Moscow, Feb. 18.

E are with fome impatience expecting to hear of the arrival of the Czars Ambaffadors at *Warfaw*, and of the fuccels they have in their Negotiation. In

the mean time we have Advice from the Frontiers, of the great preparations of the Ottomans, and we are not behind hand on this fide; the Czar will have feveral Armies in the Field, to be Commandéd by Kneas Goletini as Generalifimus. About fix weeks fince came hither Col. Patrick Gourdon, whole long and eminent Services on many occasions has procured him in a very great measure, the favour of the Czar, who has not only given him the Command of Major-General, but has entrulted him with the chief direction of Affairs relating to the War at Kiof, and accordingly he is gone thither to take Posicifion of that Charge.

Vienna, April 20. The Emperor has put off his Journey to Newstadt till the third of the next Month, for that things will not be ready fooner for the Courts Reception. Some of the chief of the Nobility of *Hungary* are now here, to concert with the Emperors Ministers several preliminary Matters concerning the meeting of the Dyet, which are fo adjusted, as that it's not doubted-but it will be to' the fatisfaction of all that are concerned therein; and we hope that when they come to Treat of the weighty and substantial Points, upon which the whole depends, there will appear in their Debates that Temper and Disposition to an accommodation, as to difcourage those that find their advantage in the publick diforders, from attempting any thing that may fruftrate the Ends the Emperor propoled to himfelf in calling this Dyct. The laft week arrived here an Euvoye from the Cham of Tartary, who had this day an Audience-of Prince Herman of Baden, Prefident of the Council of War; and we are informed that a Turkish Chizus will be here in few days; the Errands of these Messens are for the most part very inconfiderable, and so we sppole they are at this time, for we hear nothing fpoken of them.

Retisbonne, April 23. We gave you an Account in our laft, of the Debates of the Dyct, concerning the raifing an Army of 60000 Men; fince we underfland that fome Deputies have propoled, that 10000 Men more may bradded to that number, that is the Army may be 70000, and that it may remain on, foot three years, and it'shoped the Dyst will very speedily come to a final Resolution therein. From, Vienna they write, I hat the Affairs of Hungary did now chiefly employ that Court; the Emperor being on his departure for Neusladt, to be near the Dyet, which was to meet on the 28th Inflant; We with the success of this Meeting may answer the general expectation, and we have reason to with it, for that the Emperor, when he has fetted Affairs' on that fide, will be more at liberty to act for the Defence and Security of the Empire.

Francfort, April 25. It is generally believed that this Place will be made choice of for the Conferences that are to be held between the Imperial and French Commiffioners, and though there are not many that do promife themfelves they will antwee the end they feem defigned for, yet every body withes to fee them beguns and as we are told, the Dyet at Ratisbonne has defired the Emperor, that his Minifter at Paris may prefs the Difpatch of the French Commiffioners.

strasburg, April 25. The French Troops begin to be in motion; fome march to Saar Louis, Longwi, and Flanders, and tome again come from thole parts towards Lorrain and Alface; in the mean time we are wholly ignorant what their Defigns are, and though we cannot wholly lay afide the apprehenfions we have of them, yet not knowing where to fix them, we are more at ease than perhaps we have reafon to be. The States affembled at Ratisbonneare femible of the danger that threatens the Empire, as appears by their late Debates, concerning the fetting on flot an Army of flooo Men, for their common fecurity and Defene; and it's to be hoped they will make hafte to bring the lame to a formal Refolution, and then to put it in execution.

Cologné, April 28. The Deputies that were fent hither by the City of Liege, have had Audience of our Elector, and been fev ral times in conference with his Ministers, but we do not find that they have made any progress towards a accommodation; his Electoral Highnels demanding, That the Authors of the late diforders be exemplarily punified; that fuch as have been removed out of the Magistracy, or other publick Employments be reflored ; and his Decrees concerning the Impolition of the 60th Penny Received and Obeyed. From Alface we have Advice that the Chapter of Strasburg had been Affembled at Molfbeim for the chooling a Dean, in the room of Count Coningfee decealed, but that the Franch pretending to direct the Election, and feveral French Proop1
