Hague, June 3. We talk of fendling eur our Fleet in three or feur days, in order whereunte, the Pat fionary de Witte, is with the fquedren of the Maes gone frem the Texel, where the reft of the Fleet attends him, which they intend to reinforce with Regiment of 28 Companies, each ampeny confifting of 86 Men, under the command of College Delman, but their design is uncertainly discoursed es. We are much concerned at a report which has been for some time blown about, that the Erglish have taken from us several Islands in Affrica. The French ste pressing hard for an affishance of 6000 Men to be sent them for the carrying on the War sgainft the Netherlands, the States are accordingly convened to confider what answer to return : The Province of Groeninge, having hitherto been very forwards in con-eributing their Quoza's, which they usually advanced before-rand, for the carrying on of the War, have of late refused to make any farther payment, till il e other i icher, and more confiderable Provinces, who are far behind in arrests, fall

have first paid off their proportions.

The Ambassadors and Plenipotentiaries at Breds, have not as yet had any Session about the Treaty, the time hitherto being only poffed in Vifits, and perufing their feveral Letters

By our laft Letters we are told, That the Fleet is put to Ses, and have Rendezvouled off the Texel, where they as yet continue : Several Merchant thips from 2,10 400 tuns are hired, and Victuall'd by the owners for a month, and are to take in Sculeiers.

Hegue, June 5. The Pentionery de Witte, with other persons of Quality that went from hence, we suppose are before this arrived at the Texall; and, although we have not heard any late newes frem them, we suppose we may fue denly hear that the Flere is put to Ses : The Brandenburg Minifters Roomswinchell and Blufpill went herce yesterday for Mechin: From Breds we are inform'd, That the Treaty began the third Inflant in the Caftle, where the first bufiness they fell upon, was, The Examination and Approbation of the Credential Letters ; that first Conference continuing frem nine in the Merning till Noon.

Brussells, Jane 4. The French are scrifying Charles-Roy which though in part blown up by the Spaniards, yet a confiderable part of the Fortifications being left flanding, the French are like in little time to repair, to which purpose they call in the Country people, whom they encourage by well paying them, 15 or 16 Sols a day. The 31 pass, the King of France lay at Binche, the first instant, at Mariament, the second at Trestant the Arms taking up their mont; the second at Trefigny; the Army taking up their Posts in the adjacent Towns, being in number about 22000 Foor, and 2000 Horse: Another tody of Men about 18000 being commanded to march for Luxenbourg, under the command of Mareichal de la Ferte.

Upon the approach of the French Army, the Marquils de Caftel Rodrigo had some intentions of removing the larger quantity of Corne, which the Country had brought into Locusine, for which purpole he fert his Orders to the Mzgiffrates of that City, referving only a proportionable Prevision for a month or fix weeks, which was opposed by the people, who seditiously threatned the Burgemaster with death, in case he suffered any of their Corne to be removed. Since this upon new debate a thousand Spanish Soldiers with eight pieces of Cannon are ordered into that Town, which they are resolved to defend, in case the French shall attempt it. The Marquis omits not any thing that can be dene for the security of the Countries, and tis telleved will in fort time have a very confiderable Army in the field, having by his late Declaration commanded all Gentlemen that are possess. Gentlemen that are poffest of ary Fiels to appear, with what number of men they are chliged to by their Tenure : and that all perfors of any condition whatfoever, having either Lands or bene ficial employments, entertain upon their own expences a proportionable number of mer, according to their Revenues, The Covents and Jesuits rot exempted : Antwerp has already upon this Account railed 2000 men, who are to te commanded by he Count de Cruichensurgh, the fame methods being taken in all the other Citise mhoie Sculdiers will be affured of good pay.

Peris, June. 8. By Letters besting date the ad. inftant, frem the Army, we are it feim'e', that the 31 paft the King arrived in perken at the Fort of Charles-Roy, where he is taking effectival care for the rebuildings and retaining the Beflic ns that were blown up by the Enemy 3 and in making new fortifications for the better fire ngthening of the place in which he caily employes at least 20000 Men; intending to make it a very confiderable Post: After about 10 days flay there for the perfecting that work, his Majefly intends to march farther into the Country; These of Nivelle have already defired his Protection, to whem his Majefly far thought fit to fend fome of his Guards, two of whem falling irto et e Enemies hands, have been uled as Prifeners of war which his Majefty is much difpleated at , as being an incivility to his Perfen, against the Cuf em of War.
