this Harbor a Barque of this place in eight daies from Tunk, whole Gallies and other Veffells are frequently fet out in fearth for prize a they advise us that there lately come to Tunis a Chious fent from the Ottoman Court, by special order from the Grand Signior to command them to draw all their confiderable Veffels together, and to fail with all the diligence they are shie to affift him in his Wars with the Venetions, and to joyn with the rest of his Fleet, which are suddenly intended for Can-dia. The same Chisus after the delivery of his message, embarquing in a Bregantine, went for Algiers, with the like commands to the Corfayres of that place.

The fame Veffel tells us that the Naws there at Tunk was, that those of Tripoly were far engaged in a War with the Mores; and that they had lately fallen very fiercely upon the Christians there, in throwing down their Altars, with their Churches, and other publique plates, being hardly in-duced at the interceffica of the French Conful to fpere the Church of St. Anthony, talfly attributing their great droughts which offights them with the thoughts of an imminent Femine to be a punishment for their remissness in suffering the Christian flaves to enjoy the liberty of their Religion among# them.

Genoua, May 17. Yesterday arrived here four Hambur-ghers, richly laden from Spain; with one Venezian from Oftend. From Turin they write, that Signior de Mile: Bnvoy from the Duke of Savoy to the Swiffe Cantons, had given lately an account to his Highress from Zurick, of his Negotiation there with the Swiffes, who had freely offered to use their endeavors with those of Geneva, to persawde them to send two of their Deputies to Turin, with full power to Treate, and conclude all Differences between them and the Duke, and to take from them any doubts they might make of being ill treated in Savey, the Cantons likewife offered to fend one D. puty of their own, to be joyned with those from Geneva, who shall be delegated from, an adin the name of all the Cantons, to perform the Office of Mediator, for the more speedy putting an end to all Disputes ; bur, to this de Milles has at prefent demurred, as not having fufficient power or in-Aructions to refolve, defiring time to acquaint his Mafter with their Proposals, and encouraging them to expect speedy latisfaction.

Genoua, May 24. The three French Galleys, which attended the Cardinalls Vendefare and de Retz, to Civita Vecchia, passed by us yesterday in their return for Marseilles, having by the way taken two Genouele Felucas, bound hence for Legorne, and in them 1 5000. Pieces of Eight, with other confiderable Liding, for which, latisfaction or reftauration will be speedily demanded.

The Governour of Milan has given particular order for vificing and repairing the Fortifications of feveral places upon the Frontiers of Piedmont and Montferrat, to prevent any fudden attempts that the French may make upon them on that file; and is resolved to raise what Forces he is able, both to supply the Spaniards broad, and to defend the Dutchy, at home; to which purpose he has sent to the Vice-roy of Naples for a present supply of Money, wherein he is like to meet with some difficulty, by reason of the great supply of money. forms will neceffarily be drawn from thence, to furnish the Ambaffadora ar Rome, to encourage the Spanife Intereft in the

Hague, June 3. By our laft Letters we are told, That the Fleet is put to Ses, and have Rendezvouled off the Texel, where they as yet continue : Several Merchant thips from 2,10 400 tuns are hired, and Victuall'd by the owners for a month, and are to take in Sculeiers.

Hegue, June 5. The Pentionery de Witte, with other persons of Quality that went from hence, we suppose are before this arrived at the Texall; and, although we have not heard any late newes frem them, we suppose we may fue denly hear that the Flere is put to Ses : The Brandenburg Minifters Roomswinchell and Blufpill went herce yesterday for Mechin: From Breds we are inform'd, That the Treaty began the third Inflant in the Caftle, where the first bufiness they fell upon, was, The Examination and Approbation of the Credential Letters ; that first Conference continuing frem nine in the Merning till Noon.

Brussells, Jane 4. The French are scrifying Charles-Roy which though in part blown up by the Spaniards, yet a confiderable part of the Fortifications being left flanding, the French are like in little time to repair, to which purpose they call in the Country people, whom they encourage by well paying them, 15 or 16 Sols a day. The 31 pass, the King of France lay at Binche, the first instant, at Mariament, the second at Trestant the Arms taking up their mont; the second at Trefigny; the Army taking up their Posts in the adjacent Towns, being in number about 22000 Foor, and 2000 Horse: Another tody of Men about 18000 being commanded to march for Luxenbourg, under the command of Mareichal de la Ferte.

Upon the approach of the French Army, the Marquils de Caftel Rodrigo had some intentions of removing the larger quantity of Corne, which the Country had brought into Locusine, for which purpole he fert his Orders to the Mzgiffrates of that City, referving only a proportionable Prevision for a month or fix weeks, which was opposed by the people, who seditiously threatned the Burgemaster with death, in case he suffered any of their Corne to be removed. Since this upon new debate a thousand Spanish Soldiers with eight pieces of Cannon are ordered into that Town, which they are resolved to defend, in case the French shall attempt it. The Marquis omits not any thing that can be dene for the security of the Countries, and tis telleved will in fort time have a very confiderable Army in the field, having by his late Declaration commanded all Gentlemen that are possess.
