Peace and Prosperity to Us and Our Dominions: 1 And We do strictly charge and command, that the faid public Fast be reverently and devoutly observed by all Our loving Subjects in England and Ireland, as they tender the Favour of Almighty God, and would avoid His Wrath and Indignation, and upon Pain of such Punishment as We may justly inslict on all fuch as contemn and neglect the Performance of fo religious and necessary a Duty: And for the better and more orderly solemnizing the same, We have given Directions to the Most Reverend the Archbishops, and the Right Reverend the Bishops of England and Ireland, to compose a Form of Prayer suitable to this Occasion, to be used in all Churches, Chapels, and Places of public Worship, and to take Care that the same be timely dispersed throughout their respective Dioceses.

By the KING. PROCLAMATION, For a General FAST.

GEORGE R.

E, taking into Our most serious Consideration the just and necessary War in which We are engaged, and putting Our Trust in Almighty God engaged, and putting Our Trutt in Amignty God that He will graciously bless Our Arms both by Sea and Land, have resolved, and do, by and with the Advice of Our Privy Council, hereby command, that a public Day of Fasting and Humiliation be observed throughout that Part of Our Kingdom of Great Britain called Scotland, on Thursday the Eighteenth Day of February next ensuing; that so both We and Our People may humble Ourseives before Almighty God, in order to obtain Pardon of Our Sins, and, in the most devout and folemn Manner, fend up Our Prayers and Supplications to the Divine Majesty for averting those heavy Judgments which Our manifold Provocations have most justly deserved, and for imploring His Blessing and Assistance on Our Arms for the Restoration of Peace and Prosperity to Us and Our Dominions: And We do strictly charge and command, that the faid public Fast be reverently and devoutly observed by all Our loving Subjects in Scotland, as they tender the Favour of Almighty God, and would avoid His Wrath and Indignation, and upon Pain of fuch Punishment as We may justly inflict on all fuch as contemu and neglect the Performance of fo religious and necessary a Duty: Our Will is therefore, and We charge, that this Our Proclamation feen, ye forthwith proceed to the Market Crofs of Edinburgh, and all other Places needful, and there, in Our Name and Authority, make Publication thereof, that none pretend Ignorance: And Our Will and Pleasure is, that Our Solicitor do cause printed Copies hereof to be fent to the Sheriffs of the feveral Shires, Stewarts of Stewartries, and Bailiffs of Regalities, and their Clerks, whom We ordain to see the same published: And We do appoint them to send

Copies hereof to the feveral Parish Churches within their Bounds, and that upon the Lord's Day immediately preceding the Day above mentioned, the fame may be published and read from the Pulpits immediately after Divine Service.
